1969 SJERRINTENDENTS CHEERENCE.

The 1969 Conference was attended by the 15 Welfare Superintendents and chaired, at various times, by Mesers. Giese and Ford. Other visitors were Mesers. Larcombe, Penhall, Lovegrove, Ted Evars, Allua, Milliken and Gallacher.

Items set down for the agenda included Capital Works, Staffing and Training Allowances, Business Undertakings on settlements and Transport, All Items were covered, some more fully than others. The main topics of interest were Capital Works and Staffing and most of the conference time was devoted, in one way or another to these subjects. It was quite apparent early in the session that most sesbers felt the development of housing for Aborigines (together with associated facilities) needed to figure more prominently in the Welfare programme and a resolution was duly passed to that effect. It was also felt that more assistance, by way of instruction, should be offered to Aborigines who were trying to improve their standard of living. This would involve a good number of new staff positions in most instances in order to increase the effort. It was also stressed that h ousing and instructional developments should be co-ordinated. Discussions on staffing generally ranged around needs as outlined above, to-gether with an increase in the medical staff component to compensate for the burden of responsibility carried by Mursing staff. Other individual meda were discussed but none are likely to bear fruit in view of the Directors advice that only 17 out of 257 positions put up to the Public Service Board are currently under consideration.

The general tone of the conference was hardly optimizate and atrangularize the belief that any gains to be made must come from within each constantly. This is not at all unresectable of course.

It was still a valuable opportunity for the Superintendence to evaluate their own views in the light of others thoughts and experiences. It was decided to hold the conference annually at two levels, a divisional meeting \$ in the first instance, followed by the regular conference.


OF NEW GLASS WILDOWS AT THE NEW CO-OPS DINING WITH DAN.

We are prepared to help ourselves in any way we can, but realise that we cannot be successful completely on our own and must have some Welfare and Missionaries' assistance. It will take a time, not so many years, before our children will grow up and have a much better chance to think of the future to come.
