

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

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THE KIDS ARE OUR FUTURE

How many of us have pain inside of us that we rarely speak about? Probably a lot of us. It's not the sort of thing you bring up in conversation generally, although sometimes it does come up and you can get a bit of torment off your chest.

My father beat me round. He would lose his temper and clobber me Around the head and face sometimes, at other times, when I was younger, he'd belt me. At first it was over the backside but he'd lose control of himself and his anger and then he'd belt me and my brother across the legs and up the back with the leather belt he wore daily. Once he was so irate that he pinned me to the floor with his legs over my arms and slapped me continuously across the face for over a minute. I was still in high school at the time. About fourteen I think. It fucked me up real bad. Mum was screaming at him to stop but he wouldn't. Or couldn't. Afterwards I ran to my room, hyperventilating, in shock from the beating physically but more so from the emotional terror I had just experienced. My father scared me. He always scared me. He never showed love, compassion or understanding. Why? I asked myself over and over again. Was it my fault? Was I causing all this tension and distress in the family? I began to think that it was all my fault. That I'd brought all this violence onto myself.

The way dad spoke to me. He saw me as a burden on his shoulders. There I was eating his food, drinking his drinks, living under the roof that he had to pay for. He paid for almost everything and he believed that I just took it for granted. He was wrong about that. Strangely, I still loved him very much but this is the classic domestic violence scenario. The one who hurts you most is the one you are closest to. So many of us are trapped inside of this situation and although we are all looking for an exit we often don't find it because to do so means having real friends to help you get out - and in my situation being a kid didn't help.

Kids are just extensions of their parents it seems, with few rights and little freedom. If kids whinge about their treatment then they're ungrateful for what they've been given. Adults at times seem to lack an understanding of kids and stupidly respect the right of parents to treat their kids willy-nilly; children are people too, in their own right. They have their own lives, albeit naive or ignorant with plenty to learn. But it seems that adults respect the right of parents to treat their kids how they please simply because they are the kids' parents. While parents' must be given a wide ranging scope to bring up their children in the manner they deem fitting, the area of child upbringing needs to be brought into the public arena for scrutiny. If more parents saw how other kids were treated they may learn something - what to do or what not to do. Most importantly, if kids were brought up on a communal basis (nothing hippy in this idea) then parents' would not only receive a well deserved break from child-rearing through community child minding and labour sharing but would also gain valuable insights into how kids react to different situations. This would give parents' the opportunity of an objective viewpoint which they rarely have the time to arrange for themselves and give the kids the chance to reach out and meet some new (trusted) people. -

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

Spit case boy goes on the run

ONE of two boys accused of having spat at independent federal MP Pauline Hanson absconded from government care after a court appearance yesterday.


The boy escaped from a Families, Youth and Community Care Depart ment official after saying he needed to go to the toilet at Ipswich Court, in Queensland.

Police have been asked to find the boy and take him to a youth detention centre in Brisbane.

Aboriginal Legal Service solicitor Daniel Habermann said the boys were to appear on 10 April for a committal hearing.

Families, Youth and Community Care Department director-general, the Reverend Allan Male. said his department recommended the younger boy, 11, live with his mother and the 12-year-old who escaped be returned to detention.

The alleged spitting incident occurred last month at Ms Hanson's Ipswich electorate office.

Four youths arrested after fires at schools

KIAMA police have arrested four youths after a series of school fires during the Christmas holidays.

The four boys - three aged 13 and one aged 12 - were arrested late on Wednesday following a scrub fire on the outskirts of the town.

A police spokesman said the first fire damaged a toilet block at the Catholic Church school on December 14, causing \$500 damage.

The second fire occurred at the Kiama Infants School on Sunday. January 9 and destroyed a toilet block and a ridelawnmower and caused several thousand dollars' damage.

The youths allegedly started a third fire last Monday which destroyed an office at the Kiama Primary School. Police allege the group broke into into a garden storage shed and stole tools before using paper and an accelerant to start the fire about 9.30pm.

