LETTER II.

The Pastoral Letter of the General Association of Congregational Ministers of Massachusetts.

—Haverhill, 7th Mo. 1837.

DEAR FRIENDS,—When I last addressed thee, I had not seen the Pastoral Letter of the General Association. I have now read it with my hands, and I must dissent from my inflection of exhibiting the condition of women in different parts of our world. In the first place, I mark on this extraordinary document an assurance that when the minds of men are emancipated from the shackles of prejudice, superstition and traditions of men, the sentiments contained in the Pastoral Letter will be shown to be the result of a just and liberal opinion of Cotton Mather and other distinguished men of his day, on the subject of which it is written. I have no objection to a body of divines so gravely assembled and endeavor to prove that woman has no right to open her mind to the dumb superstitions of the fathers. I judge should have set on the trials of witches, and solemnly condemned numerous persons one dog to death for witchcraft.
