# Economics of Labour.

The working-class have only one thing to sell, their labour-power, and they sell it on condition that they receive in return the money value of sufficient food, clothing, and shelter to reproduce their energy in production. If the wages received will not huy back the nucessaries of life then slow starvation must be as the worker of the sell, the worker back the sell, the worker back the sell is the worker back to the sell is the worker back the greatest losers. It can be seen then that there is a dead level below which wages can not go, which is defined as a living-wage. Just as a steamship requires a certain amount of coal in the shape of the mecessaries of life to keep it in going order.

The above facts will explain

amount of money received; sec-ondly, the real wage, which is the purchasing power of the money wage; thirdly, the relative wage, by far the most important and also the most neglected of the three. The first two do not inter-est the worker in the least, as they are determined automatic-ally by the position of the labor nearket; if the supply of labor ex-ceeds the demand then the price versa. No permanent increase of the nominal or real wages can be gained in the face of a huge over-supply of labor such as exists to-day.

supply of labor such as exists to day.

The relative wage is the proportion between the amount of wealth produced by the worker and the amount he receives. By a study of industry it will be found that the working-class as a whole are receiving a far small ere portion of the produced in their toll than discussion of the produces of several causes, the principal one being the invention and perfection of the huge one-hines which are used so extensively in production nowadays. There is hardly an industry at the present time wherein labor-saving machines are not in use.

Another cause of increasing disproportion between wages and profits is the growing number of women and children engaged in the factories and workshops of the world. It is a well known fact that the female requires less of the geessacies of life than docs the male worker, while children, forced to work by necessity, are only expected to receive enough to cke out the meagre wages of the adult worker. Moreover, these classes of wage-workers are more servile and less inhalte to kick oper the traces than are men, consequently they can be more profitably exploited by the capitalist.

As a consequence the profits of the capitalist class (surplus labor) are increasing all the time. The result is that they are becoming even more powerful and tyramical, while we, the poor, deluded wage-
