Democracy Betrayed

The Rise of the Surveillance Security State

WILLIAM W. KELLER

In the aftermath of 9/11, in lockstep with booming technological advancements, a new and more authoritarian form of governance is supplanting liberal democracy. The creation of the Security Industrial Complex—an "internal security state-within-the-state" fueled by tech companies, private security firms, and others to the tune of \$120 billion a year—is intruding on civil liberties to an extent never before seen in our history. Politicians tolerate it; the average citizen at times welcomes it, thinking it is the way to keep the homeland safe in a time of uncertainty and terrorism. But how real is this threat, and is it worth the loss of our individual privacy?

As a society, the author maintains, we have yet to comprehend the meaning of universal digital connection, its impact on our psychology, and its transformation of our government and society. America is at a crossroads in contending with our overreaction to terrorism, allowing the beginnings of a police state, and the erosion of our country from a "liberal democracy" to a "secure democracy"—one where government overreaches, tramples on civil liberties, and uses increasingly advanced technology to spy on the populace. Keller walks us through what these changes can mean to our society and, more importantly, what we can do to halt our march toward intrusive and widespread surveillance.

An urgent clarion call for a country in crisis, *Democracy Betrayed* is a timely and deeply important book about the future of America, especially as the country orients itself to a new president in early 2017.



What if the threat never ends? What if the 21st century ushered in a state of permanent emergency, together with enduring characteristics and manifestations of a Security Industrial Complex that thrives in the face of an acquiescent society? In the United States, that Complex is comprised of 17 agencies forming an "intelligence community," information technology companies, ubiquitous surveillance, and official as well as proprietary secrecy. The imposition of pervasive internal security is underway, and is now considered by many to be a necessary and legitimate function of government. In the contemporary era democracy is under assault from subversive intelligence agencies, which seek nothing less than an end to privacy and the annexation of the Internet. Western governments have generally responded to the threat of terrorism by creating secret programs and passing laws that impair privacy of individuals and generally exert a corrosive influence on the rights and freedoms of citizens in most liberal democratic nations. I call it Secure Democracy.



WILLIAM W. KELLER is a graduate of Princeton and Cornell Universities. He worked as a security analyst for the U.S. Congress for ten years, as executive director of the Center for International Studies at MIT, and as director of the Ridgway Center for International Security Studies at the University of Pittsburgh. He is currently a professor at the University of Georgia, where he serves as the director of the Center for International Trade and Security. He is the author of six books and has written extensively about the FBI, defense technology, the intelligence community, and the arms trade.

A Novel

SUSAN SHERMAN

Set in the early 1900s, the novel follows young Lucia Rutkowski who, thanks to the influence of her beloved grandmother, escapes the Warsaw ghetto and a life trapped in the textile mills to work as a kitchen maid in one of the wealthiest neighborhoods in the bustling city of Paris. Too talented for her lowly position, Lucia is thrown out on the street. Her only recourse is to take a job working for two disorganized, rather poor married scientists so distracted by their work that their house and young child are often neglected. Lucia soon bonds with her eccentric employers, watching as their work with radioactive materials grows increasingly noticed by the world, then rising to fame as the great Marie and Pierre Curie.

Soon, all of Paris is alit with the news of an impending visit from Eusapia Palladino, the world's most famous medium. Considered at the time to be its own science, spiritualism and the series of sittings offered by Palladino draws great interest from the Paris intelligentsia. It is through her now famous employers that Lucia attends Eusapia's gatherings and eventually falls under the medium's spell, leaving the Curie household to travel with her to Italy. Ultimately, Lucia is placed directly in the crosshairs of faith versus science—what is more real, the glowing substances of the Curie laboratory or the glowing visions that surround the medium during her séance? Lucia's journey will threaten her faith, her allegiance to the Curies, and her budding love with a muckraking journalist seeking to expose them all.

If You Are There is a thrilling, page-turning novel that draws upon real characters and events to detail its examination of a young woman torn between the beliefs she was born with and the scientific realities blooming all around her.



The Mezcal Rush

Explorations in Agave Country

GRANVILLE GREENE

In pursuit of the story behind a beguiling drink, Granville Greene embarks on a journey through remote Mexican highlands to learn about the history, cultures, and traditions surrounding mezcal. In recent years the smoky flavored agave distillate has become a craft cocktail darling, rivaling even its better-known cousin tequila, and it can sell for over \$100 a bottle in the U.S.

But unlike most high-end spirits, mezcals are typically produced by and for subsistence farming communities, where distillers have been swept up in a hot new trend in which they have very little voice. Greene visits indigenous villages in Oaxaca and Guerrero states, meeting maestros mezcaleros who create their signature small-batch drinks using local plants and artisanal production methods honed through generations of mezcal-making families. Here, the spirit is never mixed into cocktails and is instead consumed puro on special occasions, a liquid language that celebrates community identity along with the diverse characters of numerous agave species.