The blaze caused an estimated \$30,000 damage to the school.

Kiama police said they arrested one of the youths at home yesterday.


They have been charged with malicious damage by fire and break and enter offences.

All four will appear in Kiama Children's Court on Friday, February 14.

A spokesman for the Department of Education said the school security budget was \$5 million





NSW police are to be given the ower to break up groups of hree or more people in public areas and demand their names and addresses, but only after local communities request that the power be used.

Under the proposal, police will be able to act immediately if notified of a group causing a nuisance.

But the Minister for Police, Mr Whelan, said that as a safeguard against abuse, police would need "reasonable grounds to believe the group's behaviour is likely to obstruct, harass or intimidate".

He said that while the law

would target hooligans, it would not be restricted to specific age groups.

Police at present can demand names and addresses only from troublemakers on trains and in traffic matters.

The penalty for refusal to comply with the new Crimes Act (Street Safety) Amendment Act will be a fine or 100 hours' community service, similar to that for offensive language.

The Opposition welcomed the plan and the Police Commissioner, Mr Ryan, said police powers had to be extended if they were to deal with street crime.

Animals are different to humans. They don't mind being born into cramped cages. If they had Council of Civil Liberties, Mr Ken Buckley, said the law would discriminate against youths and Aborigines and that police already had sufficient authority to deal with street harassment.

However, the proposal was backed by the Opposition spokesman on police, Mr Tink, who said NSW had experienced an alarming increase in gang activity, borne out by an average 25 per cent increase in assaults since the election of the Carr Government. Fight the Power (or Fuck Off)

Every day people see unemployment, violence, teenage suicide, drug addiction and child abuse. Politicians have an endless supply of excuses, but people are getting sick of hearing them. Meanwhile the rich are happy to get richer while the rest of us suffer. We think that there have been enough excuses. When one person lives in luxury and another person can't get enough to eat, something is wrong. When we are led by greedy fools who've probably never even heard of us, something is wrong. When the police who are more likely to bash us than help us, something is wrong.

Activate was set up to promote anarchism. This is the idea that we should all have equal rights: everyone having an equal say in running things instead of having police and politicians, and everyone doing equal amount of work and getting an equal share, instead of most people working for bugger all and some people being rich and not working at all.

There are three main groups in society. The groups are called classes. The people who are rich and powerful are called the upper class. They are people who don't have to work because they get heaps of money from things they own, for example from renting out houses. The upper class also includes the people who have political power. The second group is called the middle class. They are people who run society for the upper class. Managers of shops, people who own small businesses, and people who boss you round at work are all middle class. Most middle class people would love to get into the upper class. Everyone else is part of the working class. They're the people who have to work for someone else because that's the only way they can get money, and who don't have any power at work. Unemployed people are also part of the working class. The working class don't have any power now, but almost everyone is working class (at least three people in five). All we have to do is stick together and we can do what we want.

The government and the rich would love us to fight amongst ourselves, and all too often people do. A lot of people with jobs look down on the unemployed, and a lot of people look down on people who earn less money. Other big problems are racism and sexism. People will blame unemployment on Aboriginals or Asians, or on women working. Men are given more power than women, and white people are given more power than other races. But what people don't see is that the rich are laughing at all of us: black or white, male or female, none of us have much control over our lives unless we're rich. Everyone has to stand together. You have to look at whether you're taking the easy option and calling people slopes or bitches, feeling like you're on top of the world when really you're digging your own grave. All this can be pretty hard, but there's no other way. If you aren't going to try and stop being a racist or a sexist, don't bother getting in touch with us. Fight the power, or fuck off.


