"In 1957 Mr Drysdale helped to establish....

Maningrida....

He retired several years ago but now at the age of 66 he has gone back to Sunday Is. He has opened a shop and is helping the Bardi people there to sell their produce and artifacts. He has bought a 17' launch to travel to and from the mainland. Now he and his wife are prepared to sell their Subiaco home (in Perth) to help the Sunday Islanders.

There used to be a mission on Sunday Island, and Mr Drysdale worked there helping the Superintendent out from 1925 until the war came. After the war the Bardi people drifted away to the big towns nearby and 10 years ago the Mission closed down. Many people got into trouble and now 40 have gone back to their Island.

They are trying to regain the dignity they lost and in all this they have been helped by a white man who knows Bardi people so well that he simply says "I am one of them"."

FROM THE NEWSPAPERS.

ELCHO ISLAND MAN SPEAKS. An Elcho man, Burramuria, who was at Milingimbi for Church business when Mr. Armstrong was there, spoke in the newspaper about Aboriginals land. He said, "Stop the white people from taking our land. They take out land and our sacred places and make money for themselves but we get nothing. Our land belongs to us from a long time and we must keep it for our children. Welfare should help us to keep our land and not help the Europeans to take it. Don't leave the Aboriginal people behind."

SANDRAS STRUGGLES. Sandra Holmes who came to Maningrida last weekend with Yirrawala is still having trouble getting to see Yirrawalas caves. Mr. Giese is flying her and a Welfare Officer to Oenpelli to talk with men there about the caves. If they say it is alright she will be allowed to take pictures of the caves. Then she might go back to Darwin for a while and give everyone a rest.

Groote Eylandt Fishermen. Groote Eylandt men have now bought three boats and other things to start fishing. The Trust Fund lent them some money. They will catch the fish and freeze it at Groote in the prawm factory. Dennis Puffet who has been to Maningrida will go there to help them start off. The Fourcroy is taking their new boats out to them.



For the Bird Watcher.

The Jungle Fowl also known as the Scrub fowl and Scrub hen.

This bird builds a huge mound made up of earth and old leaves, either in jungle or very thick bush. There are some of the mounds up near the Cadell River Jack John says. The mounds may be as large as 30-40 feet across and 15 feet high. Rev. Harold Sheppy says that there is a huge one on Howard Is. Trees grow out the side of it. The eggs are laid in holes in mound and are left there by the hens. The heat of the rotting leaves etc. hatches them. The eggs are about as big as a goose egg (and the jungle fowl not much bigger than a bantam). When the chicks hatch, they are fairly big and have to look after themselves.

Its call sounds like "Char-ooka" and may be heard in the early morning or sometimes during the night.
