

STAFFS SUSPENDS FORESTRY COUNCIL

In a media release issued last Friday the Maningrida Councilannounced that it had decided to take over the Forestry pperation of Maningrida. Their decision followed a visit to Mariagrida by two officers of the Forestry Branch, Mr. Bill Goodwin and Mr. Chrid Haynes, who, it is understood, had come to Maningrida to hold discussions with the Council on the future of Forestry Branch operations at Maningrida.

The Council, said the media release, had sent the following telegram to the Prime Minister, the Director of Aboriginal Affairs, Darwin, the Director of the .
Forestry Branch, Darwin, Mr. Allen O'Brien, Dept. of the Northern Territory, Darwin and Dr. H.C. Coombs, the special advisor to the Prime Minister.

"Effective today, Friday the 23rd. August, all permits of European Forestry staff and dependents are suspended until further notice. Council demands their immediate removal from the Settlement. Councilrejects directive approach and double talk of Forestry Senior officers. Will negotiate only with Chris Haynes and Allan O'Brien."

In a statement on Saturday the 24th. August Mr. John Hunter, a Senior Officer of the Department of Aboriginal Affairs visiting Maningrida on official duties, stated that Aboriginal employees of the Forestry Branch had held a meeting with the Town Council on Friday. The Council had offered the use of Town Administration plant and equipment to enable the Forestry employees to carry out fire protection patrols during the weekend. Residents of outstations in the Forestry fire protection area were contacted and their co-operation sought in the fire control operations.

Mr. Hunter's statement continued that the Council would allow reasonable time"for European Forestry employees to pack their personal effects prior to leaving. Aboriginal Forestry employees had been informed by Forestry officers that the Forestry Branch would continue to pay their wages.

As we go to press there is no further information to hand on the future of Forestry at Maningrida.

WRONG! FORESTRY WENT



Dear Sirs,

may we once again use the columns of your esteemed journal to make our annual public appeal for funds.

The trust, set up by the late Mr Genghis Kahn, has had many calls for help and guidance in the last few months.

Under the terms of the trust, we are pledged to 'Render all such aid and assistance as may be neccesary to those rumours and speculations, which through no fault of their own, have lost their initial impetus and ability to multiply'

The rumour patrol operated by the trust has been overburdened and was only able to carry on by the generous help offered by members.

Our rumour resuscitation unit (expended for last years emergency) is coping splendidly with the crisis.

The most successfull method has been to intialy isolate the enfeebled subject in a fevered atmosphere, sometimes leaving overnight, and then to introduce another resuscitated patient.

The atmosphere is then heated and by a process that is not as yet fully understood, a fast breeding reaction takes place. Statistics show an increase of between 78 and 91 per cent on rumours and a slightly lower rate is obtained on speculations. The cured healthy rumour now has a velocity to truth ratio of 15-1 and on passing an Aggrevation and Alarm test, is ready to go back into general circulation.

The strategic placing of rumour release points has been a source of worry to the trust for many years but this problem is slowly being overcome and we hope to offer a better service in future.

The Kahn Charity Trust would like to take this oportunity to thank all those members of the public who have given us their support over the past year.
