## It's Alternative Government Time!

Be Afraid! Be Very Afraid!

Although no radicalized Muslim from Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, or Yemen has killed an American in the U.S. since Sept. 11, 2001, last Friday President Trump issued an Executive Order banning immigration by anyone from those countries. The order created chaos in airports around the country, and caused innumerable disruptions for thousands of innocent travelers. It was a great victory for national security.

On Monday, Acting Attorney General Sally Yates announced that unless someone could convince her that the immigration ban was legal, she was not going to enforce it. That got her fired within hours. The Justice Department needs more like her, not fewer. She issued the memo in September, 2015 which established a new and desperately-needed Justice policy: corporate executives would no longer be exempt from criminal prosecution. She ought to be the Attorney General, not Jeff Sessions.

The travel ban was reportedly cooked up, *sans* input from Justice Department lawyers, by Bannon and policy advisor Stephen Miller, neither of whom is a lawyer. Miller, who was four years old when Yates was sworn in as a Justice Department lawyer, complained that Yates' action was "a further demonstration of how politicized our legal system has become."

Trump issued a statement saying Yates had "betrayed the Department of Justice." Yates' oath, though, is not to the Department of Justice, or the Executive Branch of which it is a part, but to the Constitution. That distinction is apparently too subtle for our Commander in Chief to comprehend.

On Tuesday, the *Monitor* ran a column on labor by a guest columnist, Richard Berman, billing himself as the executive director of the Center for Union Facts.

Berman's concern for workers is like a lion's concern for gazelles. Speaking at a June, 2014 event sponsored by the Western Energy Alliance, attended by representatives of Exxon, Halliburton, and other usual suspects, Berman was secretly taped saying, "I get up every morning and I try and figure out how to screw with the labor unions."

The Center for Media and Democracy describes Berman's *modus* 

operandi as "the strategy of forming dozens of non-profit front groups, attack-dog web sites, and alleged think tanks that defend his corporate clients' interests by attacking their critics, allowing his paying clients to remain out of public view."

In the late 1990s, Berman published a newsletter claiming that Alar, a gas used to delay the ripening of apples, was safe for children to consume. It was later found to be carcinogenic. In 2007, he began a campaign touting the safety of indoor tanning beds. It ended in a settlement with the Federal Trade Commission.

While Berman's column mentioned Right to Work in passing, his eye was really on a larger prize: the Employee Rights Act. John A. Logan, a professor at San Francisco State University, wrote in 2014 that the bill was "so reactionary

it could have been penned by the Koch brothers themselves. In the name of 'protecting' employee rights, the ERA would make it extraordinarily difficult for workers to choose unions and would give a virtual pass to unscrupulous corporations that coerce and intimidate employees. While it won't become law while the Democrats control the White House, the ERA provides an illustration of the draconian legislation that Republicans will unleash on workers if they win control of both the presidency and the Congress in 2016."

Uh, woops — here comes the nationwide campaign to reintroduce feudalism.

Since Douglass never knew the


date of his birth, he was free to celebrate it whenever he pleased. He chose February 14.



## When Will Paradise Be Regained?

Four years ago last October, workers employed by country club owner William "Bill" Binnie obliterated a small gravel public parking lot built and maintained by the Town of Rye. They also erected a trio of barricades, composed of boulders, bushes, and a fence, effectively preventing members of the public from crossing a narrow piece of Binnie's property to spend some time at the water's edge.

Binnie, through these actions, had effectively enclosed Sanders Poynt, a tiny locale which had been, for all practical purposes, held in common by all mankind since the retreat of the glaciers more than ten thousand years ago. [For brevity's sake we'll skip over the awkward transfer from Abenaki to European custody.] The irony, of course, is that Binnie is himself an immigrant from Scotland, where, during the 18th and 19th centuries, thousands upon thousands of ordinary people were displaced by the wealthy through the process of enclosure.

