Four members of the above foundation visited Maningrica last week led by the chairman Pastor Doug Nichols. Other members of the party included footualler David Kantilla, Mr Philip Roberts and well known accriginal rights supporter &r Charles Perkins.

The visit which was made possible largely through the afforts of the Maningrida Progress Association, was to encourage and assist the development of local sport. It is intended that each year the foundation will be granted funds from the Commonwealth to foster Aboriginal sport and we hope Maningrida willbe considered each year.

A barbecue was held at the Superintendents residence and was attended by representatives of the various sporting organisations. All present extended their thanks to Mr Pollard and Miss Gulliver for their assistance with preparations. Wr Hunter welcomed the visitors and outlin d some sporting projects that could be started depending on the availability of finance. Pastor Nichols in replying, spoke Tavourably of Maningrida before summarising the foundations aims. He was supported by Mr Perkins who said that a proposal would be forwarded to the minister for his consent which would most likely lead to funds for such things as resurfacing the basketball court, a cricket pitch and irrigation for the football oval (what will we use for water?)

After the barbecue some time was spent watching the basketball matches. It was unfortunate that Black Hawks should display a ch poor spectamenanip on this particular occasion; walking of the court following a disagreement with the umpire.

The next day the school programme was altered to allow the visitors to see the children competing in various sporting activities. Paster Nichols was so impressed with the boy's football ability he jokingly signed Tim Darcy for Fitzroy.

This visit did much to foster local sport, not only through possible financial assistance, but in the creation of interest and the renewal of enthusiasm.



### CASTRO2 FITERITTS.

Low wet season rainfall would mean an increase in gastro-intestinal sickness and this was already evident in the Top End according to the Territory Director of Health, Dr. W. A. langsford. He said he was " concerned about the possible effects of the dry Wet in rural areas. Indications are that the poor rainfall in the Top End make an increase in gastro-intestinal illnesses inevitable. It is not unusual for these illnesses to become more prevalant towards the end of the Dry season but an increase has already been detected this year. " The rise in this sickness is believed to be caused by higher levels of contamination in water not refreshed or replaced by Wet season rain.

#### BIG TANKER BURNED.

A 62,000 ten oil tanker being built whyalla ship yards was completely gutted by fire on Saturday night. The fire started in the bows of the ship and was not put out will Sunday morning. About 20 firemen and 60 volunteers fought unsuccessful battles against the fire which gradually spread throughout the whole ship. It was estimated that damage will amount to S3-4,000,000.
