- 1. The Postal Authorities have approved the application for a Post Orfice at Maningrida. Mr Bagshaw is currently finalising details prior to its opening.

- In Progress Association wrote to the Administrates one senth ago to find our if any improvements were to be made to the roads at Maningrida. He has not yet replied. The reason for the letter was that it will be necessary to register private motor vehicles at some stage in the future. Private vehicle owners would therefore be entitled to behefit from a roads improvement programme.
- far as can be ascertained the Works Department have only recently been asked to provide a cost estimate on equipping some of the new bores. On past practices it may be up to three years before the mores are actually working.
- 4. Representatives from Outback Services (an Adelaide firm) called this work. They are seeking to establish a regular barge service to missions and settlements on the Northern coast. If they became operational they would use a 75 ton larving barge, with refrigorated space.

It should be a wondurful experience for them and they will be paid to go, \$50 a cay whilst in Japan. An Aboriginal rights or anisation has protested against the visit as they maintain it is contrary to aboriginal law for different tribes to show their dances to one another.

At the last meeting Councillor David Irindilly said that if two were who had stolen the access paid him #5 all would be clear - but the men had neither paid now come to appear before the council.

On Merch 16th Cr. Billy Yiryin reported that someone had stolen his consy and the Council resolved that each of the 7 tribes should contribute #2 each to Billy. At the last meeting this money had not been collected but it was decided that all the people should pay 50cents next pay day to help.

For Strand and ar Williams attended the March 25rd meeting. Ar Strand spoke about the \$2,500 which the Parent's and Friends Association had raised for the school. Mr williams spoke about children not coming to school. Councillors declared to go ground and pick up the children and take then to school. At this week's meeting it was resolved to supplement this masure, by rending all the working men around the next marning.

Jim Jilming (Ganalbinger tribe) asked to speak about his station at Murawanga (Arafure area). It was felt that he should join the Aboriginal Cautle Company starting to work in the area. Or Ray Munyal said that he had been told by Mr Ted Evans how to go about starting a station at Gadji. Some councillar were secaptical about his chances. It was asked that some people did not want to live in the bush and that some places were no good. Or, Rials said that kupanga' as a place (Blyth River) was alright but the water was not. People did not want to live there.

JAPANESE ATRIJNER HLJACKED.

Fifteen Japanese students, on Wednesday, hijacked a jetliner and were holding it's passengers and orew captive at Kimpo Airport, South Korea. The students hijacked the Japanese Airlines 727 above Japan on Tuesday and were tricked into landing in South Korea instead of North Korea. There were 108 people aboard the aircraft. When the 727 landed at Kimpo the airport had been disguised to look like the Communist North, complete with South Korean soldiers wearing the uniform of the North Korean troops. The air-pirates armed with daggers, swords and home made bombs took command of the jet in the air during a flight from Tokyo to Southern Japan. At the time of writing, Thursday night, the students are still in command.

The Mirage asked Nev. Gordon Symons, chairmen of the Morth Ametralian Methodist Mission District, for a comment on the situation there during his visit here three weeks ago. He agreed to do so, as soon as a full report had been submitted to the Director of the Welfare Branch.

"Many people will have noted reports in the Press regarding difficulties which arose at Tirrhala following the death of a senior Aberiginal wan of an Aberiginal group, and the attempted 'take over' of a young wife of his by his next cluest brother. There would seem to have been some undire haste on the part of the approximate. It misseand, and at first this did incur the displeasure of the Aboriginals. It does seem to me, that had this matter been handled in a slightly different may, then Aboriginal support on the question would have been present all along the way. I feel that most of the problems arose because of mis-understanding of Aboriginal customs by some of the Europeans in the area, and the alienation of Aboriginal sympathics because of actions undertaken.

It does seem to me, that in any such Aboriginal matters, considerable core should be taken and as far as possible, matters should be hardled by the Aboriginal people themselves. In some cases of course it may be necessary for the Superintendent, or where one is propent, the District Welfare Officer, to take some action. I feel quite certainly and quite strongly however, than no other Staff member of any group, or any other European present should allow themselves to become directly involved in these affairs, and they must never interfere except when working through the Superintendent or the District Welfare Officer.

I feel that if these principles had been followed in this case, then most of the difficulties that arose, could have been avoided, and the Aboriginal people themselves could have quite satisfactorily cleared up the matter. Whereas it became a major source of conflict and resulted in quite serious troubles.
