

Bay Cove Human Services Gill Center Wellness Fair: Bay Cove is a private, not-for-profit corporation that provides a wide variety of services to individuals and their families who face the challenges of developmental disabilities, aging, mental illness and drug and alcohol addiction. One of Bay Cove's sites, the Michael J. Gill Wellness Center is born out of the Community Based Flexible Support (CBFS) holistic approach to recovery. The Gill Wellness Center Fair has the vision to create opportunities for individuals to achieve the fullest of health and well-being. Groups are open to explore individual choices for lifestyle modifications in the areas of stress management, smoking cessation, physical activity, and nutrition. AAPHD members promoted oral health and provided dental screenings. This service program gave members of AAPHD BU chapter an opportunity to learn more about the oral health issues that affect adults and their families who live with mental illness, addiction disorders or developmental disabilities.

1. Please describe the major educational programs your chapter conducted in 2016.

- The 1st Annual Dental Public Health Conference for students was held at NYU College of Dentistry on February 28th, 2016. Dental, dental hygiene and nursing students were invited from NYU College of Dentistry, Rutgers University, Stony Brook, and Columbia. The theme was "breaking barriers" in public health dentistry and focused on key issues surrounding the topic. The day was structured with two keynote speakers bookending the day and breakout session groups to stimulate discussion amongst the participants. Dr. Habib Benzian, renowned public health dentist/oral surgeon who co-authored the Oral Health Atlas, opened the conference as one of our keynote speakers focusing on student engagement in Global Oral Health. Dr. Jo Frencken, renowned public health dentist who developed and validated the atraumatic restorative technique, ended the conference speaking about how he developed atraumatic restorative dentistry and practically applies it around the world. The breakout sessions during the day focused on: breaking barriers in the public schools, local community, global community, geriatrics, and free clinics. Students had the opportunity to discuss current barriers to access in dental care and how these barriers may be overcome. (120 students attended)
- We provide quarterly "lunch and learn" sessions with distinguished faculty where students can discuss current controversies in dentistry such as water fluoridation, systemic health overlap with oral health, and the use of trained dental auxiliary staff to extend access to healthcare. (55 students attended)
- We provided an informational session on current federally funded opportunities to work in areas of need after graduating dental school, with a speaker who is a current dentist in an NHSC program who shared her experience. We encouraged students to apply to the NHSC programs and the Students to Service program that was offered for the class of 2017. (80 students attended)

2. Please describe the major service programs your chapter conducted in 2016.

- Community Engagement Grant Project with Sixth Street Community Center: We have organized a community outreach program from the grant received with a local community center to do oral screenings, oral hygiene instructions, provide fluoridated toothpaste and toothbrushes, and apply fluoride varnish to students in the local community from ages 7-14. We will be working closely with this community center, as most of the children who attend this center do not have access to fluoridated water and toothpaste.
- Students also participated in an outreach in the local community at St. Peter's Church. We spent the day packing grocery bags full of fresh and canned produce and distributing them to the hungry.

3. Please describe the major research programs your chapter conducted in 2016.

As part of Phase 2 of our pre-doctoral Dental Public Health program, students who participated in Phase 1 of the program are given the opportunity to embark on a research project. Participating students are paired with faculty members in areas of their interest. Completed projects are presented in the form of a research poster at our annual Dental Public Health Day. 3. Please describe the major research programs your chapter conducted in 2016.

The Evolving Pipeline of Hispanic Dentist in the US: Practice and Policy Implications

The research is being conducted by a Dental Public Health resident as a part of the DPH curriculum. This research is funded under a cooperative agreement with the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and led by Dr. Elizabeth Mertz. As part of our study we are interested in learning more about the history and context of the advanced standing (AS) / International Dentist Programs (IDP) in US. We are seeking to understand how changes in education and regulation over the last 20 years may be impacting the pipeline of Hispanic / Latino (H/L) dentists.

The H/L dentist population is disproportionately small compared to the rapidly growing and historically underserved H/L population in the U.S. Current domestic enrollment has been rising but is not expected to narrow the gap in parity. Further, 50% of H/L dentists are foreign born, and 25% of H/L dentists were trained outside the U.S. There is a concern that the recent shift away from direct licensure of foreign-trained dentists (FTD) to utilization of AS/IDP in U.S. dental schools may further restrict the overall numbers of H/L dentists.
