Fostering critical thinking and stimulating creativity, our workshops and tours give students the opportunity to put their learning into context and apply classroom-developed skills in practical scenarios.

ABOUT THE LIBRARY

State Library Victoria is the state's premier research and reference library and a gateway to the world's information. For the past 160 years, the Library has supported Victorians in their quest for knowledge, inspiration and information.

Reflecting the cultural and social history of Victoria, our collections include more than two million books, thousands of pictures, maps, manuscripts and artefacts, one of Australia's biggest newspaper collections, and an ever-growing collection of digital and multimedia materials.

Our collections are made accessible to young learners through facilitated learning programs, self-guiding kits, free exhibitions and a range of information services and online resources.

EXHIBITIONS AT THE LIBRARY

Whether part of a scheduled program or as a self-guided tour, students will have the opportunity to immerse themselves in the history of Victoria and the History of the Book collection in our three stunning permanent exhibitions:

The changing face of Victoria

Students will journey through Victoria's past as they sift through photographs, personal accounts and artefacts from the first settlement to today. They'll meet historic characters, from infamous bushranger Ned Kelly to ill-fated explorers Burke and Wills, and learn about the everyday lives of generations of Victorians. New items and stories are added to this exhibition twice yearly, revealing different aspects of the Library's historic collection.

Mirror of the world


Students will discover stunning artwork alongside powerful words in this visual feast for booklovers. This magnificent exhibition showcases rare, beautiful and historically significant books from the Library's collection. It celebrates books as keepers of ideas, knowledge and the imagination. Recent acquisitions and new stories are featured each year, showcasing works that trace the history of book design from medieval manuscripts to comics.

Cowen Gallery

The elegant Cowen Gallery features one of Australia's most significant collections of Victorian artworks. Students can explore aspects of Victoria's rich history in scenes of European settlement, early Melbourne streetscapes and portraits of some of Australia's most influential figures.

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MAKING HISTORY



FLASHBACK WORKSHOP

Ever imagined what Victoria was like in the 1900s? Flashback presents a vivid snapshot of Victorian history through the daily lives of families from 100 years ago. Featuring original stories and visual materials, this interactive and immersive workshop highlights the importance of memory and the concepts of past and present, as well as continuity and change.

Student experience

Students will:

- · get up close and personal with paintings, photographs and other fascinating treasures from the Library's collection
- tune into a wonderful telling of Wilfred Gordon McDonald Partridge written by Mem Fox
- use words and drawings to record, compare and contrast their own personal stories in a take-home
- explore the Library's unique heritage spaces, including the iconic La Trobe Reading Room, on a guided tour.

Skills development

- identify perspectives about changes to daily life from people in the past or present (VCHHC055)
- identify examples of continuity and change in family life and in the local area by comparing past and present (VCHHC056).





TINY TREASURES

WORKSHOP

Step into the shoes of a librarian, historian and curator in this hands-on digital storytelling workshop. Students will work collaboratively to identify and create a record for their own tiny treasure, presenting their findings in a video. Through this interactive experience, students will discover how artefacts can teach us about the past and how the State Library collects and documents these important stories.



YOUNG EXPLORERS



GREAT JOURNEYS OF EXPLORATION WORKSHOP

Take your students on a journey into the past with this interactive mapping workshop that uncovers how explorers imagined the mysterious Great Southern Land and why adventurers journeyed here. Students will be introduced to some of the important early maps of Australia held in our collection, and will also have the chance to practise their cartography skills, creating and decorating their own maps of the magnificent domed La Trobe Reading Room.


Student experience

Students will:


- examine and identify different features in maps from the Library's collection
- learn how Indigenous Australians and Europeans recorded information about the landscapes around them
- take a guided tour of the Library's unique heritage spaces, including the iconic La Trobe Reading Room and Mirror of the world exhibition
- create their own map of the La Trobe Reading Room.

