Irish, Italians, Jewish, and many other minorities overcame prejudice and worked their way up. Blacks should do the same without special favors. (Agree)	88%	67%	56%	66%	70%	+21%
Generations of slavery and discrimination have created conditions that make it difficult for blacks to work their way out of the lower class. (Disagree)	72%	55%	28%	65%	58%	+17%
Over the past few years blacks have gotten less than they deserve. (Disagree)	83%	74%	48%	73%	72%	+9%
It's really a matter of some people not trying hard enough; if blacks would only try harder they could be just as well off as whites. (Agree)	73%	54%	33%	55%	56%	+19%
