BUILDING THE NEW CHILDREN'S HOME AT DARWIN

Another two cottages have been erected and work on the assembling of the next four has commenced. Most of the materials are here now, including the Supervisor's residence, the clinic and two labourers' cottages. Every building has to be assembled piece by piece of course.

Mr. Lynne Allen, our Building Superintendent, plans to have the main structures erected before the wet season commences, so that the interior work, such as lining and painting and the installation of cupboards can be carried out during the "wet".

Two more helpers, Mr. Ben Mason and Mr. Fred Pegus, have come to work on the building with the men already here. We expect another man Mr. McDonald of Wentworthville, this month.

Mr. Pegus is helping Mr. David

Barnes with the making of the dozens and dozens of built-in cupboards for the cottages. Mr. Barnes is a cabinet-maker and Mr. Pegus had some training in this at Cherbourg before going to the Bible Training Institute.

Please remember to pray for the men working on this big project. We are having some very heavy humid weather just now and it is not easy to keep at it, day after day, with so much to be done.

Mr. Mason and Mr. Pegus are sharing in the spiritual work also. Last Sunday Mr. Mason conducted our Sunday School prize-giving service. He carried the children with him in the chorus singing and they hung on every word of the story he told them.

MORE THAN RICE AT HUMPTY DOO

A brief account of a visit to an Outstation from Darwin, described by Mrs. W. J. Parish

Down along the bitumen to the "22 mile", out 12 miles along the road towards the rice fields, then in three miles to the south—just a woman alone and a group of natives. The Manager was away in hospital, but we were kindly welcomed by his wife at the Humpty Doo homestead.

We blinked as we passed the fernery which was the north wall of the kitchen and came into the light of a pressure lamp. Already we saw small dark faces peeping at us round a curtained doorway. Our baby Timothy and they looked at each other curiously and smiled.

Here in this big open room, with smooth cement floor, and ceiling of thick bark held up by stout knotted tree trunks which had stood there for some 70 years, we prepared to hold a meeting.

As soon as the projector was connected to the battery of the homestead's Holden the native women and old men were called up from their camp. The native stockmen were out mustering at this time.

As we watched the screen and at the same time, saw beyond the ferns, the stars, somehow the stories of Jesus seemed sweeter and His peace deeper. We were sharing them with these people; people unhurried, unschooled, winsome.

Then after the meeting how good the sandwiches tasted, filled with homestead tomatoes; and the tea flavoured with goat's milk.

Greatly impressed with the plea-



sure of serving these less sophisticated native people we waved goodbye and started on our way back to the bitumen in the bright moonlight.

The Manager's wife turned back to her loyal company and a young native roused by our car lights lay down again on the ground to sleep by her baby. We went back to Darwin conscious of the joy of being in the Lord's service here.

Itinerating on the Western Side

of the Northern Territory

Here are some excerpts from Mr. Stretton's last letter.

"Mr. Main and I left Katherine last Wednesday (17th), for Willeroo Station (86 miles). What an awful road—it was better when it was a bush track.

About ten miles from Willeroo the trailer came off. I watched what would happen, well truly the Angel of the Lord is encamped about them that fear Him. The trailer went up on its end, wheeled around and ran to the side of the road. I was waiting to sec it break up and petrol, oil, swags, and food scatter everywhere, but bless the Lord it kept intact. I found only two bolts broken and with a few wacks with the hammer had it attached to the Rover again and on our way, arriving at the Station about sundown.

We were able to have a good meeting there and stayed Thursday to fix the trailer more securely. We also had another meeting on Thursday night.

Then we came 70 miles to here (Coolibah Station), the people still remembered us from our last visit. The Owner was away, but came home not long after we arrived and gave us the freedom of the place and a place in the homestead. He said, "I think you people are doing a wonderful joh, you can stay as long as you wish."

We had a good meeting on Friday night and it was a great joy to talk to the people after and ask them if they understood and to hear them say, "We believe." Well the Lord knoweth, them that are His.

Then Saturday I was able to fix the electric motor for the Owner for which he was very grateful. Had a meeting last night with the people again, then today Sunday was able to get those who were not working and talk with them. Tomorrow, Monday, the Lord willing, I am going to make the trailer pole more secure as there is a welding plant here and I can stay and have the use of it, praise the Lord! We will be leaving here on Tuesday morning for Timber Creek, I expect to be away for a few weeks vet.

The Lord willing, we will be going to Hookers Creek for a brief visit. I am not sure whether we will go into Newcastle Waters or go up through Top Springs on the way back. The Lord has certainly been with us thus far and know He will never leave us nor forsake us. Hallelujah! I am leaving this here to go out with the Coolibah mail next Friday or Saturday."