Skills development

- identify and explain the causes and effects of European settlement and exploration (VCHHC070)
- interpret maps and other geographical data and information to develop identifications, descriptions, explanations and conclusions using geographical terminology (VCGC076).







THE STORY OF

The journey of Burke and Willis has all the elements of a great story: an ambitious plan, quirky characters and a tough environment. On a guided tour, students investigate the history behind Burke and Wills' doomed 1860 transcontinental expedition, viewing significant artefacts and artworks from our extensive Burke and Wills collection. Students will engage in a role-playing activity, ordering key events in the story's timeline to gain an understanding of why the expedition was formed, what went wrong and why, and the hardships endured by explorers.

Students will:

- examine fascinating primary sources from the world's largest Burke and Wills collection in The changing face of Victoria exhibition
- order key events in the story's timeline to gain an understanding of the causes and consequences of the expedition's failure
- become explorers and work in groups to select equipment for a modern expedition
- take a guided tour of the Library's unique heritage spaces, including the iconic La Trobe Reading Room.

Skills development

- sequence significant events in chronological order to create a narrative explaining the developments in Australia's colonial past (VCHHC082)
- explain the significance of an event, individual or group that influenced change in the Australian colonies (VCHHC087).





FREE SELF-GUIDED TOURS



ETHICAL CAPABILITY TRA FAIRNESS TOUR

For a self-guided philosophy experience like no other, take your students on a journey back in time to when the city of Melbourne was first founded. The Fairness Trail encourages young learners to consider: was what took place fair? Created in conjunction with the Victorian Association for Philosophy in Schools, the trail is inspired by levels 3 and 4 Ethical Capabilities and levels 3 and 4 History in the Victorian Curriculum.

- discuss how and why particular events of Victoria's past may been see as good or bad, right or wrong
- record their thoughts with words and drawings in an accompanying activity booklet.

Skills development

- explore the contested meaning of fairness and harm (VCECU004) and practise justifying their views with evidence and ideas (VCHHC083)
- identify and employ personal values in the decisionmaking process (VCEU006/008).





ETHICAL CAPABILITY TRAIL: HAPPINESS TOUR

For levels 5 and 6 students exploring the ethical capability curriculum, the Happiness Trail simultaneously investigates notions of happiness and history while introducing students to Melbourne in its early years, asking them to contemplate: how do you build a happy city? This program is created in conjunction with the Victorian Association for Philosophy in Schools, and relates to Ethical Capabilities and History in the Victorian Curriculum.


Students will:

- undertake a history-themed scavenger hunt through our heritage spaces, including the spectacular La Trobe Reading Room
- discover historical items from the Library's collection and use them to stimulate conversation about competing concepts of happiness and place in colonial Victoria
- explore the significance of 'means versus ends' in the context of colonisation and discuss how ethical principles are formed from world views and cultural background
- record their thoughts with words and drawings in an accompanying activity booklet.

Skills development

- explore concepts of happiness, place and prosperity (VCECU009) and practise justifying their views with evidence and ideas (VCHHC083)
- identify examples of continuity and change in colonial Victoria (VCHHC085) and discuss their ethical implications (VCECE012, VCECD013).





LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS

TOUR

Our Library highlights tour is an hour-long, self-guided journey that will introduce students at all levels to the Library's unique heritage spaces, from artworks in the Cowen Gallery to aerial views from the top floor of the iconic La Trobe Reading Room. See treasures such as Ned Kelly's armour, Batman's deed and the Shakespeare stained-glass window on this self-paced tour.

PEOPLE AND PLACES



FIRST CONTACTS

On a tour through the Library's unique heritage spaces, students take an in-depth look at our collection to develop an understanding of how European settlement impacted the Aboriginal people of Victoria and their land. Students will use a range of primary sources (artworks, explorer books and John Batman's infamous treaty), visual thinking skills and their own viewpoints to present a range of questions about the past.

