of all the year. It took myself and many others 5 years of solid training and examinations before we were eligible for award wages. I good incentive scheme would have been more appropriate.

Naturally the labour government has increased the pay packets, but have robbed it from the other hand. Look how many strikes are fronting us. Anybody can see the people are not happy. Material shortages, rising prices and many other factors. Credit is impossible, even with the interest rate at 12%. With the old government, there was peace, stability - it has disappeared now.

# SAM CALDER'S MESSAGE

The Liberal Country Party has always recognised the affinity of tribalised Aboriginals with their land and their rights to own land on reserve we added some 32,000 square miles to Aboriginal reserves, making a total reserve area larger than Victoria.

If elected to office we will bring down legislation to vest all reserved in Aboriginal Land Boards which will have authority to grant titles to Aboriginals individually or collectively under terms set by them.

Because we believe that there should be a consistent approach to mining on and off reserves, mineral exploration and mining will be continued but only under important safeguards. These will include:

- \* Preference to suitable Aboriginal applicants where they have a special or traditional association in the land;
- \* mining exploration and mining to be undertaken only after full consultation and agreement with Aborigines;
- proper recognition of Aboriginal sacred sites;
- payment of double royalties for mining operations into the Aboriginals Benefits Trust Fund;
- payments of special disturbance amounts to local communities affected by mining;
- \* special arrangements to provide Aboriginals with training and job opportunities and for their participation in servicing projects associated with the mining projects and equity participation.

# SAM CALDER'S MESSAGE (CONT'D.) ..

Having lived for 35 years in the Northern Territory, I firmly believe it is possible to find ways to continue to help Aborigines, as has been done with the great majority of part-Aborigines in the Northern Territory, to define and achieve their own aspirations and goals, both in the short and long term, for themselves and their communities.

Stated simply, the task of governments, aided by people of goodwill in the community, is to encourage Aboriginal people to achieve their own goals by their own efforts.

The Country Party will keep the permit system so that unwanted people will not be able to trespass on your country.

Our policy, which has been unwrapped for nearly a month, has foreshadowed the Woodward report with very few exceptions - so far as I have heard - as it has only just been released at the time of writing this article, i.e. Tuesday evening, May 7th.

# CROCODILE CAPERS

Eggs in three saltwater crocodile nests being studied on the Tomkinson River are expected to hatch in about a fortnight.

Head of the crocodile research program, Professor Harry Messel and photographer Bill Green visited the nests on Sunday, Soctly

They opened three eggs and found healthy embryos from 72 to 10 kg

Professor Messel says there are over a hundred eggs in the nests, which were found by air only a few months or so ago.

The nests were constructed in the late wet season as river levels started to fall. Eggs in all known nests built at the beginning

of the wet failed to survive the extensive and extended flooding of the nest sites this year.

A check was made on a nest on the Goomadeer River on Tuesday and all the eggs there had become rotten.

"This was a disastrous year for crocodiles" says the professor. "The floods have reduced this year's population of hatchlings enormously."

Professor Messel is delighted with the discovery of two distinct nesting periods and now wants to know what determines which crocs nest in each period.

The researchers' big boat and aeroplane are expected here soon.

A six-seater Cessna Stationair 206 will arrive by the first week in June, says the professor. Later in the year it will be fitted with floats for river work.

The 682ft. long, 125 ton research boat, "The Harry Messel", has passed Brisbane on its voyage up the Queensland coast. It will visit Thursday Island and then go to the Fly River in New Guinea to do seismic work. The professor expects his namesake to dock in Darwin on June 7th and arrive in Maningrida 5 or 6 days later.

With the boat and 'plane here, there will be up to 20 researchers and technical staff on the job at times.

The first doctor, arriving in mid-June will be Dr. Ted Buckley, a G.P. and surgeon from Narrabri in N.S.W.

From June to August the research program will centre on capturing and releasing crocodiles in the Liverpool and Tomkinson River systems. From 4 to 6 new trans-

mitters will be fitted to large crocs, says the prof.

In mid-September Professor Messel plans to start surveying croc popular tions in other rivers of Arnhem Land and the gulf using the big boat.

Every single river north of the tropic of Capricorn will be surveyed at that will take 3 or 4 years. Also it is planned to establish another 3 field study areas, 1 in the south of the gulf, 1 around Melville Is and the other past the W.A. border.

After waiting for them at the airport we left for Crab Creek. Jimmy Burinyila had previously taken most of the children to build up the road and did a good job. But only 300 yds. further down the track we fell into a very boggy bog. "Benefication" cried Steven Yatica, "Complication" cried Ningel as the truck lay out there submerged in mud up to the windows. After pacing back and forth muttering a few selected words for the occasion we decided that it would need no less than a grader to pull it out.



Meanwhile further down the track was <u>Jack Miritji</u> and his merry men who we asked to ferry the kids and gear to the camp so as to make a start. When eventually they came and saw the truck submerged, Jack said confidently "No Worries, we get it out" and with all the powers of black magic they got it out and they were well rewarded with some food from our supplies.

After a few more mishaps we arrived at Crab Creek and set up camp hoping to obtain our protein needs by fishing. But fish weren't biting at the time, and things looked pretty grim.

Next morning as the tide rolled in the fish, mainly skinnies, were swarming around the point at the entrance of the creek and we managed to catch enough for the day. But on Wednesday the fish were down again and moral was very low. And after an attack of rain a big vote was held on whether we should return or not. Everyone seemed enthused by the idea and we set off back homeward only to meet another bog. By this time Bruce Neale had come out on his motorbike and we struggled for more than 2 hours trying the Miritji method but we went from one bog to another and Bruce went back to get a winch.

Meanwhile we carried on levering the truck out, and thanks to Little Charlie, Steven, Jimmy and Ningle, we got it out and carried on homeward to meet Bruce and Stephen Joseph with the winch just leaving Maningrida. As we hit Maningrida a big storm blew up and we were all glad to be home and dry.
