HOUSING:

The Progress Association is currently concerned in a 3-way housing complex -

a. The houses for our builder, Mr. Cross, and the Baker, are to hand, the site cleared and an early start on erecting is anticipated. Housing is never cheap in the Territory, but we expect to halve the normal costs of a similar type dwelling.

b. The Housing Association dwellings as per grant from Aboriginal Benefits Trust and Office of Aboriginal Affairs.

The legal details of Incorporation are satisfactorily under way - see N.T. News 15/1/71. A Mr. Sattele has been employed and will arrive at Maningrida late March. A second builder is currently being sought for this project. Plans and specifications are completed and are awaiting the Administrator's approval.

Self Help Housing. In the absence of a settlement carpenter, the Progress Association has, at the request of the Council, undertaken the task of building 30 units. The Association does not profit in any way from this venture, nor does it expend significant sums of money on it.


The Association has not at any time adopted a sales policy; the requests for these units far outnumber our ability to erect them, and the waiting list is a long one.





YOUNGER SE
