Liberals on track for majority in Nova Scotia

Progressive Conservatives close to NDP in second place

TORONTO, OCTOBER 7, 2013 - In a random sampling of public opinion taken by the Forum Poll tm among 961 residents of Nova Scotia 18 years of age and older, close to one half will vote Liberal in the election being held Tuesday, October 8 (48%), compared to just more than a quarter who will vote NDP (26%) and just fewer who will vote Conservative (23%). Very few will vote Green (3%). Liberal support is common to the wealthiest (\$80K to \$100K - 55%), those who live in Cape Breton (53%) and Catholics (57%). Of note, 4- in-10 of those who voted NDP last time will vote Liberal on Tuesday (37%) as will 3-in-10 past Conservative voters (30%). In contrast, just 1-in-10 past Liberal voters will vote NDP (10%) or Conservative (10%).

If these results were projected to seat counts in a 51 seat house, the Liberals would take a 10 seat majority of 36 seats to 10 for the NDP and 5 for the Conservatives.

Methodology

The Forum Poll™ was conducted by Forum Research with the results based on an interactive voice response telephone survey of 961 randomly selected Nova Scotians 18 years of age and older. The poll was conducted on October 7, 2013. The following numbers of households were contacted for this poll:

October 4th: 28,344 October 5th: 23,980 October 6th: 27,341 October 7th: 28,868

Results based on the total sample are considered accurate +/- 3%, 19 times out of 20. Subsample results will be less accurate. Margins of error for subsample (such as age, gender) results are available at www.forumresearch.com/samplestim.asp

Where appropriate, the data has been statistically weighted to ensure that the sample reflects the actual population according to the latest Census data.