- understand the nature of contact between Indigenous communities in Victoria and European settlers, and the effects of these interactions (VCHHK081).

RESEARCHING OUR VICTORIAN PAST WORKSHOP

In this hands-on workshop, students have the chance to get creative and improve their research skills. Students will have access to the Library's remarkable collection, introducing them to the lives of some of Victoria's most significant figures such as Ned Kelly, William Barak and Vida Goldstein. In pairs, they will create a short film to share with the class.

- view significant artworks, artefacts and other historical materials up close in The changing face of Victoria exhibition.

Skills development

- explain the significance of an individual who influenced change in the Australian colonies (VCHHC987)
- sequence significant events in order to create a narrative (VCHHC082).





THE COLONIAL EXPERIENCE TOUR

What was life like in Victoria before there were cars, roads or towns? Colonial Victoria is brought to life as students explore the Library's collection on a guided tour. Students will investigate the impact of European settlement on the environment and Aboriginal people of Victoria, and discover the role of significant individuals in shaping the colony. While examining unique photographs, artworks and artefacts, students will learn about Victorian society during colonial times.

- visit Ned Kelly's famous suit of armour.

- identify the origin, content features and the purpose of historical sources, and describe the context of these sources when explaining daily life in colonial Victoria (VCHHC082)
- identify and describe patterns of continuity and change in daily life for Victorian Aboriginal people, 'native born' and migrants in the Australian colonies (VCHHC085).

Australia's most notorious bushranger has split public opinion for more than a century - a cold-blooded murderer to some but a hero to others. How did the events of early European settlement shape his attitudes and turn this charismatic young man to crime? Students dig deep into the turbulent life of Ned Kelly on this guided tour of the Library's collection and explore different perspectives to draw their own conclusion on the controversial question about the Kelly Gang: was Ned Kelly a hero or a villain?

KELLY GANG COMI WORKSHOP

History is put to the test in this interactive workshop taking an in-depth look at the significant events that shaped the life of notorious bushranger Ned Kelly. Students are given creative licence to retell Kelly's stories in their own words by creating a digital comic using the Comic Life app. Students will also gain an understanding of the Library's role in collecting historical artefacts that document Victoria's history.

COMBINED PROGRAM THE LIFE AND TIMES OF NED KELLY TOUR LY GANG COMICS WORKSHOP

Combining elements of The life and times of Ned Kelly tour and the Kelly Gang comics workshop, this program uncovers the realities of life in colonial Victoria and explores the events that shaped Ned Kelly's life. Students will attend a tour of the Library's vast collection, followed by a workshop where they retell aspects of the infamous bushranger's story by creating a digital comic. Based on the conclusions they draw, students then consider their position: was Ned Kelly a hero or a villain?

BATMANIA: THE STORY OF EARLY MELBOURNE TOUR

On a guided tour, students will explore early Melbourne's rich history through a variety of artworks, artefacts and architectural icons. Students will unlock the city's stories as they come face-to-face with Batman's deed, William Barak's portrait, Ned Kelly's armour and more, providing unparalleled insight into Melbourne's history.

Student experience

Students will:

- take a guided tour of the Library's unique heritage spaces, including the iconic La Trobe Reading Room
- view artefacts, documents and other historical sources in the Cowen Gallery and The changing face of Victoria exhibition
- learn about important historical figures from Victoria's past, such as John Batman, William Barak and Ned Kelly
- gain an understanding of the Library's role in collecting and documenting Victoria's history.

Skills development

This program links to the Victorian Curriculum and assists students to:

- analyse the cause and effect of significant events that affected the social, cultural and economic development of Victoria (VCHHC086/103/127) and their impact on Aboriginal communities in Victoria (VCHHC085/86)
- describe perspectives and identify ideas, beliefs and values of people in the past (VCHHC084/100/124) and evaluate the roles of significant Victorians (VCHHC104).



