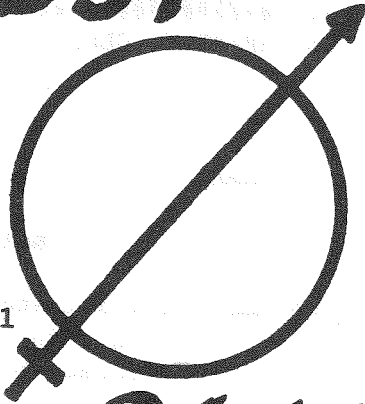

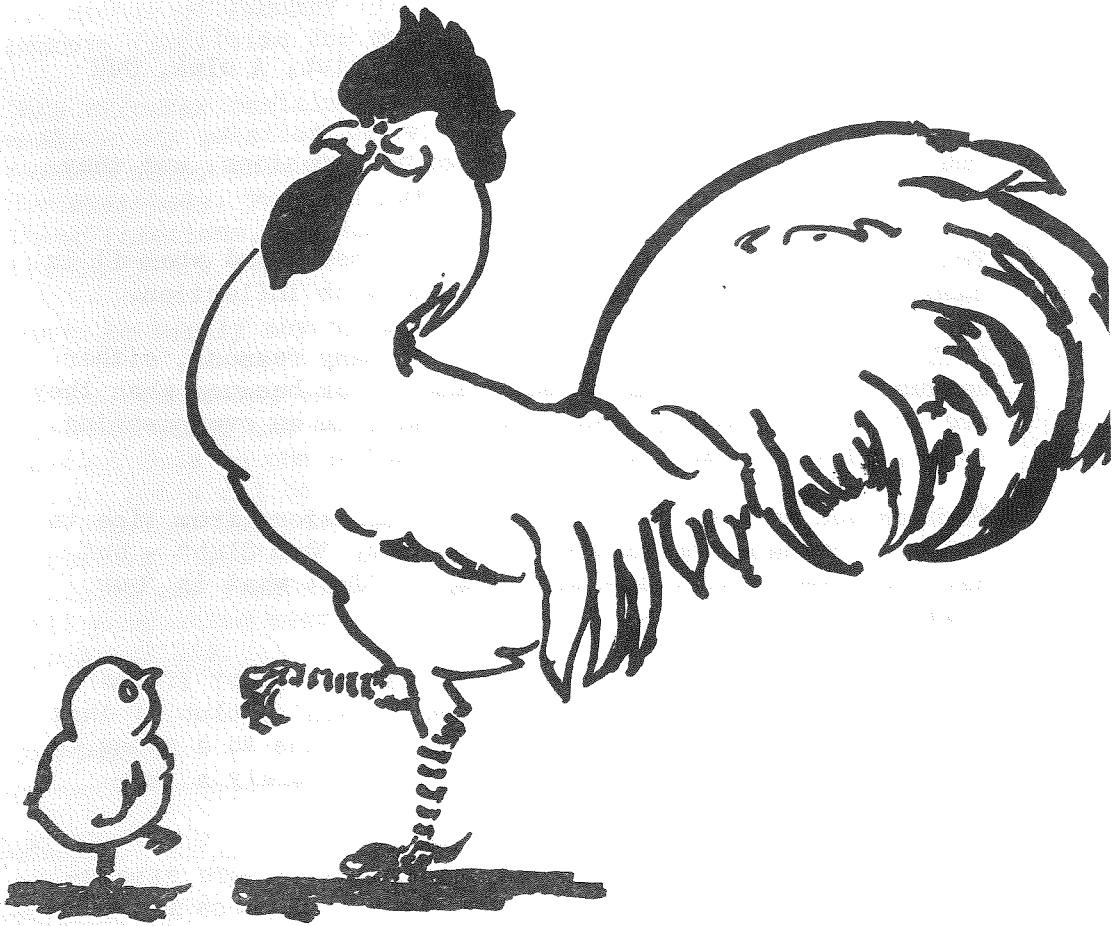

OUR CLUB
