The Way To Avoid H-Bomb Rocket War

What are "Summit Talks"? What do they mean to YOU?

They are meetings between the top men—Prime Ministers or Presidents—of the major countries, to find ways to reduce international tension, the ruinous arms race and the whole threat of war. Such agreements can mean controlled disarmament, with millions of pounds released for useful spending on . . .

Construction of Homes, Schools, Hospitals, Roads, Dams, Bush Fire Prevention, and other projects that would provide Employment and Improved Standards of Living.

The present race to build intercontinental rockets carrying H-Bomb war-heads means not only enormous waste . . . but also the shadow of death over the world.

We Dare Not Fail

This terrible situation can be ended only through agreement between the Great Powers.

For months, some government figures and newspapers in various countries have tried to belittle the value of "top" discussions. They forget how successfully Churchill, Roosevelt and Stalin—men of wide political and religious differences—ironed out policy problems during World War II. (See picture, front page.)

Again, in 1955, a "summit" meeting was held at Geneva, between the leaders of the U.S.A., U.K., France and the U.S.S.R., to tackle the problems of the "Cold War". When it ended, all the leaders agreed on its great value. British Prime Minister, Sir

Anthony Eden, for example, said: "The conference had set itself a limited task and this has been more than accomplished . . . There is now a better chance than we have known at any time since the war to get to work on practical proposals to solve the differences which have divided Europe all these years . . ."

The fact is, in the age of rockets and H-bombs, we can no longer afford the possibility of failure to reach agreement. Nor can we longer ignore the warnings, such as that of 350 Australian scientists, against the dangers of radio-activity in the atmosphere arising from continued tests of nuclear weapons.

Agreement must be reached. And whatever else is discussed, agreement must include:—

- CONTROL OF ALL MODERN "HORROR WEAPONS"
- PLANNED WORLD DISARMAMENT
- A HALT TO NUCLEAR TEST EXPLOSIONS

We Dare Not Delay

Those who oppose holding "Summit Talks" at first argued that the main thing was proper preparation—by diplomats, foreign ministers, etc. But there is now no reason why rapid preparation of an agenda for the main conference cannot be completed by a meeting of foreign ministers.

However, sections of the world press claim that the talks may now be delayed until new rocket launching bases are completed. Such an approach, based on tactics and bargaining power, cannot contribute to the spirit of goodwill necessary to success in the talks. And it means delay.

World public opinion, signified by polls in many countries, demands that the agenda be drawn up and the date of the meeting fixed . . . **NOW!** The Australian Assembly for Peace, opposing all attempts to delay the Summit Meeting, calls on every man and woman . . .

To ask for Federal Government action to press for immediate top-level talks, in a spirit of goodwill and without pre-conditions, to deal with the urgent problems named above.
