The report commences with a grateful recognition of obligations to Him who fills the house of the weary and the tumult of the people...

We have no adequate means of estimating the increase of avowed and through abolitionists during the year; but the general change of public sentiment in favor of the slave...

From the reports of the treasurer and publishing agent, it will appear that the total receipts of the American Anti-Slavery Society during the last anniversary have been \$25,868.50...

In the course of the past year, the Society has employed 13 agents for one or shorter periods, as agents or lecturers. The entire amount of services performed by these individuals is not less than eight years.

In the connection the committee would not forget to mention the services of those noble-hearted and devoted men, Charles Sumner and George Thompson. The first has had a long career on his side, and more than his time, gratuitously to his cause.

The north responded to the clamor of unassisted tyranny by the freemen of the north. They felt that something must be done, yet they knew not what to do.

The northern legislators were called upon to legislate for the freemen of the north. They responded by the appointment of hitherto non-reporting committees; and some by silence.