As Greene details the sights, smells, and intoxicating flavors of Mexico, he turns his eye to the broader context of impoverished villages in a changing economic and political landscape. He explores the gold-rush style surge of micro-distilled mezcals as luxury exports, and the consequent overharvesting that threatens the diversity of wild agaves, as he finds the oldest distilled spirit in the Americas at a crossroads.



A journalist's search for the soul of mezcal paints a picture of indigenous traditions at the edge of globalization's long shadow



Excerpt from The Mezcal Rush

He told me about some of the traditional rituals that are followed in the local fábricas. After the last shovelfuls of dirt have been heaped on top of an horno, a small cross is always stuck into the pile, in order to bless the agave baking below. When distilling begins, the first few drops to emerge from an alembique are thrown into the still fire as an offering. Each fábrica has a mythical "owner," and other rules must be followed to keep this being happy, or bad luck will follow. One edict was not to be greedy and ask for too much mezcal from a still. Another was that visitors must be offered some of the spirit to drink. Ciro generously presented me with a rare bottle of espadín mezcal. He had crafted it from some agaves that had been growing nearby. Instead of signing his name on the label, he'd made an ink thumbprint.



The Grass Flute Zen Master

What motivated Sodo-san to spend the last twenty years of his life in a "temple under the sky"— a corner of a public park where he taught passersby what it means to be forever young through the tunes he played on his grass flute?

In *The Grass Flute Zen Master: Sodo Yokoyama*, we are seeking not only a truer understanding of this well-loved monk, but of zazen, Zen meditation, itself. In his search for insights into Sodo Yokoyama's life, Arthur Braverman skillfully weaves a tapestry from seemingly disparate threads—the brief taisho period into which Sodo-san was born and where individualism shone; his teachers, both ancient and contemporary practitioners of Zen Bhuddism; the monk's love of baseball; and the similarities Braverman finds between Sodo-san and Walt Whitman, who both found the universal in nature.

Through conversations with Joko Shibata, Yokoyama's sole disciple, and careful study of his teacher's poetry, an intriguing tension between the personal and the universal is revealed. *The Grass Flute Zen Master* is a meditative examination not of just one life, but of many. The lineage of teacher and protégé is traced back through generations, contemporaries are drawn up from unexpected places, and Braverman examines his own long journey in Zen Buddhism; confronting his own expectations and surprising disappointments (the monk lived in a boarding house and later took a cab to his park when he could no longer walk the whole way) and the understanding and acceptance that followed. "When you play the leaf," Sodosan once wrote, "you'll usually be a little out of tune. That's where its very charm lies . . . "





Excerpt from A Train Through Time

In his speech Allende promises land reform and the nationalization of American copper companies in Chile. He's authoritative but warm—like a grandfather. As a physician, he has special credibility when he describes chronic malnutrition and promises free milk for children. He calls for good relations with Cuba, which would break its hemispheric isolation. This part of his platform especially infuriates the Nixon administration.

When Allende finishes, the cheers from the crowd are deafening. People around us jump up and down and shout, "El que no salta es momio. El que no salta es momio"—"He who doesn't jump is a mummy (reactionary)"—a demonstration of joyful support.

Jorge and I walk through the crowd filming heated discussions of the speech.

I've never been among such passionate, politically engaged people. They all seem to have read Marx, Lenin and Che Guevara. Allende is a Marxist democrat, which some consider a contradiction in terms. He calls for a "Chilean Way to socialism," a peaceful exit from imperialist exploitation. A campaign poster reads, "They took the copper and left us the holes," referring to the American copper companies that control much of Chile's most important natural resource.

I ask Jorge what he thinks about the speech and the crowd's reaction. He's 23 with long, curly hair and the facial features of a classical Greek statue. His German father fled the Holocaust; his mother is Chilean. He comes at night with a guitar to jam with other musicians at the house where we Americans in the crew are staying. Now he lowers the camera, looks around, and says, "If Allende wins, the Right won't give up without a struggle. What will happen to these people then?"






Born into Russian, transposed into Czech, then German, introduced to Hebrew, and finally adopted by English, Elena Lappin pens a moving memoir on the importance of language to who we are

Taking its title from a question often asked of polyglots, What Language Do I Dream In? is Elena Lappin's stunning memoir about how language runs throughout memory and family history to form identity. Lappin's life could be described as "five languages in search of an author," and as a multiple émigré, her decision to write in English was the result of many wanderings. Russian, Czech, German, Hebrew, and finally, English: each language is a link to a different piece of Lappin's rich family mosaic and the struggle to find a voice in a language not one's own.