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Do you work In fast food? Are you sick of low wages, poor working conditions and injuries? Sick of being bossed around? McDonalds spend well over \$1 billion worldwide every year on ads and promotions to boost their Image - yet they can't find a single penny to pay overtime. The alm is: get profits up and wage costs down. The time couldn't be better for workers not just in McDonalds, but in all fast food work places to organise

BURGER ALL

More than ever we are being divided into a dwindling permanent work force and a growing reserve of part-time casual and temporary workers. Encouraged by continual attacks by government on workers employment rights and cheap labour policies, 'flexible working' is now the norm for many of us, not just in fast food, but increasingly in every other sector.

Benefiting from this are the multinational food chains who have been able to keep the wages and conditions of their workers amongst the worst in the country, enabling them to reap massive profits. The biggest of these is McDonalds - the largest fast food operator in the world, making well over \$1 million profit a day. The rise of 'Big Mac' is one of the all time success stories of US corporate history - and a story of mass exploitation of workers. McDonalds profits depend on young workers keeping its labour costs down. Many workers are under 18 and still at school. In this way, they can pay poverty level wages.



TAKE 'EM OUT

But we don't have to accept this; McDonald's workers create the wealth of the company they are therefore in a potentially strong position to use their labour power to start confronting this situation by organising. McDonald's know this all too well. They spend millions on trying to indoctrinate the workers with company propaganda: videos, lectures and even a 'McDonald's University". Workers are bullied and in-





timidated into showing company loyalty. Any workers who try to do anything against the conditions or pay, are harassed and eventually forced out or sacked.

But there is resistance starting to grow and build the confidence for not just workers in McDonald's, but for all workers to take on their boss. And there couldn't be a better time to do it.

ON TRIAL

The company's business practices are currently under the spotlight in a mammoth libel trial at the High Court in London (set to continue till April). Two supporters of London Greenpeace are defending leaflets criticising McDonalds, including awhole section criticising crew pay and conditions. Thirty five exworkers have come forward to help them by giving evidence of what really goes on inside the stores. This will benefit all McDonalds workers by forcing the company on to the defensive. So now is the time to organise!





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

Anarchists want to bring about a free, stateless and equal society, that is one which is free of divisions, rank and one which is just and fair.

An excellent example of anarcha-feminists at work in the past is Mujeres Libres (Free Women), the spanish anarchist womin in the 1930's. They formed a womin only organisation which was affiliated to the CNT (A huge anarchist union which was the main force against the fascists etc). In the hey day of Mujeres Libres they had 160 groups throughout Spain, with 20,000 womin avtively involved. They / taught illiterate womin to read, provided creches, formed collectivised restaurants and provided health services etc.


Feminism doesn't mean female corporate power or a womin president: it means no corporate power and presidents. The equal rights amendment will not transform society: it only gives womin the 'right' to plug into a hierarchical economy. Challenging sexism means challenging all hierarchy economic, politcal and personal. And that means an anarchist feminist revolution!"

What's Wrong With School? (Answer: Everything)

And kids who get good marks get away with a lot.


Everyone's supposed to have the same chance to get an education. But money talks. Some people can buy their way into private schools. Ordinary kids are supposed to put up with crap education, and have the same chance as someone who's had the best private schools and private tutors. If you're parents can't buy you a good education, it doesn't matter how smart you are - you'll miss out while the rich kids get all the chances.

It isn't just that ordinary schools are worse. If you're not some snotty rich kid, you might find that you need more money than your parents will give you. So, you'll have to get a



job. But teachers don't understand. You still have to do the same amount of homework and assignments, and too bad if you can't find the time. It's no wonder that rich kids do better, when a lot of people don't have time to learn.

So basically, school is shit because you're told what to do, it's run by people who don't care about you, and what you get is based on how much money you have. But, that's what's wrong with everything. Politicians don't care about you any more than teachers do. The police will pick on you just like teachers (only worse - most teachers don't bash up their students). And in life, you get the justice you pay for. So it isn't just that school has to be changed. If you don't like what you're given at school, you won't like what you're given outside of school.














risk because 106 teachers suspected of sexual misconduct are still working in the school system, an education chief admitted yesterday.

