









Goddamn Mexicans, all hat and no cattle. I bring them progress, and they bring me a poor little devil.

Oh, please. I'm from Texas, and we don't take bad advice from New York liberals or European socialists or wetba...err, well, yes sir, I'm from Texas.




How do you think Mexicans benefit from having their gas extracted by means of tracking?

How much did it cost you to bribe and pay off Mexican politicians to get the energy reform laws passed?




