The Council Minutes.

At the Council Meeting on Monday night 11 Councillors were present and $^{M}\mathbf{r}$. Jimmy $^{P}\mathbf{ascoe}$ Matjiri was elected Secretary.

Cemeter:

Councillor Jack John said that his tribe had met and agreed not to remove the bones.

Cr. Munyal = The Jinang people have a lot of dead there but they haven't taken the bones.

Other Councillors hadn't received an answer from their people.

House.

Cr. Riala - Kitty Walamba has asked about her house now that her husband is dead. She has T.B. and will not be back from hospital for a couple of months.

President - She is a widow and has children, so she will be able to stay in the same house.

Cr. Riala asked about the building of more houses (self help) Supt. - Timber should be available from the sawmill soon and building would begin in August.

- Working time. Cr. Riala said that a number of people did not work their full hours in a day, at their job. They should.
- Uniforms. Cr. Munyal- Council uniforms are 2 years old and are wearing out. If any Councillor wants a new one, see me at the office.
- Office jobs. Cr.Riala Why aren't Aboriginal people working in the office?
 Supt We are waiting for some one to come from High School.
- Company Boat. Cr. Riala said that he had been stopped from using his boat last aturday. He did not think that anyone could be stopped from using his own boat.

 Supt.-Fair enough, but there is more than that to the story.

 Every person is responsible for the safety of others. If a man is going to use his boat, it's his responsibility to see that it is not overlooded. This was the trouble on Saturday.
- In and Board. The Supt. read aletter to Council asking for the opinion of Maningrida people about the Gunavidji application for a lease at Juda Point. Did anyone object to the application and if so, what were their reasons. Hadall the Junavidji people put their names on the list or had some been left off? He suggested that Councillors meet with the Gunavidji people before the next Lands Board meeting. Have the Council considered that Juda Point is a popular picnic spot? Do some Gunavidji people intend to live at Juda Point and look after their country? Are the Gunavidji intending to press on with with their idea of running a fishing and trepang business there? He asked the Council to nominate two members for the Lands Board hearing of the Gunavidji application.

 Jim Pascoe and Cr. Riala were appointed.
 - Adult Literacy. The Superintendent said that a meeting to start an Adult Literacy class would be held in the Libraty after the Council meeting. Applications from four Councillors to join the class would be accepted.

Councillors applying were Jack John, Jack Riala, John Balaiya and George Gunjibala.

On Sunday the Gunwinggu tractor took us to Waragala-gonora. When we got there, we saw a bush fire - Wayne's father had made a big fire to hunt a kangaroo. Then the tractor stopped and the three boys jumped off the tractor and they went walking to Nangark. They were three Gongorogonie boys, Dean, Gerard and Wayne.

Then we went close up to the little river covered by the thick trees where the flying foxes were. When we got off the tractor we saw thousands of flying foxes flying everywhere, because the flying foxes heard the noise of the tractor engine and started to fly around us and back to their place. to their place.

Some men took their shot guns and bags ready. They went into the river to shoot a flying fox down. We made a big fire for them. At 2pm the three boys came back with a leg of kangaroo and fresh water turtle. We gave them some water to drink because they had come a long way from We gave them some flying fox and sugar bag.

At 3pm all the men came out of the thick trees with bags of flying foxes. We cooked and ate some, and we took some back home for people at the Settlement. At 4pm we started to come back to settlement, and somebody said to Solomon, "There's no room here!" Then he jumped off the tractor and went walking. His father jumped off and went walking with Solomon. Some of the children were calling out to Mickey (Solomon's father) "Come on Mickey, Solomon is beating you." He tried hard to walk, but his legs were stiff. So he walked slowly and he got on to the tractor, but his son came first up to the hill and waited for a lift back on the tractor. It was getting dark, half way between Waragala-gonora and Nabolojda, and we arrived at the settlement at 6pm.

Dr. Joseph Lee the dentist has been filling teeth and pulling them out in many places in the N.T. He has worked in Alice Springs, Tennant Creek and Katherine, and on several outback stations. Sometimes they had to call at two or three stations in one day. Just before coming out here, he was at the Nightcliff Clinic where his nurse was former Maningridian, Mrs Heather Mason.

His nurse here is Mrs Jan Falvey. Her husband works with Primary Industries Branch.

Somehow or other the dentists' chair wasn't sent with the equipment, so they have had to use a kind of psychiatrist's couch/ hospital bed. Its quite relaxing for the patients!
