

Alcohol, Sex and Consent

Consent is basically when you've agreed to take part in some form of an activity being sex or being drinking of alcohol.

If you are drunk at all you can't, by the law, give consent to any activity. So, let's say for an example that you've been drinking with someone and you had sex with them, if you woke up next day and said that you hadn't give a consent because you were drunk, you would actually be right because the law states that if someone is been drinking they cannot give the consent to any activity.

If you so drunk that you don't know what are you doing and you can't consciously think about the decisions that you are making, then that is too drunk.

Having sex with someone without they consent is rape or sexual assault and is therefore a crime and is indeed against the law.

It think if someone is sober or pretty much sober and the other person is soberly intoxicated, that can definitely being seen as a rape.

The legal consequences of having sex with someone without they consent are that you can do jail time, you will go to court, you will be charged and there is definite, very severe legal consequences to that.

I think if you having a sex with someone for the first time and you're drunk, it's probably not a great idea.

You can change your mind after you giving a consent, say from an example if you have sex with someone and half way through you decide to stop and you say 'Stop' and they don't stop, then they've actually raped you.

If you've said 'No' to sex and the other person hasn't listen you should call the police, because they raped you and obviously contact SASS which is Sexual Assault Support Service that we have here, and they can get you a help and take you to a hospital and get you checked out and support you through the whole process of getting that other person charged and making sure that you are safe.

You have to realise with consent is really important thing to do and getting consent as far as sex is concerned it is the only way to insure that you haven't commit a sexual assault.

Unless that person is actually explicitly said that they are going to have sex with you and they are willing to have sex with you, there is no way that you can guarantee otherwise that you have had a consensual sex.