## Immediate Resistance

Then as now, the citizenry were outraged, and a number of them showed up at the Rye Board of Selectmen's meeting of November 15, 2012 to say so. All too often, when wealth throws its weight around, those who are outraged are of modest means, and may therefore be ignored. This time, though, a neighbor named Robert Jesurum could afford to bring along his lawyer, Paul McEachern.

To his everlasting credit, Jesurum sued Binnie and kept up the fight all the way to the New Hampshire Supreme Court — despite Binnie's explicit threat to drag out the proceedings, with the expressed intention of forcing Jesurum to drop the suit.

In another memorable act of defiance, after Binnie "generous-ly" offered access to the beach at Sanders Poynt by a supposedly convenient alternate route, about a dozen members of The Leftist Marching Band, followed by an equal number of citizens-at-large, took him up on his impractical



offer. They played their boisterous repertoire on April 13th, 2013, while marching jauntily along a circuitous route hundreds of feet long which wound between several holes of his golf course.

## Death by 1,000 Motions? No!

True to his threat, Binnie paid his lawyer Benjamin King to fire a seemingly endless barrage of legal documents at the Superior Court — to no avail: Jesurum won. Undaunted, and apparently still flush, Binnie appealed to the New Hampshire Supreme Court. He lost on December 9th, 2016, but appealed. Finally, on January 19th, the Supreme Court told him, in layman's terms, "beat it."

#### Redress, Finally?

Given the man's demonstrated obstinacy, we spoke with Jacob Marvelley, an attorney working with McEachern, and asked if Binnie might take the matter to the U.S. Supreme Court.

"It's a fair question," he said. "He would have to cite some grounds for relief, though, and the matter has already been thoroughly litigated. I don't think there are any real grounds for him to do it [but] procedurally it's within the realm of possibility. It would be a real stretch, though."

We also asked by email if there is any established timeframe within which the Wentworth must comply and restore access, parking, and so forth.

"With the close of the Supreme Court appeal," Marvelley wrote, "the Rockingham Superior Court regained jurisdiction over the case. The Superior Court has not set a deadline, but did note the following in its Order On the Merits dated August 20, 2015: "The Court assumes that the parties will work together to effectuate the Court's order, but the Court will not hesitate to order further equitable relief, along with the assessment of costs, should any party fail to comply."

"Mr. Jesurum will press for the defendants to perform the remediation work in a timely manner."

McEachern, according to Jesurum, has requested confirmation from King "that his client will restore Sanders Poynt to its previous condition prior to April 1, so that we can perform a re-dedication of Sanders Poynt at that date."

We are inquiring whether there might be some legislative remedy to correct the Supreme Court's error in failing to require Binnie to pay Jesurum's legal expenses.

The Coastal Conservation Association of New Hampshire is accepting donations to reimburse Jesurum for those expenses. So far just \$4,825 has been collected. Donations can be made at *ccanh. org/sanders-poynt*.

To the Editor:

America wants *you* to write a letter today to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial (The Wall) for delivery on Memorial Day. Over the past two years we have solicited letters from folks just like you to deliver to The Wall on Memorial Day. Now it's your turn.

Do you remember the American War in Vietnam? I mean really remember it — from deep in your bones — because you actually lived through it. Perhaps as a soldier, perhaps as a conscientious objector, perhaps as a youngster caught up in your family's pain and anguish, perhaps as a dedicated street protestor, or perhaps as a friend or a lover of a soldier. Perhaps as an orphan or a grandchild who never met her grandfather. Perhaps as a citizen of Vietnam or Cambodia or Thailand. I am sure I am missing other important scenarios, but you get the picture. That war is an indelible part of your psyche, like it or not.

We in Veterans For Peace's "Vietnam Full Disclosure" project are concerned that your voice is not being heard. By whom, you might ask. Answer: by those too young to have witnessed the scourge of this war who think they can learn "the truth" from the Pentagon's revisionist history. And that re-writing of our lives is what is going on right now as we are being more and more inundated by so-called "fifty year commemorations."We in VFP have dedicated a fair amount of time in bers from VFP will then print out resisting the game plan of our gov-

ernment to mythologize the war and, subsequently, to justify it and, eventually, to use it as a backdrop for future wars.

