

An important visit was made this week to the Gunwinggu country

near the headwaters of the Mann River. The reason for the trip was to locate and mark on a map the sacred sites in the area held under as Prospecting Authority by McIntyre Mines.

Three Gunwinggu elders, Peter Maralwanga, Anchor Gulunba and Mick Mandaingu were accompanied by Council President Tom Yibberal, and by Ted Evans and Les Fenhall of Headquarters. They were very lucky that McIntyre Mines surveyor Bill Bates and his assistant, Stephen Garwulgu, were also able to go along in the Company's Toyota which was fitted with a winch.

The country visited is a huge valley surrounded by the escarpment or "stone country" and through which the headwaters of the Mann River flow. The Gunwinggu name for the general area is Mirrbindarra, which is also the name of the Mann River at that point. It is Dua country.

Three important sites were pointed out by the three elders and which must not be disturbed by the mining company. These are:-

- DALAIBUNG A spring in the heart of a jungle at the foot of the escarpment. The source of the spring is a clear pool some six feet in diameter and about four feet deep. This water is very dangerous and should not be drunk. It is the dreaming of the poisonous brown snake DARRBI who resides in the water-hole.
- NAGORRDIL & GAIDPA. These are two Old Men of the Dreamtime who now live in tall twin tors or peaks of sandstone about 100 feet high. They are brothers and are of the GELA skin. Inside a ravine behind them are two smaller peaks which are their wives GARLA & MAIDAPIA respectively. These women are of the BALAINDJAN skin. On Gaidpa are to be found some ancient rock paintings.
- GARGUNDUMNORRMI. This is the particular name for the site.

  Another, and perhaps easier, more general, name is NANDARAIYU. This name also includes sites 1 and 2. Gargundumnorrmi is a large gently sloping rock face which is known
  by geologists as an anticline. In it live two poisonous
  snakes BURRG (something like a Deaf Adder) and DARRBI
  (a brown snake the same as

(a brown snake, the same as in Dalaibung). In the Dreamtime, these two snakes fought, and Burrg won. However they afterwards made up their quarrel and now live peacefully in the rock. A groove about eight inches wide, three inches deep and eight feet long is the scene of their tracks and struggles.

An interesting link between
sites 2 and 3 is that Nagorrdil and
Gaidpa are watching over Gargundumnorrmi to ensure that no unauthorized persons go on to the Snakes'

resting place.

All three sites belong to the Dua moiety, but no men of the Dua moiety must so right to the important part of each site. Yiritja men may go right on to the sites, but only with the permission of Dua men. Women of either moiety must not go on to any of the sites.

As Bill Bates was with the party, the mining company now know exactly where these sites are. They will be marked on a map and the Head Office of the Company will also be told where they are and that they must not be disturbed inany way.

#### ANOTHER KIND OF DANCING

6. Members of the Maningrida Progress Association Board and the Mobile Works Force and their immediate families were mineligible.


7. Entries close 28.7.71 - entries to be lodged with the Editor.

At a necting held in Darwin recently, a new and much better basis was worked out for the groups who are involved in FAM (the first aboriginal mining company.)

Goulburn Island and Maningrida will form one company - they are joint holders of areas. Milinginbi, Oenpelli and Croker Island will each have their own company. Each company will be autonomous - (be its own boss) - and will operate its own area, without any direction from other groups.

FAM will be formed as a consultative (sharing ideas), advisory, (i.e. sacred sites) and joint publicity (giving news to papers etc.) body. All the agreements have been signed and have changed hands. They have been approved by the Welfare Branch. Information on the sharing of royalties among the groups is given elsewhere.

Birdwatcher

Many people have asked me over the last few weeks what the little grey birds with a black head, to be observed outside the government store, are called. They are white-breasted wood swallows, and feed on insects caught on the wing. They are expert acrobatic flyers. You will nearly always find them on the power lines outside the store, for they use this perch as a base from which to fly off, catch insects, and return. You may be interested to know that wood swallows have the peculiar habit of cuddling together in a very closely packed bunch at night time when they roost. They are at Maningrida all year round, but are not very common inland. They breed in November and December.
