sickness. Fighting T.B.

Sister Summerton has come out from Darwin to visit all the people of Maningrida. She has come to see whether you have some protection against that T.B. sickness.

Some years ago another Sister came to Maningrida to give you needles to help you build up some fighting power against that T.B. sickness. This is why Sister Summerton has been having a look at the marks on your arms.

If the mark on your arm shows it was a good needle, this means you have some protection against that sickness. Some people do not have a good mark on their arm. Some people have a small mark. Sister gives both these groups of people a T.B. needle called the B.C.G. Vaccination. That needle helps people build up fighting power in their own bodies against that T.B. sickness.

The best way to have fighting power against all sickness is:

- 1.
- To eat plenty of good tucker.
 To get plenty of sleep at night. 2.
- To have the windows open when you sleep at night, so that good clean air can blow through the house.

Sister Summerton nursed in the United States and Canada for S. Whilst in Canada she looked after a lot of Indian many years. people who had T.B.

Our men also used handball (that sometimes went astray) when a good long kick would have been more effective. Final scores Yuendemu 7-2 Maningrida 2-5.

When one takes into account Darwin's win over Wanderers '11.9 to 2.0 and St Mary's thrashing of Yuendemu 8.10 to 1 goal Maningrida has a fair way to go to get to the top of the ladder.

However they were not disgraced at the weekend.

They had some men there who had brought beer into Oenpelli. The Judge made them pay money, first because they did the wrong thing, then he made them take the beer and pour it down the drain. Everyone at Oenpelli Mission was watching. If this happened at Maningrida there might be some men who would give themselves a 'sorry' cut.

ABORIGINAL BAND. Near Darwin there is a place called Mica Beach where a lot of visitors go to have picnics. It is near Delissaville Settlement. Four young Aboriginal men have a rock and roll band there . They are called "The Reflections". A visitor came up from Tasmania and he liked the band so much that he is giving them a job in Tasmania, right at the bottom of Australia. They are the only band in Australia that has all Aboriginal people.

At Yirrkala soon there will be two days of music. DANCING AT YIRRKALA. Aboriginal singers and dancers and white singers and music men will go there and everyone will show what he wan do. Then the Aboriginal people and the white people will sit down and talk together about their music. Frank, Crusoe and Joe have been asked to go because a lot of people in Darwin think Frank and Crusoes dance about the Garti-Garti is very good.