Education director-general Ken Boston, giving evidence to the NSW police royal commission, admitted his department bungled the handling of child abuse allegations.

The 106 teachers will now be investigated or monitored — but the alert only follows the department's review of previously "closed" files.

These suspect teachers are in addition to more than 80 education employees already under investigation, and about 100 new complaints of sexual impropriety received in the past two weeks.

Premier Bob Carr immediately recalled Education Minister John Aquilina from overseas yesterday

and announced a crisis meeting when told of the new evidence.

"The disclosures made at the royal commission today are frightening for every parent," Mr Carr said, adding that they amounted to a "terrible breach of trust".

Dr Boston was forced to concede at the Wood royal commission that some children may be at risk.

Under questioning by counsel assisting Paddy Bergin, Dr Boston

admitted that a special sex abuse investigative unit, which he formed last year, was simply not up to the job.

"Until Monday night, you weren't aware of the other problems in the department?"

"That's true," Dr Boston replied.

He agreed the extent of the problems were not known until the commission began exposing them.

"Do you take the view firmly now

that there is a need for an independent body (to investigate)?"
"Yes," Dr Boston replied.

Later, Ms Bergin asked: "Are there any other matters within the Case Management Unit of which you are aware that you would regard as placing children at risk at the moment; that is, where cases have not been gone over properly where children may still be at risk?"

"Yes," Dr Boston replied.
Evidence from the commission indicates the Department of School Education systematically

106 suspect teachers still in the classroom

transferred teachers accused of child abuse, or on resignation gave them favourable references. Other teachers have been medically retired with letters of "regret".

In most cases, no reference was made to the allegations of sexual impropriety.

Many of those who resigned are believed to have sought teaching jobs in private schools or interstate, using their references.

The department's Director of Personnel, Richard Irving, was also questioned yesterday about another 100 or so former employees who may have received "the tick of approval" in favourable letters.

As a result, the department is notifying every teaching institution in Australia, advising them to check with its officials if they employ workers who possess NSW statements of service.

Dr Boston agreed with Ms Bergin that if a principal did not believe abuse allegations against a teacher, the complaint might never be reported to Department of Community Services workers as required.

"It might not, but if it does not the principal clearly is committing an offence," Dr Boston said.

"But that doesn't protect the child, does it?" asked Ms Bergin.

"No." Dr Boston said.

The education chief has previously agreed that evidence at the commission shows the department's policies are not ensuring that DOCs are told of allegations against teachers.

"If you have a recalcitrant principal that problem will remain," Dr Boston said.

The manager of the Case Management Unit, Roslyn Coomber, yesterday conceded her special investigative unit was vastly under-resourced and under-staffed.

It was not until the royal commission began exposing the false references last week that the unit began a complete reviews of the 400 cases on its files.

Ms Bergin: "In the 106 you've listed (to be monitored), you would agree there may be situations where children are at risk?"

Ms Coomber: "The purpose of the monitoring is to ensure that that's not the case."

"But you would agree that that's the reason you want it monitored, because you're concerned that children may be at risk?"

"We just wish to double check that they're not at risk, yes."

The commission heard the Education Department's policy requires teachers to report to their principal, who must then report to DOCS.

It does not state that teachers must report to DOCS if the principal does not.

"If that's not clear in the document then we will certainly be making it clear in the training and development program and in any other way possible," Dr Boston said.

"Perhaps we should have spelt that out more explicitly."

REDFERN AT WAR AGAIN!

(late Jan.) One hundred people attacked police in Eveleigh St, Redfern in an attempt to free four people that had been arrested. Hassling the residents of Eveleigh St for the umpteenth time, the cops suffered under a hadstorm of bricks and bottles. Cops have had a number of shots at crushing local dissent in those few "notorious" streets of Redfern but are continuously met with lierce resistance from those who have nothing to lose.