From Europe to North America—and back again, via some of the twentieth century's most significant political upheavals—Lappin reconstructs the stories and secrets of her parents and grandparents with the tenderness of a novelist and the eye of a documentary filmmaker. The story of Lappin's identity is unexpectedly complicated by the discovery, in middle age, that her biological father was an American living in Russia. This revelation makes her question the very bedrock of her knowledge of her birth, and adds a surprising twist: suddenly, English may be more than the accidental "home in exile"—it is a language she may have been close to from the very beginning.

"English is not my mother tongue," writes Elena Lappin, "it is something more valuable: a language I was lucky enough to be able to choose." What Language Do I Dream In? is a wonderful, honest story about love, family, memory, and how they intertwine to form who we are.

Each is becoming unmoored in her own way: Ellie obliterates all feeling with alcohol and self-destructive acts of sexual promiscuity; Chloe pulls out patches of her hair and struggles to keep incipient mental illness at bay; changeable Rachel has fallen under the sway of a messianic boyfriend with whom she's agreed to live off-grid for a year in order to return to "health" and asks Ellie and Chloe to join them in "The Project." In a remote, rural house in the Ozarks, nearly undone by boredom and the brewing tension between them, each tries to solve the conundrum of being alive.

By turns funny, knowing and hauntingly sad, Lucky You delivers the kind of study in damage and detachment that made Mary Gaitskill's Bad Behavior or Joan Didion's Play It As It Lays so memorable. With startling exactitude and wickedly deadpan humor, it lays bare the emotional core of its characters with surgical precision. The writing is deft and controlled, as natural and unforced as breath which makes it impossible to look away.





Comprising 31 eclectic texts and 43 color images (from five photographers) *Spells* is that rare thing, a completely unique work of narrative fiction

Twenty years ago, while working as a security guard in an art museum, Peter Rock staved off the job's inherent boredom and loneliness by trying to make up a story for each photograph, painting, and object in the museum. A few years ago, reminded of the pleasures and play that he felt in danger of forgetting, he began to envision a similar project.

As he explains, "First, I found photographers whose work I was drawn to, and contacted them with a very hypothetical and tentative description of what I was doing. Next, I let these photographers know why I was drawn to their work, noted some images I really admired, and shared some of my previous writing with them. I asked them to send me 20–30 images; of these, I chose five at a time, and proceeded incrementally, generating the specific stories as I went.

"The images are not merely illustrations for a pre-existent story, then, but the conditions and possibilities and limitations of how they proceeded. The images came first. One way to think of it is that the stories herein, and the larger story they become, were already embedded in the photographs. My attention and intuition acted as a kind of excavation that brought them to the surface, into words."

The texts range from narrative to prose poem, from folktale to rant to reverie to an essay written by a fourth grader. The overarching story follows three friends who, shortly after graduating from high school, become entangled with an elderly widower who claims to have dreamt of one of them. The ensuing drama explores the relationship between dreams and waking life, between the head and the heart, between shadows and their bodies, between the living and the dead.

Excerpt from Field Recordings from the Inside

My younger brother had developed a phobia of listening to records played at the wrong speeds. We'd be listening to a 45 or an LP, and if I moved the RPM knob one way or the other and the song lurched into nasal, pinched hysteria or growled down to a menacing dirge, Paul would cover his ears, his eyes flashing. Sometimes he'd dash from the room, sometimes he'd cry. I can't claim largesse these many decades later, manfully acknowledging that I soothed my younger brother in his distress—once in a while I'd torture him, quickly switching a record to the wrong speed to see his (predictable) reaction. Older Sibling Job Description, maybe, but an unkind responsibility not without its trails of remorse. Inside of me: that a record could be insidious, that music has an interior darkness I didn't know about. Look what it can do.

Finks demonstrates how the good-versus-bad CIA is a false divide, and that the cultural Cold Warriors again and again used anti-Communism as a lever to spy relentlessly on leftists, and indeed writers of all political inclinations, and thereby pushed U.S. democracy a little closer to the Soviet model of the surveillance state.

Genet, Beckett, Burroughs, Miller, Ionesco, Oe, Duras. Harold Pinter, and Tom Stoppard. Hubert Selby Jr. and John Rechy. The legendary film *IAm Curious (Yellow)*. The books that assaulted the fort of propriety that was the United States in the 1950s and '60s, *Lady Chatterley's Lover* and *The Tropic of Cancer. The Evergreen Review*. But his unswerving dedication to publishing what he wanted made him one of the most influential publishers ever.

Rosset began work on his autobiography a decade before his death in 2012, and several publishers and a number of editors worked with him on the project. Now, at last, in his own words, we have a portrait of the man who reshaped how we think about language, literature—and sex. Here are the stories behind the filming of Norman Mailer's *Maidstone* and Samuel Beckett's *Film*; the battles with the U.S. government over *Tropic of Cancer* and much else; the search for Che's diaries; Rosset's romance with the expressionist painter Joan Mitchell, and more.





