Look at the mean, underhand course taken by Mr. Garrison in his present course of organization, more than the interest of either the white or colored. We would not make these remarks, did not a sense of duty compel us to do so.

BRITISH INDIA.

ON BRITISH INDIA. At the First Annual Meeting of the British India Society, held at Freeman's Hall, London, July 6, 1840.

Mr. Garrison said, he could not avoid rising to thank Mr. O'Connell for having had the courage to take the bull by the horns—the bill which was going so many of the natives of India to death, in the most frightful manner.