So, we are doing something about that. Over the past few years we have sponsored teach-ins and panel discussions; we have barraged the Pentagon with letters pointing out the fallacies of their own web page; we are actively working with our chapter in Vietnam to help heal the victims of Agent Orange and Unexploded Ordnance. And we are writing letters to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Say what?

That's right. Over the past two years we have delivered hundreds of letters so far, and we are looking for yours to deliver this Memorial Day. Here's how we do it — we collect the letters, we place them in business-sized envelopes with the tops slit open, we write "Please Read Me" on the outside of the envelopes, and then at 10:30 a.m. on Memorial Day we walk down The Wall from both sides, placing the letters at the foot of The Wall (if a soldier's name is referenced in a letter, we leave that letter at the foot of the panel where his or her name appears).

So what? Well, these past two years we have watched visitors to The Wall on Memorial Day pick up these letters and hug and cry and look more deeply into the black granite before them. And we also watch the National Parks Service as they collect the letters to put into the national archives for future displays. Oh, and by the way, we are also publishing letters — our most recent book Letters To The Wall that shares 150 of these letters has been available since August of 2016. You can buy a discounted copy by going to LuLu.com and typing the title into their search engine (it is listed in their History section). Our voices are being heard. Please join us.

Here's how. If you are moved to write a letter, you can email it to rawlings@maine.edu before May 15, 2017. It's that simple. Memyour letter, place it in an envelope, and deliver your letter as you have written it to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial on May 29th at 10:30 a.m. If you want to join us for this ceremony, please let me know.

Please note that we consider The Wall to be something akin to "sacred ground," so we do not perform political actions there; we will treat your words with the respect they deserve. You may sign your letter with your full name, or not. Up to you. Also note that by sending us your letter you are giving us permission to do three things — possibly publish your letter to our website (vietnamfulldisclosure.org); publicly display your words at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial on Memorial Day, 2017; and, possibly, include your letter in the next edition of our Letters To The Wall collection. Finally, we want all to know that we acknowledge the devastation brought down on the heads of millions and millions of Southeast Asian people during the American War in Vietnam. Last year we unfolded a banner in D.C. to that effect. We will do the same this year.

We encourage you to visit our website at vietnamfulldisclosure. org to see what we are about and to sign our pledge to tell the truth about the American War in Vietnam; we encourage you to purchase our book, read it, and then give it to a local school library to help their students enrich their research on the war; but, most importantly, we encourage you to write your letter. We need to hear from you. America needs to hear from you.

## Excuses, 1917

by William Marvel

Tanuary 31 marked the centennial of the campaign to bring the United States into the great European war on the side of the Allies. On that day Count Johann von Bernstorff, the German ambassador to the U.S., wrote a note for President Woodrow Wilson announcing that after February 1, 1917, German submarines would resume unrestricted warfare. Any vessels found on their way to France or England would be sunk without warning, including those flying neutral flags.

The Allies, and especially England, desperately wanted American troops to join their side in a war that had ground to a stalemate and exhausted all the major participants. Von Bernstorff had held the message back to await his government's response to Wilson's offer of mediating a "peace without victory" that would put the warring nations back on equal footing. England in particular found that unappealing, and the offer went unaccepted so long that the transatlantic communications lag forced the German ambassador to deliver his fateful message.


With the memory of the *Lu*-

sitania less than two years old, the message led to von Bernstorff being handed his passport as Wilson severed diplomatic relations with Germany. Still, there seemed no reason yet for going to war. That last step came only when British intelligence supplied Wilson with an intercepted wireless message to von Bernstorff from Germany's foreign secretary, Arthur Zimmermann. Anticipating war with the U.S. over another Lusitania incident, Zimmerman instructed his Washington envoy to offer his Mexican counterpart a potential alliance. If Mexico would declare war and help the Kaiser win by engaging American troops along its border, Germany would assure the return of all the lands Mexico had lost after the Mexican War.

