- You can play U.S. Capitol Visitor Bingo **individually or in teams.**
 - **Print the card, questions and answer sheet** found in the attached pdf.
 - Each player or team receives a **Bingo card.**
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- **Cut the question sheet into 24 individual squares.** Note that each question is marked with a letter and number.
 - Put all the questions into a box, bowl or hat. **Designate someone in the group to read all the questions** out loud, one at a time.
 - **Raise your hand if you think you know the answer to a question.** If the answer is correct, a marker (penny or paper clip) is placed on a square in the column with the same letter. (You can choose any Bingo square as long as it has the same letter as the question.)
 - If the **answer is not correct**, another player or team has the chance to answer correctly.
 - If **no one answers correctly**, ask the question again later in the game.
 - The **winner is the person or team with a line of correct answers.** The line can be horizontal, vertical or diagonal.

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EXTENDED ACTIVITY:

Students design their own Bingo cards about the Constitution or Congress.

The three branches of the government are the legislative, executive and judicial.

The Capitol is the building where Congress, the legislative branch of the federal government, is housed.

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I-2

Washington, D.C., also known as the District of Columbia, is the capital of the United States.

The founders of our country placed many checks and balances on the legislative branch that prevented absolute power in the hands of either the House or the Senate.

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I-4

Constitutions explain how laws are made, how leaders are chosen, and what government can or cannot do. A constitution explains the relationship between people and their government.

Each Congress meets for two years, and each year is considered one session of that Congress.

The two houses of the legislative branch are the U.S. Senate and the U.S. House of Representatives.

Each state is represented by two senators.

The power to govern comes from the people and serves the people.

The U.S. has grown from 13 to 50 states. The U.S. Capitol has been significantly enlarged to make room for the increased number of representatives and senators.

G-1

A representative is someone who speaks on our behalf in Congress regarding national issues.

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G-2

Representation in the House of Representatives is based on the population of the state.

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G-3

A symbol represents or stands for something. Symbols found in the Capitol include a flag, eagle, star, snake, mace, shield, laurel leaf, olive branch, and scale of justice.

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G-4

The first ten amendments are called the Bill of Rights.

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G-5

Freedoms we enjoy include freedom of speech, religion, press, assembly, and petition.

O-1

Members of the House of Representatives are elected for two-year terms.

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O-2

The primary responsibility of Congress is to make laws. The Senate approves or rejects treaties and presidential nominations and tries the impeachment of federal officials. Bills concerning raising money must originate in the House of Representatives. The House also starts the process of impeachment of federal officials.

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O-3

Each branch of the federal government checks the power of the other two so that no branch becomes too powerful. For example, a bill passed by Congress must be signed by the President to become law. The President can veto a bill, but Congress can override a President's veto by a two-thirds vote.

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O-4

The art in the Capitol tells the story of America; important events and people are honored in paintings and statuary.

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O-5

Citizens should be educated and informed on issues. Citizens should also vote in local and federal elections and serve on juries when asked to do so.
