Saturday Twilight - private BBQ for visitors - after this the dancing in earnest will begin. The location is the area in front of the Craft Shop bounded by the Government Store and Ron Berryman's house. Ray Munyal and a team of helpers are erecting shelters and preparing the dancing ground and the electronics. We hope many many Maningrida people will join in and show their dances to the visitors and that the young people - boys and girls - will join in with their countrymen and countrywomen. We also hope that the young Aboriginal people will look at people like Lolly Laiwanga and David Blanasi and think about keeping their own dancing and singing as strong as these men.

We also ask all the balanda people of Maningrida to come along - especially Saturday night which should be a rare opportunity to see a large number of the N.T's finest dancers in the one place at the same time.

SUNDAY: The visitors will be taken on a guided tour of Cadell Gardens and outlying areas.

Afternoon or twilight there might be another basketball game - this will be notified. After church service, the usual Saturday film will be shown.

A Recreation Officer?

Mr. Bob Phillips (Youth Welfare Officer) and Mr. Bruce McKenzie (Exec. Director Y.M.C.A. in Darwin) came to Maningrida to meet people interested in exploring the possibilies of employing a professional youth activities officer. This officer could survey the needs in the community and draw up a program (maybe for 3 years) and encourage local voluntary sporting leaders to participate.

The meeting decided to write to the Assist. - Administrator Welfare re either

- (a) The appointment of a full time Govt. recreation officer.
- or (b) A subsidy arrangement to employ a full time rec. officer and two Aboriginal assistants.

Mr. McKenzie said that the National Y.M.C.A. felt a responsibility to serve Aboriginal communities when invited to do so. G^{H}

Dancing men: Mr. Dan Gillespie "The dancing teams areccoming on Friday of this week. They will come from Elcho, Goulburn Is.,
Bamyili, Milingimbi, and Oenpelli." He asked if the Councillors would prepare the dancing ground.

Cards.

Cr. Riala' We have talked about the business of playing cards over the last 3 or 4 weeks. He had asked the Village Councillors not to play cards on work days, but during weekends.

Cr. Munyal said that on every mission and settlement' they still do playing cards but we Aborigines here are finding it hard.

President said we can play maybe for 20c, 40c, or \$2 but not going on , playing with the rest of our money.

Cr. Munyal "What we talk about here, will go to the Mirage and the Maningrida Mirage can be sent around the village, so that people can read what we talked about."

Const. Harry Cox "The policeman does not make laws about playing cards, but the people in Darwin, the egislative Coun cil makes the law, men like Mr. Kentish and Mr. Chaney. If you want to play cards, you can call on the people who represent you, so that they can change the law. As I said, do not make the law, but I go by the law of the government.

The law also says that if I see cards and money, I

can take the people who are playing to court. At Bagot the people do not keep on playing cards when the policeman drives through.

Cr. Riala: The cards can't be stopped. I've seen everywhere when I was at Elcho Is. and Goulburn Is. - I saw people playing cards. but no-one stopped them.

The law can't change, the law can't say 'Put cards away'. Maybe another law will say 'Put cards away, then they will be put away. We learned to play cards from the Europeans. The Government hasn't put the cards away yet, so we will still play.

Supt. It is gambling that's against the law, not playing cards

Cr. Riala: What about racing? Balandas put big money on that. Why is it different from cards?

Cr. Yiriyin: Maybr people play cards because they haven't got enough money.

President: Gambling is a law and can put you in jail. He said that he had lost his money, about 4 or 5 dollars. "I know how you people are worrying about the cards. The people here blame the Council and the police, but they don't blame themsclves. They bring the cards from Darwin.

Const. Harry Cox: The only way to stop the people playing cards is to remove the cards

Cr. Riala: Why don't we write to the Government. We will ask what they think. Will they change the law for Aborigines?

President: Sometimes people come to the office to the Suptasking about the money, because they have lost their money at cards.


Cr. Riala: The Government can change the law so that there'll be no cards anywhere - not just mm at Maningrida.

Cr. Balaya: It is best if we can ask the Government to change the law . No cards.

President. People are hiding in the bushes playing cards.

Const. Cox: The best way is not to do bad things, and then you don't have to worry about me.

Cr. Riala: Last week the Council were running into the bush

President said that he wanted the police to come here because he had a lot of trouble a couple of times and the councillors did not help him.

Cr. Riala suggested that the matter of gambling br brought up at the next Council Conference.

Shang-hais: The Presedent talked about the kids carrying shang-hais (shang-eyes). They were a big nuisance.

Cr. Riala: The kids are running about at night. We want a police to patrol the area.

Dogs at the Pictures.

Cr. Munyal "2 or 3 years we made a law that dogs are not allowed. If the people want to bring their dogs, it will cost 50c. for male and 70c. for female dogs. Dogs which have been registered, should be kept at home and not allowed to run around. Tenale dogs not needed, could be destroyed if they run around everywhere.

How many dogs does the Council

think should be registered -?

President: asked the Counc'lto talk to the people about dogs.

Cr. Jack John: All dogs should have tags and a chain to keep then safe instead.

Cr. Munyal: I will call a meeting at the oval.

FISHING - BY J. PASCOE

During the school holiday, Dhuwai B. Neale, Yappa Marg. Neale, Mr & Mrs Neale (Bruce Neale's mother and father), Jacky, Judy, Brian, Don, David, George, Jimmy P. and I went fishing at Mawurrk Creek by Guyun in the M.P.A.'s Toyota. We left at 9.30am and arrived at 11.30am.

On the way we saw many kangaroos.

We all jumped out and chased them. David had the gun and he must have gone Walkabout because he was gone for a long time. While we were there, David put a drag net across the small creek while Jimmy and I went looking for fish in a creek. When Jimmy and I came back and saw no fish, I told George and Jimmy to go fishing again and as we were walking by the creek we saw a grey file snake. I took a spear and speared it right on the head. We took it back and showed it to the people. Mother Neale was scared. I said "I'm scared of snakes" and Mother Neale said "Ooo, you are not the only one"and she squealed. We were there for an hour, then we drove to the billabong looking for geese. We drove around the creek and couldn't even find the geese because the creek was dry. We came to a creek where the old bone pole was standing by the dry creek. Suddenly David and Don saw a duck sitting in the pond and Don took his Winchester, aimed it and fired twice. David then ran to get the duck. We then drove back to where we left the net. We got off the truck and guess what we found? Two big barramundis about 7 or 8 inches wide and about 15 inches long. We made a big camp fire and cooked the fish, duck and the snake. Then we shared all the food.

Somewhere about 4.30pm we drove back to the settlement. On the way we went to Guyun. We saw Paddy and some others. We had a good view of the mountain at Maregulidban and far away, the rocky mountain country.

Nutritional Education trial.

At the Health Committee meeting yesterday, Dr. Jacobs outlined a proposal to help mothers learn to provide proper food for their small children. He suggested that a trial be carried out at Maningrida and sought the views of the Committee as to how it might be adapted to local circumstances. He said that three points had to be accepted in any such programme —

- 1. The scheme had to apply to local circumstances.
- 2. There have to be community participation (everyone had to be involved.)
- 3. The main had to be teaching about proper food, and not just providing it.

It was most important to evaluate (learn from) the programme; to see if it was having the right effect.

It was decided to seek Council support in setting up a camp type situation near the Infant Welfare clinic and to invite mothers to participate in order to try out ways of starting a food education programme. Sister Tilley will be looking after this but anyone interested could help.