Wilson never questioned the validity of the alleged interception. Those who were opposed to intervention knew the desire of the English for American involvement, and suspected it as a British hoax, but Wilson and the press swallowed it whole. Within ten weeks, Wilson had abandoned his neutral stance and asked for a declaration of war.

For another four decades, it was generally accepted that the Zimmermann telegram had been planted by the British to lure the U.S. into the fight against Germany, and of course that is exactly why they shared it. The proposal seemed too preposterous to be credited, and there were those who supposed the Americans themselves had made it up, as an excuse for their third invasion of Mexico since 1913. Readers of the "Pentagon Papers" and those who remember the mythical weapons of mass destruction in Iraq could easily understand the widespread disbelief. So many American wars had already been started on flawed information or falsehoods, including the wars with Mexico and Spain, that the chances of chicanery seemed good, but as usual nationalistic frenzy over-

came cautious skepticism. Not until 1958 did one of the 20th century's best independent scholars examine the case and conclude that the telegram was genuine. The coup belonged to Barbara Tuchman, whom I think of as the "housewife historian" for her refusal to let stay-at-home motherhood interfere with her intellectual pursuits. She discovered and interviewed two survivors of the intelligence team that decod-



ed the message, and even found Zimmermann's own implicit admission that he had written it, during the effort to learn how it had been intercepted.

Genuine or not, the telegram would have meant nothing had the Allies accepted Wilson's peacemaking offer — because, had they done so, Germany would almost certainly have followed suit. A negotiated peace would incidentally have saved a few million lives; it might have come too late to avert the Russian Revolution, but it would probably have prevented the crushing terms imposed on Germany at the end of the war. Had American intervention not tipped the balance to the Allies, such terms could never have been demanded, and Germans would not have suffered the economic collapse and national humiliation that fueled the rise of the Nazi Party.

Without Hitler, whose popularity was grounded in that harsh peace, the sequence of events that began the Second World War would have been interrupted. Had the Allies not been preoccupied with the Axis Powers, Japan might not have had the temerity to attack U.S. and British forces in the Pacific in 1941. Brushfire wars and full-fledged conflagrations have been the norm since then in South Asia and the Middle East, and most of them emerged from the political debris of the world

Other conflicts might have replaced those of the past century had the Great War ended earlier, but no one can say that they would have been worse, considering the destructive capabilities we unharnessed in 1945. If time could be reversed and one event changed, everything that followed would be different. It may do no good to speculate what the world might be like had another choice been made on January 31, 1917 — but it is worth wondering the same about events today.





## Admiral Fowle's Piscataqua River Tidal Guide (Not for Navigational Purposes)

Portsmouth, arguably the first town in this country not founded by religious extremists, is bounded on the north and east by the Piscatagua River, the second, third, or fourth fastest-flowing navigable river in the country, depending on

whom you choose to believe. The Piscataqua's ferocious current is caused by the tide, which, in turn, is caused by the moon. The other player is a vast sunken valley — Great Bay — about ten miles upriver. Twice a day, the moon

drags about seventeen billion gallons of seawater - enough to fill 2,125,000 tanker trucks the river and into Great Bay. This creates a roving hydraulic conflict, as incoming sea and the outgoing river collide. The skirmish line

moves from the mouth of the river, up past New Castle, around the bend by the old Naval Prison, under Memorial Bridge, past the tugboats, and on into Great Bay. This can best be seen when the tide is rising.

Twice a day, too, the moon lets all that water go. All the seawater that just fought its way upstream goes back home to the ocean. This is when the Piscataqua earns its title for xth fastest current. Look for the red buoy, at the upstream end of

Badger's Island, bobbing around in the current. It weighs several tons, and it bobs and bounces in the current like a cork. The river also has its placid moments, around high and low tides.

Ships coming in laden with coal, oil, and salt do so at high tide, for more clearance under their keels They leave empty, riding high in the water, at low tide, to squeeze under Memorial Bridge.


