If an assistant kitchen supervisor was appointed it would be possible to take a boy leaving school and train him in regular tradesman l'ashion. For the first year he would sweep the floor, granse baking time and set up trays. He wouldn't touch the dough for the first 12 months. His second year would be divided between greasing time and working doughs. In the third year he would make and mould doughs.

In the kitchen generally, the girls will soon have now yellow coloured uniforms which they will buy for themselves and the men will have new whites. There has been a steady improvement in the work of the staff here, with each one doing his appointed job. Johnny Editor Glyabakka is the head cook with George Canjibala as the shift cook.

Breakfast seems to attract the lar ist number of diners. People like the porridge. When west-bix is being served the numbers drop. For all meals, men are charged 50 cents and women 20 cents but the women out some than the men do (and make more mess?). Waste is about on a par with a European dinning room, crusts or anything to be chewed is generally left.

W ILL MANINGRIDA BE A JANGE FOR MILLL GIGBI?

A Maningrida team left on the "SSBIKLig" and the Nakara Boat to play the Arnhemland Premiers - Milingimbi. The same is scheduled for Saturday and the players expect to return on Sunday. He Stop Press Nokara Boat broke down.

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About twelve months ago about 50 Jinnang people made a company to save money to buy a Landrover. Every pay day Mr Jack Miritji collected money and banked it for the company.

A few weeks ago 7 men went to Darwin with \$956 to buy the vehicle.
"We looked at many trucks all over Darwin until we saw what we thought was the best. Mr Slim Woodcock helped us. The Landrover we bought for \$850 came from a Greek man at Fannie Bay."

The seven men and Jiany and Lena left Darwin last Wednesday bound for Maningrida. On Wednesday night the group camped at Marakai Road Swamp, geese seen, but no one had a gun. On Thursday petrol was bought at Jim Jam on the South Alligator River near Cempillie and we drove on to Nimbuwar (mountain country) to spend the night. All the creeks were dry so they had no trouble travelling.

On Friday they stopped at Liverpool Crossing and then drove onto the plains. Suddenly the engine stopped. "We knew we had no petrol". So Charlie Mowundunga and Jimmy Morrduk and Jack Miritji then started walking to Maningrida "We became tired so camped halfway, on Saturday we set off again and arrived at Maningrida in the afternoon. It was very hot walking"

Mr Wilders brought petrol out and the Landrover continued on its way and reached Maningrida Satur ay night. The Jinang people were happy with the Landrover. Their men will shoot geese curing the week to make money for another truck and the people who work for wages will also pay some money into the company bank.

BOUNCING

CHEQUES THAT BOUNCE: During the past two weeks or so the Co-op has received letter from the bank to say that \$70 worth of cheques have bounced. This is an unfortunate situation. The cheques have been paid by reople leaving the settlement.

Until the Board meets in its regular monthly meeting to consider the matter, the following rules apply.

- Cheques can only be accepted to pay an account, ie No writing of cheques to get change, anyone wanting ready call have the facilities of the Savings Bank available to them.
- ii. All people occupying persanent positions in the settlement can continue to operate monthly accounts.
- iii. All people occupying temporary positions must begin on a weekly account basis and with the approval of the Supt/Chairman.