BAGOT RESERVE

At Koolpinyah I also visit the natives and have a talk with them in the late afternoon. Here two babies have been born recently, so the population is increasing!

Zelma was in hospital with her baby when I paid my first visit there after I returned from furlough, and how pleased she was to see me. Each month we notice a big difference in Victor as he is growing fast and Zelma and Morgan are very proud of him.

The other baby just six days old when we last visited at Koolpinyah, is William Henry, the son of Lena and Harry. They also have two other children, Aileen and Robert. I first met Lena and Harry when they spent some time in hospital several years ago. It was while Lena was in hospital that she came to know the Saviour.

At the present time Lent's grandfather is in hospital. He has been very ill, and how he loves to hear all about Lena and her children when I visit him. He also likes to hear about the Lord Jesus Christ and appreciates prayer.

HOSPITAL VISITATION

When I first visited Darwin hospital a few years ago there was only one native ward, women at one end and men at the other, but now there are four native wards, two of them being T.B. wards, one for men and the other for women. The natives there are from many places and I do praise God for the opportunities of speaking with them about the Lord and seeking to lead some to the Saviour.

This week there were two little girls in hospital very bady burned. When it is cold natives make a fire and lie beside it and these children from two different stations had rolled into the fire when asleep. They did appreciate the little talk I had with them. Please pray that they may come to know the Saviour while in hospital.

NEW MISSION HOUSE

While I am writing this there is a working bee over at the new house. Some Christian friends in Darwin are helping Messrs. Eldridge and Parish making and fitting doors, laying a lawn, fencing, etc. By the time you read this we should be living there.

Praise God that now we have a married couple to work here. Mr. and Mrs. Parish are settling into the work very well.

CHRISTIANS GROWING IN GRACE

We have continued cause for rejoicing as we see a quiet yet definite growth in the lives of many people.

One young woman has taken on herself the cleaning of the Church and the arranging of flowers. She has raked over the dirt floor after each meeting and on Sundays, arranging small bunches of flowers around the walls.

VISIT OF MINISTER FOR TERRITORIES

The building looked particularly nice one Sunday morning, and as it was on the eve of a visit to Borroloola by the Minister for Territories, the Hon. Paul Hasluck, I asked that they leave the flowers in position, just in case he decided to visit the camp. This he did and we were thrilled to learn later, that the floor had been raked and an extra row of flowers arranged around the walls.

The people responsible were not the Church members and yet acting on their own initiative, they thought sufficient of their Church to make it as attractive as possible.

We also had the privilege of a good talk with the Minister here in our Mission House and were very glad to be able to tell him our own thoughts and plans concerning the work here, and also the proposed move of the settlement to another site — Robinson River.

MEN OUT WORKING

We now have only five of the twenty church members in camp. The others have gone to wide spread cattle stations to work during the Dry Season. Yesterday two of the newest members went away.

This leaves our ranks ever decreasing, but we trust that being so scattered, it will mean an everwidening witness for Christ.

Last Sunday, another young woman expressed her desire for baptism and it is good to hear her voice taking part in the week night prayer meetings.

Many of our men are away working on the site of the proposed new settlement, about eighty miles away. I hope to visit there shortly. The beginning of the Wet will bring them all back of course, as well as so many people from the cattle stations.

At our prayer meetings, those present continually remember them in prayer, that they will be kept "well and strong" and that their own people will turn away from darkness and come into the Light.

Continue to pray with them to this end.

Later note — Mr. and Mrs. Stan Eldridge are planning to drive out early in September with a load of furniture for the school being given to us by the Welfare Dept. and they will also bring through a load of supplies and foodstuffs for us.



"WORKERS TOGETHER WITH GOD"

During the three months I have been here at Palm Island I have noted with gladness of heart the part taken by our people in the life, worship and activity of the A.I.M. Church of Palm Island. It is indeed a matter of praise to our Heavenly Father to see the faithfulness and willingness to not only believe but to do. "I will show thee my faith by my works" James 2: 18.

OUR PEOPLE AT WORSHIP

Each Sunday we see the people's participation in worship. Charlie Booter rings the bell before the service and hands out the hymn books and New Testaments as the people enter the Church and Mrs. Geia plays the organ. One of the men reads a Psalm each Sunday and sometimes the main Scripture portion also. Prayers are offered by either one of four men or ladies and at the Comuunion service Charlie Booter and Charlie Palmer usually give thanks for the bread and wine and serve the 20



or so communicants. A few of our ladies share the job of cleaning the Church, putting fresh flowers on the Communion table and near the pulpit and also attending to the preparation of the Communion table.

