badly injured fan OUT of a coma.

Battling Sean Luckett, 20, came straight out of his nightmare ordeal when the manager stood beside his hospital bed.

Sean, from Claverdon, Warwicks, broke into a broad smile as he saw Kenny and the entire Liverpool football team around him and whispered: "Kenny Dalglish."

His mum and dad wept as they saw him awake for the first time since he was badly crushed at Hillsborough on Saturday.

And last night doctors hailed his recovery as "absolutely amazing."

Dr David Edbrooke, consultant anaesthetist at the Hallamshire Hospital in Sheffield said: "I've never

# Olt's all seats **O**All tickets And all over

PREMIER Margaret Thatcher last night revolutionised soccer safety at a stroke.

She ordered sweeping changes to the national game which has become a national disgrace.

Football chiefs will be told to SCRAP death-trap terraces and make matches ALL-TICKET and ALL-SEATING events.

The Prime Minister issued her demands in the wake of the Hillsborough disaster which left her devastated.

Crowd control barriers and perimeter fences — which helped slaughter 94 Liverpool fans in Saturday's crush — will eventually be abolished.

And the Sheffield tragedy



has reinforced Mrs Thatcher's determination that ALL fans must carry identity cords identity cards.

The new laws are almost certain to be pushed through in time for next year's soccer season.

Clubs will be **STRIPPED** of their licences if they fail to introduce the measures as fast as possible. Mrs

Continued from Page One Thatcher told an emergency meeting of ministers in Downing Street:
"This nightmare must never happen again."
Her ultimatum signals the end of an era in which soccer clubs treated fans as second-class citizens.

Home Secretary Doug-

Home Secretary Douglas Hurd spelled out the measures in a Commons statement.

He set up an urgent inquiry by Lord Justice Taylor into the Hillsborough catastrophe and told MPs: "This a devastating tragedy.

#### CROWD

"The Government believes the future of football in this country lies in a national membership scheme in designated grounds and, now it seems, also in providing all-seating accommodation at major football clubs.

"This would involve the disappearance of terraces grounds." at those

The tough new mea-sures will slash crowd numbers, with each seat taking the space of sev-eral standing spectators.

Ticket prices will soar to the levels found elsewhere in Europe.
"It works there and it

can work here," Mrs Thatcher told Ministers. The Prime Minister is contemptuous of soccer chiefs who claim they cannot afford to scrap their lucrative terrace "cattle pens."

She insists they must put the safety of their fans FIRST and multi-million pound transfer fees for players LAST.

fees for players LAST.

Mrs Thatcher — wearing a black dress — sat alongside Mr Hurd as he announced the terms of Judge Taylor's inquiry which starts today.

Mr Hurd said the police decision to let latecomers surge through a gate at Hillsborough will be a central issue in the investigation.

He rejected pleas by Tory and Labour MPs to shelve the identity card plan until the inquiry is over.

Opponents of the scheme claim it will cause more trouble as fans gather outside grounds, waiting to go through turnstyles.

GRIEVING mum Linda Howard had a premonition of horror at the **EXACT** moment her husband and son died at Hillsborough.

Linda ,35, said last night: "My stomach sank and I knew something unspeakable had happened. I felt the breath go out of them."

The slim brunette's 39-year-old husband and 14-year-old son — both named Tommy — were among the 94 Liverpool fans crushed to death during Saturday's FA Cup semi-final against Nottingham Forest.

After the pair set off from their home in Runcorn, Cheshire, Linda took her other children — Gail, eight, and Alan, 11 — to the cinema, as she did so often on match, days

She said: "The film had barely begun when I started to go hot and cold. I

Pretty Sarah, 20 — who is expecting her first baby in July — watched husband Steve and his younger brother Andy in the packed

terraces. But she did not realise tragedy was about to shatter her life.

"I saw them just before the kick-off," she said yesterday.

"They looked fine and seemed safe. Then the gates opened."

Heartbroken Sarah, Wrexham, Clwyd, sobbed: "After I heard fans had been injured, I couldn't

get through on the emergency numbers."

Her brother-in-law Andy, 22, told how he Andy, 22, told now ne watched helplessly as 26year-old Steve — who had not missed a Liverpool home game in five years — was swallowed up in

the crowd.

"Just as the game kicked off there was a huge surge of people at the back of the terraces," Andy said.

"I got pushed within a

few feet of the fence. I lost sight of my brother. "People were going over the top of us to escape the crush. I was trying to save my own life."

