

## *From the Director: Tom Ikeda*

Yesterday, in Washington DC, over 300 elderly Japanese American Army veterans helped accept the Congressional Gold Medal for the distinguished service of Japanese Americans during World War II. (See article below for more information.) Many of them served while their families were being held under guard behind barbed wires in the U.S. I've interviewed over 30 Japanese American World War II veterans and have heard difficult stories of heavy combat, being wounded, and losing dear friends. I am proud of these men and grateful that our country is honoring them.

This week I read an article in the *New York Times* about the mysterious death of a Chinese American soldier serving in Afghanistan who was subject to racist taunts by fellow soldiers. I believe the veterans I have interviewed would trade all their medals for a country that treats all soldiers with respect and dignity.
