Anzac Day

Key Learning

Students will deepen their understanding of Anzac Day and the symbols and customs associated with this commemoration.

Discussion Questions

- 1. Briefly summarise the BtN story.
- 2. Anzac Day only pays tribute to the soldiers who fought at Gallipoli. True or False.
- 3. What do the letters A.N.Z.A.C. stand for?
- 4. How many people in Anzac's family have been given the name Anzac?
- 5. Which relative of Anzac's fought in the First World War?
- 6. When did WWI begin?
- 7. Why did Arthur Walker have to lie about being Aboriginal?
- 8. When did the Australian soldiers land at Gallipoli?
- 9. In which country is Gallipoli?
- 10. Have you ever attended an Anzac service? Briefly describe what it was like.

Activities

After watching the BtN story, hold a class discussion to find out what students know about Anzac Day. The following questions can help guide discussion:

What words do you associate with Anzac Day?



- What do the letters A N Z A C stand for?
- What is the importance of the landing at Gallipoli?
- When does Anzac Day occur?
- What happens on Anzac Day?
- Why is Anzac Day significant for Australians?

Ask students to write what they think is the meaning of each word (including unfamiliar words). Swap definitions with a partner and ask them to add to or change the definition. Check these against the dictionary definition.

Australia's involvement in war 1914 – 1918 First World War 1939 – 1945 Second World War 1962 – 1975 Vietnam War

Students create a timeline that highlights Australia's involvement in war over the last 100 years. Working in pairs, students answer the following questions:

- Why did Australia become involved in this war?
- What was the nature of the Australian involvement?
- What impact did this war have on Australia and its people?

Symbols and Customs of Anzac Day

Students will investigate the symbols and customs of Anzac Day. Look at the images and respond to the following questions:

• Do you recognise these symbols or customs? Name them.



- What do they mean?
- Research the significance of each symbol or custom and how they are used in Anzac Day ceremonies











As a class, listen to a recording of the Last Post https://www.awm.gov.au/commemoration/customs/last_post.asp . How did listening to the Last Post make you feel?

What does Anzac Day mean today?

Ask students to think about what Anzac Day means to them then share their thoughts with another student. Consider the following questions:

- Do you commemorate Anzac Day?
- Some people say Anzac Day glorifies war. Do you agree? Explain your answer.



- Do you think Anzac Day is important to Australia's identity? Explain your answer.
- What do you think Anzac Day will mean to young people in the future?

Record the main points of your discussion then share them with the rest of the class.

What do you understand more clearly since completing these activities?
