working in the sawmill.

Superintendent said that self-help house building could start again now that Forestry were able to supply timber from the mill. President asked if lights could be provided in the self-help houses. Superintendent said that it was HOUSES: possible to wire the houses but there were no power poles to connect them to. President asked if street lighting could be provided then. Superintendent said same problem.

ROADS: Cr. Gangalara said that Michael Burrulbuma and Jack Banbiaga would start clearing the Bamboo Creek road after they had taken the morningstar to Oenpelli. It was felt that the plains country might be too wet to get to Kapanga. Harry Mulumbuk to be consulted.

Jirrkala's fish-trap next week. FISH Yiriyin reported that a start might be made on Willie TRAP: Jirrkala's fish-trap next week. It would be near the Gabaljara Creek. It was also hoped to start some trepang business next Tuesday.

Council authorised the purchase of a bus, about 40 passenger, with funds to be provided by a loan from the Maningrida Club. The bus was to be used to replace motor-trucks for BUS: week-end excursions, school bus runs, and a commuter link with out-stations at Cadell Gardens and Guiyun.

HOUSING: Superintendent asked Council to think about the housing needs of the people at Maningrida. He wanted to find out what sort of houses people wanted, and what they wanted to see in them. He asked that the matter be discussed next week, after Councillors had a chance to talk in their villages.

Sister Ena has returned from leave looking very refreshed and well. Ena says "During the last 3 weeks I was working in the cafe (sister's) at Tennant Creek. I peeled 1000's of potatoes, washed 100's of dishes, and washed down 10's of tables."

Mrs. Val Purdie, wife of Brian, arrived on Tuesday. has been in England, her home country, for the past 6 months.

Mrs. Jan Croft is now teaching at Warrabri. During the first term, she was at Anthony's Lagoon.

DEATH: On Thursday, Paddy Anbei-rala, who had been suffering for some time from incurable cancer. We offer our condolences to his wife, Mary Dulgid and only brother, Jimmy Bulorrgna. The deceased had returned to Maningrida a few months ago after having spent a long time in nespitel.

I went to school at Milingimbi Mission when I was a little boy. My father said to me "Son, we are going to stay here for five weeks, then we will move to maningrida." That was in 1961. I said "Okay, Father. I take your

words."

After five weeks we went to Gadji Creek. We stayed there for 10 weeks and then went back to bilingimbi again. I went back to school. We stay ed there for a long time - for three years. I was in grade two class: My teacher was a woman.

After three years, my father said "Hey, son, you have to tell your teacher 'We are all going away to maningrida.' I asked "Why are we going there," I'd like to stay here for school, because I'm thinking that there is no school over there at maningrida. " my father said "Lont worry about the school Soon they will make a school house and you will start going to school! I asked him "Hey, father, how long are we going to maningrida for? " e said I don't know son how long it will take to go to maningrida , we don't know the road. Otherwise we may make a mistake half way. I think that we should stop here and wait for the people. "e will follow them. They know the maningrida road." So we started and had sleep helf way.

"Where are you people going?" We said "We are going to Maningrida but we have made a mistake about the road." He said "You are on the right road. Just come with me, and I will take you on the right way. I've been there at Maningrida for a long time."

That was in the afternoon. My father said to the man "Would you mind please sitting down here until the sun goes down. Because I get hot."

The man said "Okay, if you want to. Then we sat down in the shade. We made tea and flour brought from Milingimbi. Then my father gave some to the man. He made his own. My father asked him about the people at Maningrida "Hey nan, how many people are there at Laningrida?" He said, "Only just a few."

Then in 1962 they built a school house. My father said, "Hey son, your school has been built already. That was what you were always worrying for. I will stay with you here for many years until we see a big sity in this place."

I went to the school from 1963. My teacher was a woman and there was a teaching assistant. I have forgotten their names. After 1964 I went to work for the R.A.A.F. for 3 wonths. After that I went to the office and spoke to the boss, "Hey boss, I'd like to go back to Maningridad because I don't like it here." He said to me, "O.K. George. You will go tomorrow morning." I said to him, "Thankyou very much boss."

When I came back from the R.A.A.F. I started work with Mr. Ton Newal at the store. When I finished work with Ton, Mr. Jimmy Pascoe asked me to work at the school. I said," O.K. Jim, but I'd like to ask Mr. J. Hunter about work at the school." Next morning I went to the office. I saw Mr. J. Hunter. I said to him, "Hey John, I'd like to work at the school. He said, "O.k. George but listen to me. You have to get clean shorts and shirt and trousers." I said, "Yes I have them already." He said to me, "O.K. you can go and work as a teaching assistant." I started work at the school from 1967 to 1972. I've been working here as a teaching assistant for a long time and I didn't move to other jobs. I am still working in the school. Many children I have been teaching here at the Maningrida school.

