Maningrida Council LETTER FROM CRAFT SHOP would like to draw readers attention to the notice from the

Council President in this issue of the Mirage: I recently went to a Council meeting with a number of bark painters & asked the Council for an expression of support for the Craft Shop. Our problem was that a large number of people had been buying art & craft in the camps and byepassing the shop. If this continues the shop will become starved and could be forced to close down.

We cannot remain open without We cannot remain open without

a reasonable volumne of sales, particularly of barks.

If the shop, is threatened, the incomes of many people are threatene Leat week the shop paid out \$1100 to artists and craftsmen. Last year the sales put 30,000 into the community. The bush people depend to a

great extent on the craft money they obtain to purchese sugar, from and other huro can parts of their diet. Thout craft money, life for them would become very difficult.

Some balandas who are buying in the came are paying for less than the prices paid in the Craft Shop. It's a lot cheaper shopping in the came as some he said last week. STATELET BY THE HIRISTER FOR ABORTGINAL AFFAIRS

HR GURDON BRYANT

The Australian Government was determined to assume full responsibility for the Aboriginal figure, ir Gordon Bryent, said today.

Fo was speaking to conference in Chirns attended by mere than 300 Aborigines and Merads Strait Islanders from all over que usland.

The conference carried unaniquely resolutions calling for the Australian Government to the responsibility for queensland Aborigines. and Torres Strait Islanders and for it to logislate to observed the succession Aborigines and Islanders Acts.

Mr Bryant said to did not (not) believe them was any place in Australia for the said to did not (not)

Australia for these acts.

No said: "I den't believe that the situation should be allowed to continue where people on the Islands or Reserves are controlled as cleugh they belong to the State Government."

Mr Bryant said that over the past for years nearly all the things that had been done for aboriginal and Islander communities— from schools to acusin—had been paid for by the Commonwealth Government.

"In my view, if we are going to entinue to deal with the people in this way, it's no good posting the chaques to Mr Bjelke-Pet rs.m. to den't do that with Social Services or Repatrication.

The South Australian Reverament is in the process of transforming

The South Australian Bovernment is in the process of transferring to us their policy planning and co-ordination functions for Aborigines. We're negotiating with the estern Australian and Mail. Aborigines wery successfully."

"Unlike the queensland Government they don't think this is Commonwealth Imperialism, they see it as common sence," he said.