#### Escape

Andy squeezed under a barrier and managed to get to the back of the terraces.


"I saw eight or 10 bodies with coats over them," he said.

"I pulled some of them back to see if one was my brother.

"I went back to the ground several times in the hope of finding him alive."



Hillsborough steward Jack Stone had just REFUSED to open the gates himself.

He used two wooden poles to reinforce the steel gates as they buck-led under the weight of bodies outside.

When police demanded the keys, he handed them over but said: "This is your responsibility not mine."

Mr Marshall, a qualified lawyer, refused to comment yesterday.

The father of two, who lives in the Stocksbridge area of Sheffield, said: "There is nothing I want to say at this stage."

**CRIPPLE** whose mind was twisted by porn videos was jailed for life yesterday for the horrific rape, torture and murder of nineyear-old Tiffany Hoiles.

Trevor Owen, 32, who spent day after day watching a sick movie about a schoolgirl being raped, screamed his innocence after being sentenced.

But Mr Justice Macpherson told him: "You have been convicted on the clearest evidence. You are a very dangerous man." dangerous man'

Owen, who has massive strength in

his arms despite being born with spina bifida, stabbed Tiffany 70 times with scissors after raping her in woods at Blandford, Dorset, last August.

The attack was triggered after years watching evil movies.

Owen had built up a film and video library specialising in the rape and torture of schoolgirls.

And the jobless pervert got his kicks watching them morning, noon, and night in his bedroom which he had secretly converted into a sex den.

One of his few friends, neighbour Jim-Roebuck, discovered Owen's sick obses-sion when he bought a projector from him. Father-of-four Jim, 25, said:

He gave me four films which he said would be interesting.

The first one was called Rape of a Schoolgirl and showed graphically how a youngster in uniform was attacked and tied up on her bed.

When I asked Trevor about it he said it was his favourite.

But he said he had watched it so much the quality had gone on the film and it was flickering.

#### Cunning

He said his mum only came in the bedroom for a couple of minutes a day to make the bed and had no idea about his sex library. I thought he was mad.

But Owen's physical disabilities hid a cunning

Jim said: "He looks as if he is on day release from a mental hospital but he uses that to his advantage.

"He also has a cruel and sadistic streak which I found out to my horror.

One day Owen caught a cat eating his pond goldfish.

goldfish.

He smashed its head with a 3lb hammer before Jim could stop him.

Welder Jim said: "Trevor just laughed. Although I realised he was capable of inflicting cruelty on an animal I didn't think he could do it to a little girl."

But Jim knew Owen was

But Jim knew Owen was the killer as soon as police described the murder

#### Rage

The seven-inch razorsharp scissors were among SEVEN pairs which the pervert hoarded.

Owen, who lived only 50 yards from Tiffany in Blandford, is believed to have spent days looking for a victim.

He was quizzed within hours of her disappearance because he had two convictions for indecently assaulting young girls

And forensic evidence linking him to the murder was overwhelming.

Owen was found guilty at Winchester Crown Court by a majority verdict. The judge said he had no men-tal illness.

Afterwards detectives said he had never shown sorrow for Tiffany — only for himself.

LIVERPOOL boss Kenny Dalglish last night opened his heart on the Hillsborough disaster and said: "The FA Cup is not worth one life, let alone nearly 100."

Dalglish was speaking after leading his team on an emotional visit back to the scene of Saturday's tragedy and laying a wreath to the 94 fans who died.

A devastated Dalglish and the players then went on to meet injured supporters recovering in two Sheffield hospitals.

And the Anfield chief insisted soccer's bosses let the fans themselves decide whether this season's FA Cup competition goes on. tition goes on.

"Everyone who died loved us and we loved them," he said. "They have died for us, not because of us, and we want to do something to please them.

"No-one wants to play at the moment and foot-ball has been suspended for the time being.

"The players want to do what is best for the bereaved people, not what is best for Liverpool FC or the FA Cup. If the people say they don't want us to play, we will respect it. respect it.

#### Wept

"The most important people at this time are those who have suffered bereavement and their considerations should be

in everyone's mind.
"Someone has to make a decision. Let's hope they take everything into consideration.


"Football has been my life for 30 years. I know how much I am grateful for it but I haven't even thought about it over the last few days."

He added: "Our hearts to the program who

He said: "I was helpless to do anything. I stood and watched and I'm sure I saw many of them as they were literally dying but there was nothing I could do. It was a terrible feeling.

"I saw a lot of what happened and I feel deep sorrow.
