Boston, May 25th, 1835. A meeting of abolitionists was held at the Anti-Slavery Hall, on Monday, the 25th inst. for the purpose of organizing a new New-England Anti-Slavery Convention. On motion, Rev. E. M. P. Wells was called to the chair, and Mr. Charles C. Burleigh, Secretary.
