MISSIONARY MINDED?

BY MISS K DAVIS.

Have you ever wondered how you can get the children in your Sunday School interested in missions and missionaries? That's a good place to hegin—to wonder "how". My first question would be, though, "Are you really interested in missions and missionaries yourself?"

In being interested yourself, you will find it easy to talk about the missionaries as friends. Become acquainted with those who visit your church. Be sure the children meet them and hear them speak, if this is at all possible. If it isn't possible, then you can tell them about the missionaries—and make them sound interesting and real.

What about having your Sunday School be especially interested in one missionary. Find out all you can about the missionary -his work, his needs, his family -everything! Even get a picture if he has one to give you. Have a special time of prayer each Sunday for the missionary. Encourage the children to pray, and encourage them to pray for certain things for the missionary. It is always a blessing to hear children pray intelligently for the missionaries, not just saving "God bless the missionaries."

Perhaps you would rather the children learn about several missionaries. Then you can take a different one every month or every two months. Don't forget those the children have learned about previously . . . they should still be remembered in prayer.

A map of Australia, or the world, can prove to be a good way to help the children to be interested in missions. Have the name of the missionary and his picture, if possible, on the map at just the place he is stationed. The children will like to learn as much as they can about the place where the missionary is.

Your Sunday School can keep a scrapbook of news of the missionaries you, as a Sunday School or the church, are interested in. Pictures of the missionary and of his work can be in the book. stories of his work, interesting letters he has written, and the date of his birthday. The scrapbook can be looked at over and over by the children individually and in the group, with you leading the discussion about the missionary. It would be a good project your children to remember their missionaries on their birthday and at Christmas time. (They remember the birthdays from the scrapbook.) This would bring them closer to the missionary and it would encourage the missionary, too. Letters written by children are appreciated by


As we expect to be away some months, much still remains to be done in the arranging and finalising of the work which must of necessity be left to others to do in our absence.

MISSIONARY SERVICE

A TESTIMONY BY MISS M. ACLAND.

Fifty years in the A.I.M.! How I praise the Lord for those years and their many experiences. There have been difficulties and problems, but the Lord delivered and brought me through.

There have been also many, many answers to prayer. At Walcha, my first appointment, a church was built in answer to prayer. Transport difficulties arose at Taroom, Q. A horse and sulky was provided here, and courage and strength given me to drive or ride.

When the people were moved from Taroom to Woorabinda, prayer was answered again and two folk called with their motor van and took me and my belongings the 150 miles across country. My fellow-worker had gone on before to find accommodation, but had to hire a tent. My friends had given me a tent, so on arrival we were able to pitch it. This was my home for several months.

Later, permission was given to build near the homestead of the Perch Creek Station. The Lord's people provided the materials for building. After we were comfortably housed we were able to pursue the work of ministering to the people on Woorabinda.

In some centres we had very little convenience. Water had to

be carried from a well. Bread was made in a camp-oven over an open fire. Praise the Lord he enabled me to do all this so that the glorious Gospel message could be proclaimed to the original inhabitants of this fair land.

For many years now I have been working and witnessing in and around the city of Sydney in the Redfern and Waterloo area. The people are visited in hospitals and in their homes. Prisoners have been written to and visited. Meetings for adults and children have been held.

Eternity alone will reveal what has been accomplished.

PREACH THE WORD 2 TIM; 4.2.

Pastor B. I believe our people need more teaching about faith. They need to learn to appropriate by faith, the blessings and victories we have in and through Christ.




Ed. What is the greatest need of your people just now? Spiritual or material?

A group of men led the way, and some distance behind was the main body of the women, with old man Paddy, Mr Wally Fejo and myself following. In the rear came the latecomers. From another direction could be seen those from the Station Huts.

There were seven to be baptized: first, Ruth, then two other women who with Ruth have been attending the Mission House in the past weeks for lessons in reading. Then there were the husbands of the two lastmentioned women, and two other men.

Last night, on the day following the baptismal service, the people from both camps gathered together in the church. Mr. Fejo fittingly spoke on the word, "The blood of Jesus Christ God's Son cleanseth us from all sin." It was the eve of the departure of the stockmen on their first muster of the new season, and the largest gathering yet to come together in the present time.

The mention of Ruth by name is not without its purpose, for this little woman has in the past weeks set an example which has come to be enthusiastically followed by other women and, in three cases, of their husbands and another man too.

The whole camp has been interested in the progress made in

reading, evident in the following of hymns and chouses written out for them, which has helped them in the approved "Look and Say" method now used.

As in the case of Borroloola, it is certainly the Christians who lead the way as the foremost pupils, and we see in this the blessing attending the changed life, dispelling ignorance and vacant-mindedness and bringing in its train enlightenment and leadership.

News from the most Northern City

Hello! This is Darwin again, The Gateway to Australia! Our City is suffering the same fever of rapid wild expansion as the other Capital Cities. change we have witnessed since our arrival five years ago. Three new suburbs have been established: this necessitates three new Schools, which in turn means more opportunity, challenge and work for the missionary. The City itself is witnessing a new look. Modern shops are replacing the old. A large three storey Post Office will be opened in May. Extensive Departmental Offices are under construction. and a new High School is planned for the future.

We rejoice in that the Lord's work is advancing, too, not in the noise of bulldozers and concrete mixers, for the Spirit of God works in a quiet unassuming way.

Our work at the East Arm Leprosarium continues week after week. We are thankful to see the growth in the Christians. On Good Friday afternoon the church was filled as we combined with the C.M.S. and the M.O.M. in our service.

There is a feeling of expectancy as we hope the work will be consolidated as we seek to establish the Darwin Community Some weeks ago we Church. commenced paying rent for an 80 x 20 galvanised iron building. Since then a very kind and willing band of men have been giving their Saturdays to convert this building as the temporary meeting place of our church. We invite you to pray for this project. Much is needed to make this building presentable and usable. Our Mission House is now most inadequate to accommodate our Sunday School and evening congregations. With the spreading out of Darwin we travel about 25 miles each Sunday to pick up the scholars and return them home again.




