

time back, Pastor Albrecht, who is one of the head men of the Lutheran Missions in the desert country was talking to the Land Rights Commission in Darwin. All the things he had to say were in the newspaper.

He said that it was his idea that most Aboriginal councils he had seen were a failure - they did not work. He thought that this had happened because the idea of Councils had come from the outside - from balandas - and they had grown up from balanda thinking. Balandas had made the mistake of thinking that a council of men could be got together quickly and that they could then speak for everybody on a settlement or mission and what they said would be everybody's true thinking.

In the desert places he spoke about there was often one big tribe and one big language but still the Councils did not work. This was because the balandas, who were looking for fast ideas from the people, had forgotten about the old custom leaders and laws and ways of talking about things that the tribes already had.

It was his thinking now that the only way a Council could work was if it was run by old custom ways with old custom law men as leaders. Right now he felt that some Councils were being used by big talking men who are not very important in the old laws to make themselves bosses.

I don't know how much of what Pastor Albrecht says is true for Maningrida. I do know that at Maningrida there is not just one language but five or six and not just one tribe and there are many small countries and many different ways that are still here from the days before Maningrida started.

Does Maningrida have the troubles that Pastor Albrecht was talking about? For a long time many of us balandas have been trying to help get a Council started and to keep one going. But there have been many councils and many councillors and many changes and the Council never seems to go ahead to me - Is it because it doesn't want to speak for all the people or is it because it can't - because the law men and the old laws have been left



On Saturday I was in the camp talking to some friends and I noticed a meeting going on at one man's camp. There were more than 30 men at that meeting. They were talking about a big problem that had come up. There were old men and young men. Men were standing up and having their talk and others would listen. The men who were at that meeting were there to talk things out by Aboriginal thinking and ideas to keep the trouble down. Nobody had gone around to pick them up in a truck or remind them to be


# \*\*\*\*<del>\*</del>\* ORESTRY NOTES

Cockroach killer Fred has been busy fumigating the office.




Sunday was spent listening and talking with the Gunardba people of Gochan Jinjida. Norman Angulagula tells the story in this copy of the Mirage.