Some other teaching assistants were second to me, but I am second to Mr. Jin Pascoe. We work in the school, both of us. A long time ago our head master was Mr. J. Haigh. Then Mr. P. Williams endthen Mr. D. Hassal. There was another man, I don't know his name, from New Caledonia. He was a good Head Master too. He stayed here for I month, then went back to New Caledonia. I know how to work in the Education Programme.

Some members of the community are under the impression that because this is Maningrida, and not Darwin, certain laws in relation to traffic and vehicles will not be enforced. I do not like to see people disillusioned and the following hints are for the road users in the area. Some very sound advice. Take the hint. Harry Cox.

Under the Traffic Ordinance and Motor Vehicles Ordinance 'HUBLIC STREET' MEANS any street, road, lane, thoroughfare, footpath or place open to, or used by, the public and includes a road on land leased under the Special Purpose Lease Ordinance 1953-1954 for use as a road.

TRAFFIC ORLINANCE.

Motor Cycles.

- Section 3I (I) No more than one person, in addition to the driver, shall be carried or any motor cycle nor shall any such person, be so carried otherwise than sitting astride the cycle behind the driver's seat.
 - (2) Any person driving or being carried on a motor cycle or in a side-car attached to a motor cycle shall wear, securely fastened to his (or her) head a protective helmet of a type approved by the Administrator in Council.
 - A driver shall not permit or suffer any person to be (3) carried on his motor cycle, or in a side-car attached to his motor cycle, in contravention of this section.
- Traffic 43 (I) Regulation
- A motorcycle shall not be used upon a public street for the carriage of more than one person in addition to the driver.
 - (2) A motor cycle shall not be used upon a public street for the carriage of one person in addition to the driver unless-
 - The notor cycle is provided with footrests and a seatt (a)
 - Such person is sitting astride the motorcycle on the. (b) propers seat and is facing forward and is using the footrests;
 - (c) The operator has held a motorcycle rider's licence (including) a libence granted under the law in force in a place outside th. N.T. for at least I2 months.

Bicycles.

- Section I3.
- A person shall not, upon a public street, ride a bicycle which has not affixed thereto on some convenient part-(a) an efficient approved brake; and
- (b) a bell or other efficient appliance for giving werning of it's approach.
- Section 44.
- A person shall not ride upon a public street at anytine between sunset and sumise, a bicycle which has not .. a lighted lamp attached to the front to show a bright white light clearly visible to any person approaching the bicycle from the front; and (b) a lighted lamp at tuched to the rear to show a bright red light clearly vis ble to any person approaching the bicycle from the rear or a red reflector.

Therefor if a bicycle is ridden after sundown there must be a white light at the front and a red light or reflector at the rear of the bicycle.

MOTOR VEHICLES ORLINANCE.

- Section 47 (1) a person shall not use, or cause, suffer or permit any other person to use, a motor vehicle on a public street unless there is in force in relation to the use of the vehicle by that person, or that other person, as the case maybe, a third party policy.
- Section GO7 (I) A person shall not drive an unregistered motor vehicle upon a public street.

All vehicles are therefore to be registered and covered by third party insurance. Motor vehicle includes motor cycle or any trailer attached to a motor vehicle.

Section II4

A person shall not;
(a) drive a motor vehicle upon a public street without being licenced so to do.

(b) employ or permit any unlicenced person to drive a motor vehicle upon a public street.

I would like to draw your attention to Section I25 of the Motor Vehicle Ordinance which states. Lach member of the Police Force shall do all things in his power to ensure that this Ordinance is duly observed.

MOTOR VEHICLES (THIRD PARTY INSURANCE) REGULATIONS.

Wherethe amount of a premium paid in respect of a third party policy has been determined by reason of the use of the insured motor vehicle for a particular purpose or purposes specified in one of the premium classifications, the motor vehicle shall not be used for any other purpose unless the authorised insurer has been notified of the intention to use the motor vehicle for that other purpose and the third party policy has been suitably endorsed by the authorised insurer.

(2) The owner of a motor vehicle who uses or who suffers, causes or permits the motor vehicle to be used in contravention of the last prece ing sub-regulation shall be guilty of an offence.



Operating on

On Tuesday the 6th. June, the Fisheries vehicle with John Lake (Branch Lirector), Billy Yirinyin, Ray Munyal, Maurice, Robert and myself set off for Proffesor Harry Messell's camp on the Goyder River, 10 miles north of the Gove Road Crossing.



A good run down the Bulman Track in the wake of the intreptd road clearing wartet, plenty of wild life and an encounter with a buffaloe I2 miles north of the Gove turnoff(might be Jack Gardners friend), made it a reasonable daylight run. Not withstanding fuel pump, distributor, carburetor malfunctions and a bit of fan belt trouble, a small swamp 4 miles west of the Goyder Crossing was reached at midnight and as it was becoming difficult to pick out some of the track (s) we made camp there.

