Present:

10 Councillors and 15 visitors.

Business: Dancing

Comp:

President asked men to get a team together for the dancing competition to be held at the school fete on 24/9/71. He was going to get his own team together. Others who might do so would be Paddy Fordham, Crusoe, John Godowa and Barney Beibananga.

Jambij Ceremony: President wanted to have Jambij ceremony at Milingimbi but a number of the participants were at Mangalala. It was too complicated trying to get people together for the ceremony.

KUNAPIPI:

The Balpanada Kunapipi was to finish next pay-day weekend. President asked if Superintendent could send a truck to Kojjan-jindidi on Friday p.m. after work to take participants and pick them up Sunday. Superintendent said okay.

Fish:

Some people wanted fish in the kitchen again. Superintendent said he would arrange with the Fisheries.

<u>Night-</u> Vatchmen: The Nightwatchman business had fallen apart. President said no use in trying to have the idea if there were not good men to be night-watchmen. It was up to the Councillors.

Boats:

Councillor Jolppa said he had been waiting too long for his boat. It had all been fixed up a long time ago but no boat yet.

Police House:

The Policemens' houses were going up but it would be at least another 7 months before they were finished. Cr. Good news for the Housing Association when Mr. Giese announced that the funds for Stage II had been cleared by the Minister. This amounts to \$30,000 and the Commonwealth Office of Aboriginal Affairs has been approached for \$30,000 to match it, as occurred with Stage I.

Mr. Giese also announced that the Minister had approved a \$15,500 loan for the Fisheries. This has not yet been funded but will be so in the near future.

A NEW RELEASE.

No single event in the whole history of Maningrida has stirred the muse as did the sad series of events on Monday, when Mrs. Armstrong failed to catch the Connair flight. The real causes have not yet been determined but messages of sympathy have been virtually flooding in. Sir 'Enry Bolte has offered to appoint a Royal Commission, and Mr. 'Awke has sent a telegram of sympathy and the Darwin warfies have offered to strike for 24 hours. Some cynics have claimed that it was part of a move by Connair to take over the ANSETT empire, but this seems to be a less likely cause. Others claim that a pilot found a schedule and followed it.

Still, what is Connair's loss is anothers gain and shortly after the family were up and away. Such a moving story, alack and als, I have been diverted as all I had to do was write the introduction. All our staff poets and artists have worked the theme for these results.

The Dorter

The Darter, or Snake-bird, is easily distinguished by its cormorant-like body, and the S-shaped neck. They frequent Northern lagoons and rivers of the Territory, but are also found in other parts of Australia. They are expert at stalking and spearing fish and other aquatic life underwater; they are the avian spearfishermen. To be able to use their finely-pointed bill as a spear, the eighth joint of their neck has a hinge-like mechanism, giving the neck and bill a spring-like reaction. Unlike most birds its plumage is permeable to water, so that after fishing it will often be seen perched with wings spread to dry them in the sun. If the plumage was not permeable, the bird would have great difficulty in submerging itself. Normally

darters perch and nest in trees above water, and in our area they breed from the middle of the Wet to about July.

Hr Nic Peterson (filmed a Kunapipi ceremony for the Institute of Aborig. affairs here a few weeks ago) is headed for David Gulpilil's birthplace MIRRINGATUA on the mainland S. of Elcho Is. to complete some research in Anthropology there. Nic. lived with the people there for a dry season a couple of years ago and among other things made a particular study of the diet and hunting habits of the people and the areas in which bush foods are found.

Also travelling in the East at present - the artist and bank painting cuthority Dr. Karel Kupka, who sends his best wishes to Bert, Bill and Brolga. Also Professor and Mrs. Berndt, well known writer on Aboriginal people, visiting old hounts.

The Land Board.

The N.T. Lands Board sat at Maningrida yesterday to hear lease applications lodged by the Maningrida Progress Association and Housing Association. The Progress Association is seeking leases over the areas occupied by the store, bakery, and Glen Bagshaw's house. It also wants leases over two vacant sites next to Bob Cross' for new staff houses. The Housing Association is seeking 14 blocks, including that occupied by the flats under construction near the Power House, and an area for Silas Roberts new house just down from Bob Cross' on the airstrip road.

The Bakery Opened.

The Maningrida Bakery was officially opened by Mr. Giese on Thursday afternoon. Speaking to a small, select audience, Mr. Giese said that it was the first commercial production bakery ever on an N.T. Settlement or Mission. He went on to say that he hoped in 5 or 10 years that it could be run and managed completely by aboriginal people. In concluding his remarks he said that it represented the culmination of an outstanding team effort by the people concerned. Mr. Ruper Kentish, MLC, who also spoke, said that he was very impressed by the advances which had taken place in Maningrida over the past three years.

After the opening ceremony, the official party inspected the interior of the bakery, which displayed a wide range of bakery products and included a demonstration of the slicing/wrapping machine, operated by Melanie.

The Great Time.

Yesterday an over-zealous cleaner set fire to the lime plantation just 1/2 an hour before Mr. Giese was due to visit Maningrida. 


