

Chile: 5 – 15 September 2017

A place renowned for its majestic beauty, Chile is home to some of the precious few untouched wild places we have left on our planet, where serendipity takes over. Yet it is a country not without its struggles. Local communities are feeling the pressure of globalisation and threats to local livelihoods from multinationals and outside forces. Chile today is on the threshold of a brave new emergence.

Trip Details

Join us on this incredible journey and be part of our travelling conversation, our shared insights, and our growing understanding of an incredible country and its people.

The local communities who will host and welcome us are feeling the impacts of the shifting world they are situated in and are really looking forward to us coming. They have asked us specifically to engage with them in conversation about the challenges and aspirations they have for the future in areas of environment, sustainability, cultural preservation, local livelihoods and sustainable business.

Commencing in the capital Santiago we will be engaging some of the poorer communities looking at prevalent social issues of the day. From there we will head to Southern Chile where we will be working with our local partner organisations, fostering human encounter and connection with our friends there.

Trip themes & activities will include:

- Learn from the rich cultural traditions of the Mapuche giving us the opportunity to share our stories and hear of their dreams and challenges for the future in preserving and making a meaningful living from their rich cultural heritage. This will include staying in the traditional house Raku, craft and traditional medicine workshops and practices in preserving natural horticulture medicinal herbs and plants.
- Learn about local apiculture techniques and issues of bee keeping in Chile
- Meet and greet local agricultural groups meeting. Learn about changing farming practices, industrialisation, forestry impacts, soil quality restoration, organic farming practices, permaculture, and issues on community disintegrating.
- Look at last remaining native forest pockets. Learn about the problems of monoculture plantations of pine and eucalypts in the region and what solutions and alternatives are available.
- Hear from youth about their social enterprise initiatives.
- Take part in a youth & social enterprise discussion.
- Participate in a renewables and climate change chat with key leaders in the area.
- Visits hot springs, rivers and other natural landmarks.
- And MUCH MUCH more.

You're representing CERES in what will be a long relationship with Chile, and we're looking for your lead on establishing rapport, building friendships, and collaborating to overcome social and environmental challenges.

Accommodation: We'll be accommodated in a mixture of guest houses, farm stays, cabins in local forests, and the traditional Ruka of the Mapuches.

Cost: \$1500 for 10 days (payment plans available on request). We are a not for profit community organisation and all trips run at cost price. The fee includes all internal meals, accommodation, transport, community contributions, facilitator support, carbon offsets, pre-trip preparations and administration. It does not include flights, passport, visa, travel insurance, medical, alcoholic beverages, laundry and items of a personal nature.

Flights: The trip will commence and finish in Santiago where return flights to Australia can be booked.

Visas: On entry to Chile, a Tourist Card will be issued for a stay of up to 90 days.

A note before travelling with CERES global

Our trips are not tours but rather journeys of exploration and learning that we share together. They are real, lived experiences, where the people who travel with us immerse themselves in the culture and places we visit in a meaningful and mutually respectful way.

Our facilitators are not tour guides but facilitators or enablers. They work with the group as a whole to achieve insight and understanding of the communities we visit. The facilitator's role is to engage discussion within the group and with community members we are visiting to allow the sharing of ideas on social and environmental issues.

The people and places we visit are not tourist destinations or third party providers but rather real friends who we approach as true partner organisations. All of our partners do exceptional work in the areas of sustainability, the environment, community development, social equity and education. We celebrate each other's work through mutually beneficial exchange and two way learning.

The trips are open to people of any age or background wanting to travel with meaning and purpose, willing to open their hearts and minds to another culture and way of life.
