An Opposition front-bencher, Mr. Beazley, (Lab. W.A.), who visited Arnhem Land during the winter recess, gave notice in the House of Representatives of a motion for appointment of the select committee.

The Government informed

the Opposition today that it would support the motion.

An area of 140 square miles has been excised from the 35,000 square miles Arnhem Land aboriginal reserve and leased to a sub-sidiary of the Pechiney Aluminium Company of France.

Trust Fund

When he announced the excision last April the Minister for Territories (Mr. Hasluck) told Parliament the lease documents tained provisions protecting the water supply of the Yirrkalas.

The terms of the lease provided for continued access of the aborigmes, mission staff and Government officials to the leased land.

Mr. Hashuk added that royalties, from the bauxite mining would be paid into a trust fund which might eventually total £4 million to be spent on aborigmal welfare.

Mr. Beazley and Mr. Gordon Bryant (Lab., Vic.), who accompanied him to Arnhem Land, claimed the aborigines had not been properly consulted about the disposal of the land, and that the mining operations would impair the hunting which economy on Yirrkalas depend.
