

My research

- Uses time use data
 - diaries of all we do
- Collected by national statistical agencies
- Count up, make visible, give context








Total paid and unpaid work by age and gender





The division of paid and unpaid work by age, gender and household type




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
Young adults' unpaid domestic work by living arrangements and gender









Time changes with parenthood

Time quality matters too

- Pure 'adult' leisure
- Multitasking childcare and leisure
- Multitasking unpaid work (e.g. housework and childcare)
- Interruption, task switching
- Routine childcare (physical, travel) vs non-routine (playing, reading, talking)



Superannuation balances of men and








Distribution of super tax concessions
