And last, the most important people of all - all those who came along and patronized the show.



JACK MIRITJIS DARWIN STORY

We left Maningrida by motor car with Ron and Bill (Ted Evans friends) who were bound for Oenpelli. First night we camped at Morinaka Crossing (Mann River). The second night we camped at Maragulidban and when morning came we set out for Gurmadir Crossing and camped at Nimbuwah Mountain that night. We left Nimbuwah and went through Oenpelli to the East Alli-gator Crossing. We stopped there for one hour and had beer at Terry Robinsons store. We went on to Jim-Jim and camped at Terry Robinsons store. We went on to Jim-Jim and Camp, there the night. Next morning we went into Jim-Jim River and stayed there for about 2 weeks fishing for barramundi. We left Bill at Jim-Jim and Ron took us to Darwin. We ar there in the afternoon and Ron took me to Rapid Creek. Rapic Creek I stayed out in the bush by myself, near the sea. I stayed there for two months and then went to see Mr Wilson, Superintendent at Bagot, and asked him to contact Don Gudinga (at Maningrida) for \$22 to get me home. No money came.

After seeing the Superintendent at Bagot I went to the Welfare Office in Darwin to see Ted Evans, Jack Larcombe and Mr Giese, to put the list of names and mark out our tribal country. They asked me to stay in Darwin for another two weeks to work on the lists, I told them I didn't have much money to live there that long so I would have to go home and have another meeting about GADJI Creek. We then left for Katherine footwalking (Don Gudinga and me) and we picked up two boys Albert Buranburalil and Peter Kirrikirr. We walked to the 10 Mile in Darwin and then got a lift in a truck to Katherine. From Katherine we got a lift on the Banyili truck, where we stayed for about one week and a half. Some men were asking us to get a beer ticket at Banyili but we didn't want to because it cost \$10.50 and we goid to them we would have a hear ticket at Maningrida where it said to them we would buy a beer ticket at Maningrida where it costs \$7.50. We left Bamyili and walked to Beswich Station where we stayed for about a week. We left Peter Kirrikirr there and his wife

Mabel Nyinawana, and Les Midiguria, who had been sent on punishment from Maningrida to Darwin.

From Beswich we went to Mainoru, footwalking. It was very dry and hot, we had no water, no food and we were carrying a lot of swags. We camped in Dry Mountain Country. Next day, early, we started to walk again and then half way between Mountain Valley and Mainoru we got a lift with a buffalo shooter to Mainoru Station. After staying at Mainoru for two days we walked to It took us two days to get there and we arrived on Bulman. Sunday afternoon.

We got a lift to Maningrida on the Maningrida truck on Tuesday Mr Hunter came down because of a little bit of beer morning. trouble.
