



DECLARATION OF SENTIMENT.

1st. We believe slavery to be a sin—always, every where, and in every sin, in itself, apart from its occasional crimes...

2d. The influence of slavery upon slaves and the slave States are, an abiding sense of insecurity and dread...

3d. Slavery has framed and incorporated into the very structure of society...

4th. We propose for our system of measures, to maintain for the true principles...

the power of the press, and explore the church to purge herself from the sin of slavery...

With jealousy for the honor of God; with bows of compassion for the perishing; with a glowing ardor for the most efficacious participation of the church in the secured thing...

For the oppression of the poor, and for the sighing of the needy, now will I arise, saith the Lord...

PLAN OF OPERATION. We shall seek to effect the destruction of slavery, not by exciting discontent in the minds of the slaves...

The rent paid by the keeper of the Work House, or Sugar House, is \$1400 per annum...
