

LOCAL INDUSTRIES:
Maningrida Bakery.

the bakery has been established for 21 months and is owned and operated by the progress Assn.

In production for five days a week; the bakery supplies the needs of the Maningrida area and also exports bread to Goulburn Island. Production at the moment is 100,000 loaves per annum. and about 92,000 items of bakery small goods. e.g. meat pies, cakes of all sizes, rolls and fruit pies.

The bakery is staffed by Tom Toole(Baker) Morris(1st year apprentice).

Jim(who usually looks after the ovens) and Solomon(who does all sorts of work).

Morris and Tom take it in turns to do the early shift.

Which means getting up at 4'o'clock in the morning.

The bakery was built and equiped at a cost of \$15,000. an extra cost was the \$4,000 for the oven. An Aboriginal Benefits Trust Fund loan was obtained to cover the cost of the oven. The loan has now been payed back in full.

As demand for bread increased it was found that a larger oven was required. So theold one was sold to Port Keats. The new oven has double the capacity (214 loaves) and cost \$7,500 and the trust fund gave a grant of \$3,000 to help cover the cost. Equipment in the bakery consists of a dough machine, a dough moulder, cake mixer and a hand operated bread slicer and wrapper. The new exhaust fan fitted to the oven and the two overhead fans have greatly improved working conditions and the serving counter is much cooler now.

The bakery has been in constant production from the day it was opened and in spite of the difficulties of transport to Maningrida has always managed to deliver the goods.

All the ingredients for baking are bought in by barge from Darwin after being ordered from Brisbane (Flour) Adelaide & Darwin.

As for prices, the bread is only slightly dearer than in Darwin and taking into consideration the eratic service by air and sea that we are subject to, it is worth the extra two cents if only for the freshness of the bread. It should be noted that although the Federal government recognises that this is a high cost area, it does not give freight subsidy to M.P.A.

Progress's bakery is the only bakery that can and does turn out such a wide variety of cakes and bread in Arnhem Land.

Following the failure of a demonstration by Mr. Toole on how to clean a machine, Morris, Jim and Solomon were left in charge of the bakery. There was no break in production and the quality of the bread remained high. It is expected that sometime in the near future that local men will be running the bakery permanantly, as they have proved themselves a to be able to.



could paddle out to sea.

They also showed them how to use a wooden **esset** harpoon to eatch salt water turtle (gariwa) and crocidiles (mandigingo). As the anbara people were making the diamu song (malgari) the white men then wanted to buy the cockle shells


Well Darlings here we are again on this wonderful, wonderful evening, at the opening of this town hall.

THE HISTORY OF THE HALL:

The Progress Association built the hall and has a lease over 5 acres of surpounding land for eventual improvements and beautification; finance was made available - \$55,000 grant from the A.B.T.F. and \$15,000 from Association funds (\$70,000 total). Building time was 18 months. Architect Mr.P.Dermoudy.

THE FUTURE:

It is our hope that maximum use will be made of the Hall. The Y.M.C.A. will centre their activities there and pictures will be shown within the hall. Any organisation is welcome to use it and apart from pictures and special events, no charges will be made.

The A.B.T.F. have approved a grant to furnish the hall. At this point in time 270 chairs have been ordered, screen, projection equipment, display refrigerator, roll up front for kiosk etc etc.

In association with the Y.M.C.A. a detailed list of sporting equipment is being collated and will be ordered in due course.

A caretaker has been appointed - Mr. Johnny Naliva- and his salary will be paid from Hall income. The Progress Association does not require any profit from use of the Hall and any income will be reinvested in improvements.
