Longerenong - -	Longerenong - -	The dividing of the waters.
Sandhill at Longerenong -	Wyn-wyn-ballyma - -	The direction of the mouse's dwelling.
Ashens - -	Langanong-joruk - -	The reedy branch or fork.
Glenorchy - -	Djarrah - -	A job, a piece of work.

Boga Lakes—Duck Lake (No. 3 in map)	Buckanyany-jowk - - -	Reedy-neck (descriptive of the shape of this lake).
Boga Lakes—Drung-drung (No 1 in map)	Drung-drung.	
Walmer - - - -	Tulgamuruy catyin - - -	Water of the visitors.
Vectis - - - -	Yawmbul - - - -	A swim.
Polkemmet - - - -	Witchi - - - -	Sedges or bulrushes.
Norton Creek - - -	Malibar - - - -	A blind creek.
McKenzie River - - -	Bun-nah - - - -	Tea-tree scrub.
Burnt Creek - - -	Purtit - - - -	Bulrush or sedges.
North Brighton (in map Darlot and McLachlan)	Becatyin - - - -	Chalk (or lime) water.
Swamp at North Brighton	Dooen.	
Wimmera River - - -	Barrh - - - -	Proper name, no meaning ascertainable.
Half-way Inn - - -	Greech* - - - -	Fat.
Irrewarra - - - -	Nawallah - - - -	What's that ?
Rosebrook - - - -	Boyop-butyum-butyum	Mesembryanthemum or pig's-face.
Rose's Gap - - - -	Barregowa - - - -	The middle of the mountains.
Ledcourt - - - -	Ledcourt - - - -	A spear-point.
Richardson River - - -	Wirchilleba - - - -	A dry watercourse.
Marnoo - - - -	Marnoo - - - -	Finger.
Carr's Plains - - - -	Cattiong <i>nyam-nyam</i> † -	Flowering climber.
Warranooke (Nicol and Ayrey's station)	Warranooke - - - -	The upper lip.