One day, an ordinary businessman goes out fishing with some friends in a small boat. Miles from land, the friends hear what they think is the screeching of gulls: but as they near the source of the sound they realize it is men, women, children—hundreds, of people, screaming for their lives in the open ocean.

The only optician on the island of Lampedusa in the Mediterranean is an ordinary man in his fifties, who used to be indifferent to the fate of the thousands of refugees landing on the coast of the Italian island. One day in the fall of 2013, the unimaginable scale of the tragedy became clear to him, and it changed him forever: as he was out boating with some friends, he encountered hundreds of men, women, and children drowning in the aftermath of a shipwreck. The optician and his seven friends managed to save 47 people (his boat was designed to hold ten people). All the others died. This is a poignant and unforgettable account about the awakening of conscience: more than that, it brings home the reality of an ongoing refugee crisis that has resulted in one of the most massive migrations in human history.

The Optician of Lampedusa rarely gives interviews. He is haunted by the tragedy. I asked him how that day on the sea changed him, and he looked me straight in the eye.

"Whenever I have a bad day," he said "I remember that I have a little house, a little family, that I have my little business. And I say to myself; you are not in the water."

This book is based on the true story of Carmine Menna, the Optician of Lampedusa.



In *The Lightkeepers*, we follow Miranda, a nature photographer who travels to the Farallon Islands, an exotic and dangerous archipelago off the coast of California, for a one-year residency capturing the landscape. The Lightkeepers upends the traditional structure of a mystery novel—an isolated environment, a limited group of characters who might not be trustworthy, a death that may or may not have been accidental, a balance of discovery and action—while also exploring wider themes of the natural world, the power of loss, and the nature of recovery. It is a luminous debut novel from a talented and provocative new writer.

Blood of the Oak takes a fresh view on the birth of the new American nation, suggesting that the "freedom" that became the centerpiece of the Revolution was uniquely American, rising not just from unprecedented political discourse but also from the extraordinary bond with the natural world experienced by frontier settlers and native tribes.



Auden and Alec Guinness have kept them as well, recording phrases or passages that struck them as wise or witty or quirky. The result is as much the self-portrait of a sensibility as it is a collection of miscellaneous delights. Renowned poet J. D. McClatchy has been keeping such a book for three decades now. This selection from it offers a unique look into what strange facts, what turns of mind or phrase, what glorious feats of language and nature can attract the attention of a poet.

The great and the obscure are gathered around the same table, exchanging remarkable opinions. Henry James is speaking of Venice: "The deposed, the defeated, the disenchanted, the wounded, or even only the bored, have seemed to find there something that no other place could give." At the other end of the table, Groucho Marx is playing drama critic: "I didn't like the play, but then I saw it under adverse circumstances—the curtain was up." Nietzsche and Flaubert, Dizzy Gillespie and Marianne Moore—dozens of unexpected and timeless aphorisms and anecdotes that pierce and provoke. Many of McClatchy's own observations about the art and prowess of writing are included as well.

This is a book meant to be sipped, not gulped; meant to be read at leisure and pondered on at length.



Acclaimed as both a poet and a novelist, Nicholas Christopher began publishing poems in *The New Yorker* in his early twenties. Since then, he has published eight poetry collections. He has been praised over the years, by poets and critics, as one of America's most important poets. Reviewing his selected poems, *Crossing the Equator*, the *Washington Post* wrote: "To read his richly honed and sensuous work, which has so much tensile strength, is to visit other worlds and then to return to our own disturbed by time, but also refreshed and reawakened."

On Jupiter Place is Christopher's first book since that collection, and its poems are among his most personal and intimate. A section of beautifully constructed lyric and narrative poems is followed by a series of twenty-one interconnected poems set in a Paris that is both real and nearly real. The title poem reads almost like a mini-autobiography of the poet's earliest experiences — his mother's near fatal illness, his subsequent life with his grandparents in a multiethnic working-class neighborhood, teeming with characters: a Holocaust survivor who resides next door to a former German-American Bund member, a flashy mobster raises his family across the street from a failing car salesman, a night nurse and a domineering widow. Other poems explore issues of travel, love, loss, death. There is a "notebook" that chronicles, by way of short poetry entries, the turbulent, reflective year after the poet's father dies, and a long poem in which we take a feminist look at Lois Lane as a cultural icon. As in all his poetry books, Christopher draws on his skills as a novelist to construct his long poems and to assemble the intricate sequences at the heart of this collection. As W.S. Merwin has written: "His poems are vibrant with light and the surprise of recognition. He shows us again and again the luminous nature of the familiar." On Jupiter Place is a rich, powerful collection from one of our premier poets.