Prop. Messell's party had been the first vehicles through and 4 toyotas and trailers had blased most of the run pretty well, except for odd detours around small swamps. Ticket holders had their beer and fish, and your correspondents enjoyed 90% . Proof skeep.

Prof. Messell's is head of the Physics Lepartment of the University of Sydney. He is working in conjuction with the Dept. of Zoology. The main sims of the expedition was to establish:

(I) bistribution.

(2) Behaviour.

(3) Relationship between salt and fresh water crocodiles and to try and establish denarcation lines between the two species, and where they occur together, find out if the salties are transitions or are permanently bassed in the billabongs and head waters of the rivers.

(4) Biology of the species and physiology of main interest being the ability to change the metabolism (pulse rates, temperature, etc.)

apart from the more formal methods of invest gation (toxonomyetc.) the Prof. has had a minute radio transmitter developed which can be inserted into the body of the crocodiles to monitor temperature, pulse rate etc. The same transmitter will be used to 'home' on crocodiles by fairly conventional direction finding methods.

The big problem of course, is to capture the crocodiles without doing my phy sical harm to them. A variety of e uipment has been developed for this purpose (too numerous to mention here). It was to first time billy and Co. (or any of us) had been into that country and Ra, and some interesting stories to tell about the old days. The people from that area were Rembaranga (Jimba?) and for many years there had been trouble between the Jinang (ARA FURA Swamp Country), People and the Jimba people. At about that time the first European travelled into the area (Loctor L. Thompson) there was a very big war which according to Ray wiped out the few remaining Jimba people. From that time, there has been no real occuptation of the Goyder River area upper reaches.

(An interesting footnote is that Feddy Fordham came to see me and told me that 'that place' is his country, but the ensueing discussion did not reveal any tangible boundries.)

Billy andRay were able to tell people at Maningrida about what was going on and they were both happy about what was being done and the way the Prof. and his party are treating the area. As it happens the few 'special' places that Ray knows about were a good way away from where the party is, and will be operating.

Keith Brocklesby (Communications Expert) Dean Stephans (N.T.A. Wildlife Office)
Bob (cook and a very good camp setter uppher) Lyndszy, Mechanic and Instrument
maker, and last but not least and attractive female Tech. Assistant to Gordon.
Prof. Messel's wife will be joing the party shortly.

Some (albeit short) friendships were established and stories songs and good discussions between Billy and Ray and the party made for a couple of nemorable evenings for all. Neelless to say the tape recorders worked overtime.

Monster at Maningrida i

An extraording report has reached the Mirage of two local Maningrida residents having again sighted the fabled Maningrida monster in the bay near the mouth of the Gudjerana Creek.

This strange sea creature, which to date defies description, has not been seen in the area for a number of years. Positive identification has never yet been made due to the clusive and nocturnal nature of the amphibian. A number of noted marine biologists and other scientists have attempted to sort out the mystery, but as none of them has actually ever seen the creature they are all understandably sceptical about the whole situation and no official comment

of the animal appearing above the disturbance.

oreathre they are all understandarly sceptical about the whole situation and no official comment has been made.

On this present occas ion, the two men were fishing when a tremendous disturbance occurred in the area about three-Quarters of a mile distant. It was first noticed as a wide area of boiling frothing water followed by sections.

Egrets, terms and other water birds for a radius of hundreds of yards were frightened into the air.

As in most earlier sightings, the disturbance was accompained with a characteristic sustained high pitched meaning, a cross between the howl of a dingo and a bellowing elephant.

It was a not possible to ascertain the creature's exact colour except that it was generally dark, but there appeared to be glistening sections as the sun was being reflected from incredibly large metallic-like scales.

As fentastic asit seemed then and does now in retrospect, it was felt by the two fishermen, that the treatures head, if it could be called that, was in fact in three sections, almost similar to the sections on a three_hhaded propeller with all parts being centrally attached to the body.

It was thought that the length of the serpentine animal could have been in excess of one hundred feet. However, the men felt that due to the amount of disturbance caused by the creatures thrashing about that the length may have been a more conservative fifty to sixty feet. It was not possible to guess the thickness of the body.

This eminently intriguing mystery was evident on this occasion for about 15 to 20 minutes before it finally subsided.

Over the years since the equatic beast was first sighted by the early settlers, including Manson, Urey, Thomkinson and Turley (who all made reports) much deep conjecture has arisen over the nature of the phenomenon.

Maningrida residents are sincerely urged to continue watching for further sightings and immediately report anything unusual such as the unexplain behaviour as described above. It would be of singular assistance to have clear photographs of any such manifestations.

heanwhile it is felt that no harm should arise about the matter, as over the years it has become clearly evident that by its behaviour this monstrous living being always remains well away from habitation and immediately takes evasive action when anyone comes in close proximity.