Before the commencement of the evening service six or seven of us gather first for prayer in the hall; during this service we appreciate the guitar and piano accordeon accompaniment for the hymns and items by two or three of our young men. Sometimes for the items we have a men's trio or a group of the dormitory girls or other vocal arrangements. Other times there may be a mouth-organ solo or instrumental item.

On Wednesday night we also have a vocal or musical contribution. After this mid-week service we have a prayer meeting with about 12 or more people praying for our Church and people both at Palm Island and on the mainland as well as for others such as Billy Graham, the Christians in Africa, Dr. Fuller and the "Back to the Bible" preachers and broadcasts from America.

Recently seven or eight of our Christians offered to assist as teachers or teacher's aids in the Sunday School due to an increased attendance of children.

Then there is the participation in work — the activities of the Church, from preparing supper and washing up afterwards at our

Youth Fellowship to assisting with the building of the new mission house. We have had the assistance of six or seven men for the past two Saturdays and previous Saturdays one or two of the young men helped with the excavating. young man gave much of his spare time after work during the week to help us. There is much to do and their good help is much appreciated. particularly with concrete work for the foundation piers and also the alteration of the ground levels has meant the digging and moving of much earth.

The attractive lawn and garden at the Church and the mission house garden and grounds is evidence of the helpfulness of Charlie Booter, our yardman.

For the coming Palm Island Show our people are busy making articles for the A.I.M. stall—from the preparation of coral and shells to making boomerangs, coathangers and clothes. The proceeds of this stall go to the Church funds and thus afford our people the opportunity of assisting their Church.

It is great to see the keenness of some who have only come to the Lord this year and in the past month or two as they seek to serve Him Who came that they may have life and have it more abundantly.

Miss C. PRESNELL CALLED HOME

Miss Christine Presnell, a retired missionary of the A.I.M. was called into the King's presence on August 14, at the age of 86. After a Service at the Cooce Methodist Church, the body was laid to rest at Wivenhoe near Burnie. Mr. and Mrs. W. Tate and Mrs. E. Hays represented the Mission at the services.

Miss Presnell was accepted by the Federal Council on June 24, 1929 at an age when most people are looking foward to retirement. No one has ever regretted making an exception to the age limit for her, as she proved to be one of the most faithful stalwarts of the Mission.

At the time of the Jubilee Conference in 1955, Miss Presnell wrote this testimony:

"Over twenty-six years ago, the Lord called me and I answered. I count these the best years of my life. From the beginning the Lord gave me a great Love for our dear dark brothers and sisters whom I had never seen before. I should love to give more years of Service but it is not possible. (She was then 81) I look forward to the time when I shall meet some of the dear ones up yonder."

Miss Presnell made a deep impression on every fellow-worker and no one will ever know how faithfully she supported the work out of her meagre finances, even after retirement. We have asked two previous fellow-workers to write a short tribute to our beloved sister, now beholding Him Whom she loved and served so faithfully. Here are their own words:

Miss Presnell was a fellowworker, beloved, a woman of faith, prayer, vision, wisdom, wit understanding and many other qualities. She did much to mould my young life as a missionary and we were real friends. There was always love and understanding between us.

I feel I have lost a real prayer partner as each one of her fellowworkers could and would testify. I first met here 25 years ago as we travelled down to Cummeragunja in Southern N.S.W. We worked together, slept together and prayed together. I was so much her junior, but always felt one with her. She was very wise in her dealings with the Government and also the people, and the Lord blessed her and used her for His Glory.

MRS. MURIEL BOWEN

At the age of 55 years, Miss Presnell came to me at Woorabinda to commence her Missionary service. I cannot recall any worker who fitted into the work more quickly or had such maturity right from the start.

Being of a sympathetic and deeply spiritual nature, and having a very keen sense of humour, she was readily accepted by our native people and her ministry became a very real part of their like.

Miss Presnell was a woman of prayer. I remember on one ocassion how a woman, who had been under a conviction of sin, became literally demon possessed, rolling on the ground and foaming at the mouth. Miss Presnell stood over her and claiming the power of the Blood of Jesus Christ, prayed for her deliverance. She was immediately delivered and lay prostrate. Later this woman came through for the Lord Jesus Christ.

Miss Presnell was just as ready to play games with the children, or to entertain the people at the Mission House. In every way she was an ideal fellow-worker. I count it a privilege to have worked with her.
