STEPPING OUT IN FAITH

It has been a great joy to the Federal Council and to our workers on the Field to see at least seven consecrated young people join our ranks this year. Many more are needed (see the appeals on pages 13 and 15) but we praise God for those who have heard the call of God and have stepped out in faith.

But do you realise, dear friend, what a share you can have in these lives? Here are instruments which are ready. Here are vessels which have been prepared. Here

are mouthpieces which have been surrendered, and the Lord has commanded them to go. But who is going to support them, in prayer and in substance? There must be 'senders' as well as 'sent'. There must be supporters as well as fighters. Who are to be those who will stand behind these young as they go?

will stand behind these young as they go? It is easy enough to say 'well, they are stepping out in faith that God will supply their every need.' That is exactly and wonderfully rue. What a joy to know that the Lord is underwriting every need, and that we have nothing to fear.

But that does not absolve he Christians of Australia from asking the Lord what would He have them to do regarding these things. It is a joy to go to the Field. It is just as great a joy to be the human instrument in the Lord's hand to make possible their work on the Field. Will you share in this joy by your support of those who are going forth now?

A Faith Mission

Some one may say "I thought the A.I.M. was a 'faith' mission and therefore never mentioned money."

The Way of Faith is so often misunderstood, maligned, criticised, ridiculed and even pitied. Some missionaries and some missions seem to have more than their share of this at times. Strange to say, most of it comes from Christians!

The A.I.M. was called into being by the Lord Himself on August 1st, 1905, and was launched at His leading on 'faith lines'. By God's grace it has faithfully held to that position. We praise God for men and women whom He has called into the work and who are one with us and with one another in this vital matter and who would not change their position of dependence on God alone for any other on earth. The Federal Council asks every candidate are they fully aware of the principles of faith as practised in the A.I.M. and are they happy to work under these, and the candidate must reply in the affirmative.

But at the same time, we are all in the body of Christ and members one of another. While we look to no earthly source for supply, we know it usually comes in a perfectly natural way. God uses some child of His to meet a need and thus God is dependent upon His people in that sense. We believe therefore that we should use any means possible to bring the work and the workers before the Lord's people so that when God needs to use them He can remind them of what they already know. Are you ready and willing to be used of Him?

The Girl's Life Brigade, 1st and 3rd Darwin Companies, attended the morning service, this being



The S.S. "Wangarra" arrived in port last week. I⁺ carried the materials for four of the children's cottages.


Mr. Max Schenk and Mr. Neville Jones have taken delivery of most of the materials and have these on the block, ready for checking and erection.

A New Missionary Gives Her Testimony

The Editor asked Miss Doris Doherty to answer some of the questions usually asked of a new missionary. Here are her answers which we are sure will prove a blessing to our readers.

First of all, will you tell us just why you are going out as a Missionary?

Why am I going to the Mission Field? Firstly, I go in answer to my Lord and His great commission "Go YE into ALL the world and preach the gospel".

Secondly, it is because He has laid it on my heart personally, to "GO".



When did you first feel that you ought to go to the Mission Field?

When I was nine years of age my first desire came for the Mission Field, after hearing a faithful servant speak, while on deputation work. The desire remained throughout the following years, until I knew that I had to go into full time service for Him then, or never. What would you say really constituted your own specific call to the A.I.M. Field?

Through a series of circumstances the aborigines amongst whom the A.I.M. was working, were brought under my notice. I was asked to go to a prayer meeting with a girl from College, and it so happened it was A.I.M. This resulted in a definite surender to His Sovereign will one night shortly after, during my prayer time with Him, and the Lord made me fully aware that the aborigines were the people, and the A.I.M. the Mission, with whom I was to work.

When did you make application to the A.I.M.?

Application was made during my second year at Bible College, which was 1959.

What training have you had in view of this call to the Lord's service?

I entered as a student in the Sydney Missionary and Bible College, as I realised that I needed this training for the Mission Field. Now I find that the Lord uses other things I have learnt such as typing and ticket-writing.

Would you have been willing to go anywhere in the world for Christ's sake and the Gospel's?

In the first instance, I felt that my call was for missionary service overseas, and I would have been

willing to go had God wanted me to.

What advice would you give to young people who feel that God has spoken to them about service?

Are you wondering about full time service for the Lord?

From my own experience I would say, await God's leading and guidance, then be willing to obey Him, and trust the future to Him, not wanting to know the end from the beginning.

HOW THE LORD LED ME TO THIS WORK

Recently accepted for Service

Since the age of 16, except for almost two years during which I turned from the Lord and gave myself to the things of this world, the consciousness of God's call to service has been strong in my life.

Definite preparation for His service began just over five years ago when I commenced at the Methodist Home Mission College in Melbourne. The following year, as a Home Missionary in Victorian country towns, I learned many lessons from the Lord which have since been a great help and strength.

After this I completed two years of Bible study at Melbourne Bible Institute. The study itself, and the many phases of life at the Institute were richly blessed by the Lord. During this period though, I was not interested in our own aborigines, as my heart was set on serving God in the Sudan. However, after completing the three months Linguistic course in Melbourne in April, 1959, God closed the door to service in Africa and led me to Darwin to assist in



building work with the Aborigines Inland Mission. There, as I saw the work amongst the children at Retta Dixon Home and amongst the aborigines a⁴ Bagot and Delissaville I knew that these were the people with whom I was to serve Him.

As I go forward at His call and in His Name, I can look back with confidence and say—

"All the way my Saviour leads me

What have I to ask beside,

Can I doubt His tender mercy Who through life has been my Guide."

TESTING FOR CHRISTIANS AT BORROLOOLA

Recently a visit from members of another tribe brought about a series of Corroborees. The people here as the hosts first entertained their neighbours and the guests then returned the compliment. Toward the close of these festivities, the dancing and chanting continued until daybreak. Many of the children were present at some of these gatherings.

It can well be imagined how little attention could be paid to school work the following morning. In fact, one day we simply let some of them sleep on, one in the seat of the old Pontiac and two others in the shade of a tree, whilst others who could scarcely keep awake, we took to the garden. The effect on them, however,

is much more serious from the point of view of discipline than from merely physical tiredness.

This has meant a time of testing for our church members. We spoke as kindly as we could about attending these corroborees but even so, there was some misundestanding about our position in it all.

Later we met with about 23 of the men to discuss the whole matter and I believe they are clear now as to where 'we stand.

It was a great blessing that there was one man who carried the day when he said that the question of whether the Corroboree should be attended or not was purely an issue for the believers to decide for themselves. It was wonderful to hear him say this under the circumstances. This man, Simon, is a baptised member, as also are his wife and daughter.

During the Walkabout season two of the returning members had spoken in open meetings against the attendance at the Corroboree by those who would follow in the Christian way of life. Now Simon's forthright testimony borne before the men has led to all the be-

lievers taking a firm stand on the issue.

The result of the question having been brought up is much heart-searching, and opportunity is being taken to speak to certain of them individually. One of the men called in at the Mission House tonight and his wife is to come on another night this week. A second man has shown his regret for the part he took, and we shall seek opportunity to speak to as many as possible.

All such occurrences are, of course, the means of the furtherance of the Gospel, but pray that both wisdom and grace will be given us that many of the Christians will be led to a complete

MANY CENTRES IN CONDOBOLIN DISTRICT

We are glad to report definite blessing at this centre, but as is usual when this happens, Satan has been trying to hinder the Christians in their walk and witness, in many ways.
