 - # "Here at Maningrida we have old people and young people... and people from different tribes who have different ideas and different ways of getting the good things they want.




- Your ideas are the Progress Association's ideas, but you must Everyone has to hear! Everyone wants to hear. say them.

DENTIST:





APOLOGY: Due to pressure of Eisteddfod preparation and a more than usually forgetful brain I neglected to advertise last Mondays Parents and Friends meeting. I extend apologies to all interested persons who may have missed the meeting through this over-sight.

The following matters were discussed at the meeting:

1. SCHOOL FENCE:

That heavy project, the school fence has again come upon rocky ground. A conservative estimate for a pigwire and star picket construction put the cost at \$1500. This was thought to be too high a price for the benefits that would result.

2. RELIGIOUS FILMS:

The Church Council has requested that attempts be made to secure films of a religious theme for the off pay Saturday programme. Don't panic atheistic film lovers - such films as "The Robe", "Ben Hur" and "The Ten Commandments" were suggested. It was also suggested that some health films be secured for inclusion in programmes eg "Cancer and Smoking", "Alcoholism" and "The Treatment of Soft Knees". Enquiries will be made by the Secretary as to how these films can be obtained. The Church Council has offered to bear any extra charges.

3. SCHOOL FETE:

That highlight of the settlement calendar, the school fete, is coming. A tentative date has been set at the first pay weekend in October.

4. ELSTEDDFOD GRANT:

The Parents and Friends have granted § 300 towards the cost of the children's trip to Darwin for the Eisteddfod. This will cover purchase of additional clothing and foot wear etc and the hire of a vehicle to convey children and teachers to various Eisteddfod activities. About 45 children and the Gunavidji-Gunwinggu dancing team (which is the team that won the Open Day contest) will begin to leave for Darwin on Monday next.

5. TOWN CLOCK:

The famous Maningrida Town Clock has been ordered and should reach us at any time according to the manufacturer's correspondence.

6. ICE CREAM SALES:

Because of the struggle that has been occurring lately for the last few ice creams at the pictures on Friday nights it has been decided to increase the ice cream stock by 50% for a trial period.

This little brown bird is seen on the beach at Juda Point. He feeds on little crabs etc. in the sand.



BURNING OUR OWN MONEY.

As from the 1st of July, Forestry have to pay money (a Royalty) for every log of timber they take from the bush. This money is paid to the Aboriginal Benefits Trust Fund. The men who were here last Trust Fund. The men who were here last week with Mr Giese (James Galavawuy etc.) recommend how this money is to be used to help Aboriginal people. We are asking for a lot of this money to buy the fisheries factory from the Government, build houses etc.
