MEW COUN Mr. President asked for councillors to vote on accept-

into the Council. Both were unanimously accepted.

NEW BUS-

Mrs. Neale addressed Council and outlined her proposals for promoting Aboriginal culture at the Maningrida School. Her particular interest was painting and weaving and she wants permission and guidance from the Council as to how best to introduce these subjects to both boys and girls in the higher grades. She wanted permission from the Council to allow the girls to learn to paint on bark.

The Council had no objections and agreed the idea was a good one.

Mrs. Neale asked for suggestions as to who would be the best teacher of the painting; she needed a person who had good English.

LETTERS:

A letter was read by Advisor to Council from the Director of Welfare. It talked about there may be hew law made giving Legislative Council people the right to come onto Aboriginal Reserves whenever they liked, and no permit needed. Does Council think this is a good law or a bad one?

Some members thought it was a good idea, but Mr. President asked the Council to think about it and to vote on it next week.

Another letter read from the Advisory Committee telling people about 3 empty seats on Committee and they want suggestions from aboriginal people to fill the empty seats. Suggestions have to be in Darwin by 8th May 1972.

Letter from Mr. Gordon Bryant M.P. of Federal Council for Advancement of Aboriginal and Tores Strait Is. asking for people from Maningrida to attend 15th Annual Conference in Alice Springs over Easter. No money available to send a man but suggested sending a telegram giving our support.

A fourth letter read to Council from Welfare telling us that a Company had applied for Prospecting Licence to an area around the Stone country. Part of the area has already been taken up by M.P.A. Mr. Bagshaw has written a letter of objection, and Council is to write a letter too.

MARKING OF Cr. Fordham was afreid for the many traditional sites

SACRED around the stone country. President said that names should be put on sites so that everybody knows.

Advisor said it would take six months to name all the sites but it was a good idea. Maybe when a full time Patrol Officer comes to Maningrida it could be done.

The Agreement between the Company and the Progress Association is being drawn up and should be to hand next week. In it the Progress Assoc. will undertake to provide over the next 5 years

- a. Money for capital expenditure on equipment such as irrigation equipment, tractor, tools, etc. a sum not exceeding \$15,000
- b. The services of a competent horticulturalist (a gardener).
- c. Donate book-keeping and accounting services.
- d. Will share the profits in due course with the company on a 50/50 basis after the operating costs have been met.

How is it that the Progress Association can provide thousands of dollars to help the Garden ? From moneys paid by the mining men .

IMPORTANT - 50¢ Subscriptions Due To M.P.A.

The Annual membership Subsription of the H.P.A. is due , immediately due. The Association has decided to fix the Sub. at the minimum 50cents as prescribed by the law. (\$2 is the max.) The Sub. is applicable to all persons, European and Aboriginal, who buy from the Store, Bakery , Gardens etc.

Last year we did not receive the support demanded by the Ordinance and we cannot afford to offend again; our eligibility for tax exemptions will be jeap-ardised if greatly increased support is not forthcoming.

Your urgent co-operation is sought. Please pay your 50 cents at the earliest opportunity. We don't make the laws but we have to observe them. Husband and wife = 2 people. They have to pay 5\$1.

SCHOOL NOTES



If anyone was to look at the way in which palms and trees grow you would see that the life of a tree is on the surface and the life of the palm is deep all the way through.

Should you make a cut through the bark and around the trunk of a tree the life stops flowing and the tree dies. But if you make the same cut around the palm trunk the palm does not die but continues to live and grow.

You night say that although a tree looks good, healthy and strong its life is only shallow and on the outside; but with a palm the life and goodness runs deep right through, it is all goodness.

I am hoping that you boys and girls may learn something from this story. I am hoping that each boy and girl will learn to grow a goodness inside them that is deep, strong, everlasting and not easily affected by the bad temptations that will come your way. I hope this thought will help you children to always do your best for school, for home and for Maningrids.

For four weeks, commencing 5th April, we are to have two preschool teachers in training staying at Maningrida who will be working at our pre-school during this time. I hope all will do their best for these two ladies in assisting them to adjust to the life and culture of an Aboriginal settlement.

I have recently received a letter from Mr. Kevin Davis, the new principal of Kornilda College. He has told no of the importance of each Maningrida boy and girl being sent letters from here. Would all relatives and friends of our children please try hard and regularly write letters to them at Kornilda College. Paper, envelopes and stamps may be bought from the shop and the address is —

If parents would like photographs of themselves or their homes to send to these Kormilda children I.an willing to help.

Also, each Meningrida boy and girl at Kornilda College nust have \$15 each term to use as pocket money. The safest way to send this noney is for you parents to bring the money to me at school and I will arrange for a bank cheque to be sent.

In his younger days Dick was huntingover near Rolling Bay on one occasion and was about to cross a creek. Everything seemed to be o.k. but when he got into the water the mud stirred and a lurking crocodile made a dive at his leg. The croc. grabbed him but Dick managed to get away. He carried scars there to the end. He was the "boss" or chief guardian of the territory which ranges from the old 'Wet garbage jetty' up to a point this side of Bat Island.