MAKE YOUR OWN BOOK

WORKSHOP AND TOUR

During this tactile learning experience, students will design and produce their own book - from creating the cover and stitching the pages to personalising, decorating and adding content. The program also includes a guided tour of the Library's History of the Book collection in the Mirror of the world exhibition and a visit to the stunning La Trobe Reading Room.

Students will:

- learn traditional book-making techniques and create their own hardcover book
- explore the history of the written and printed word in the Mirror of the world exhibition

- take a guided tour of the Library's unique heritage spaces, including the iconic La Trobe Reading Room.

Skills development

This program links to the Victorian Curriculum and assists students to:

- experiment and create a book using materials, techniques, technologies and processes specific to book-making (VCAVAV026)
- analyse the cause and effects of developments in book-making and printing in the medieval period (VCHHK117).

MEDIEVAL CALLIGRAPHY WORKSHOP AND TOUR

Explore the medieval world of parchment paper, coloured powders and gold leaf in this hands-on calligraphy experience. Dating back to the 5th century, the art of calligraphy flourished in the medieval age and required precise craftsmanship. In this creative workshop, students will become calligraphers - learning how to write decorative medieval scripts using calligraphy pens and make their own illuminated manuscripts based on Latin text. Students will also explore the history of medieval manuscripts while touring the Mirror of the world exhibition.

- identify and connect specific features of visual artworks from different cultures, historical and contemporary times (VCAVAR039).

RESEARCH SKILLS



LIBRARY ORIENTATION TOUR

Bring your students on a journey through Victoria's oldest and busiest public library. For 160 years, State Library Victoria has been a place for ideas, discussion, collaboration and learning. This guided tour demonstrates how the Library operates and reveals some of our unique collection items. Students will discover how different sources of information can be found in a variety of places, and learn how the State Library differs from public and school libraries. This tour provides an invaluable opportunity for students to become independent library users, now and in the future.

LIVING LIBRARY WORKSHOP AND TOUR

A living library is more than just books on shelves – it is a unique space where everyone is welcome to unearth stories, raise questions, find inspiration and create ideas. Take your students on an engaging multimodal trail around the Library's stimulating galleries and exhibition spaces to gain an understanding of the significance of the Library's role in collecting and preserving our history. During the workshop students will create a memento of their visit to the Library by producing an eBook inspired by the discoveries they make during the tour.

RESEARCH LAUNCH PAD WORKSHOP AND TOUR

Research launch pad is a free, full-day excursion, including transport, for Year 7 students from eligible schools in greater Melbourne.* During this interactive program, students will be introduced to fascinating collection items on a guided tour of the Library's historic spaces. They will choose one item to explore in depth and embark on a research quest in pairs to create a digital narrative using Animoto - an easy-to-use video-creation platform.

- consider a range of strategies to represent ideas and explain thinking processes to others (VCCCTM040).





RESEARCH SKILLS WORKSHOP

Encourage your students to become critical, creative and independent researchers with this hands-on workshop. Students will be introduced to the Library's onsite and online resources through a guided tour of our unique spaces and a session in our computer lab, where they will gain essential research skills. Students will focus on a compelling story from the Library's collection, generating research questions and exploring a variety of reliable online sources.

UNFOLDING HISTORY: WWI STO

WORKSHOP AND TOUR

Between 1914 and 1918 more than 416,000 young Australians ventured around the globe in service to their country and each other. Those who returned shared their stories through imagery and personal diaries - many of which are now held in the Library's collection. Unfolding history is an immersive, skillenhancing research workshop that explores the significance of WWI by focusing on the personal experiences of Victorians involved in the conflict. The workshop looks at generating questions of historical inquiry and teaches powerful research techniques using online resources, culminating in the production of a short digital narrative about a research topic.

Story camp (school holiday program)

For students aged 12–15, Story camp focuses on story creation by providing the opportunity for young storytellers to nurture their creativity, engage with creative mentors and build networks with their peers.
