While I was in the South I went to Canberra for a week. I went to the university there and saw Rhys Jones and Betty Mechan. Rhys and Betty were living with the Anbara people at Kopanga and Lalagadjirripa for one year and they have many friends amongst the Burera people. Betty and Rhys were learning about the way the people were living, the kind of tucker they were living on and the ways they used to get their tucker. Two people who helped them a lot in their learning were Frank Guramanamana and Nancy Bundiana - they knew so much about their country and about the animales and plants that live there.

Betty and Rhys are now writing down everything they learned into a big story which will help everyone know about the way the saltwater people from the Blyth River live. The story will make sure that the great hunters, huntresses and

cance makers and spearmakers are not forgotten. The story will also tell something about the thoughts of Aboriginal people who don't want to live on a settlement but want to go back to their own country.

Many people in the South are very interested in what the story will have to say. There are many others places in the story - Manakodok, Adjirripa - Maganara, Rgalidjibara, Djunawanja, Indagandua.

Another place I went to while I was in Camberra was the Australian Institute of Aboriginal Studies. This is a place that gathers together all kinds of stories and information about Aboriginal people. They give noney to people like Betty and Rhys and Ad Borsboom(talung) who was learning about the Diinang people, so they can do their work. They also have a big collection of tools, dillytags, canoes, paintings and all kinds of things that Aboriginal people from all over

Australia make and use. They want these things to be kept forever so that they are not lost. Some of the things are very old and belonged to tribes that have been wired out - in many cases by the belands.


lending a helping hand to make an Aboriginal



Baby Josephine of nother Lena Djanaraigu and father Billy Marangiya died at Gulyun last Friday (11th) night.



Writer-Training Workshop



Can you read and write? (If you cannot, don't read any more of this; But are your parents literate? And all your relatives? Do they think it is a pity for anyone to be illiterate?

Your answers to these questions will depend on what society you

belong to and whether or not that society places value on literacy.

Because Aboriginal societies have not had any form of writing they have not readily given community value to literacy when it has been introduced. One of the best things we can do for them therefore is to help them develop a good attitude to it.

As a step in this direction the Summer Institute of Linguistics will be running a workshop for training Aborigines as authors next April and May, at its headquarters at Berrinah. Kathy Glasgow is arranging for Raymond Banticlu and Charlie Jartula to attend, and she will work with them under the guideance of consultant Jean Shand. The aim is to produce literature from within the culture written by members of that culture about things that interest Aborigines, in a style that is their own. The writing will be in the vernacular (Burada).

If this workshop is successful not only will these two flourish as authors but others will get the bug too, and with the advance of vernacular literacy through bilingual education, the community's respect for the printed

page will greatly increase.

COUNCIL MEETING

Meeting on the 22 January. Resolutions passed were:

1. That Town expansion plans be put off until the Land Rights commission was completed.

2. That the entry of Balandas be controlled by the council. Members expressed concern that people such as contractors and tourists were often arriving at Maningrida without any consultation with the council. The Community Advisor said he would take up the natter with the Department of Aboriginal Affairs, The companies concerned and Connair. He said the council should be the only su thority that should issue permits, and obviously this ruling was not being complied with.

3. That light and water be innediately installed in the new aboriginal houses which are being occupied without these facilities. The Community Advisor said he would look into the natter.

4. That the Housing Association be approached regarding the construction of houses for the Gunavidjis.

the Administrative Officer later advised the council that plans had been passed at the Housing Association neeting on the 4th September 1975 for Aunavidjis. The supply of services to the particular locality had been a considerable problem, but not an unsurmountable one.
