At a public meeting of the colored inhabitants of Nantucket, held in the Zion's Church, Feb. 23, 1842, the following resolutions were adopted...

Resolved, That whereas the law of this Commonwealth, in reference to the privilege of education in our town schools...

It was voted that a committee of three be appointed to have the proceedings of this meeting...

ADDRESS To the School Committee, and other inhabitants of the town of Nantucket.

Having availed ourselves of the opportunity of visiting your premises at the Hall, a few short time ago, we were forcibly struck by the matter which was then the subject of your deliberations...

The Constitution of the United States expressly provides that Congress shall make no laws to abridge the freedom of speech...

The Constitution has prescribed no limitation or restriction on the right of the people to petition, with regard to the subject of slavery...

We are a large Society, having an instrument called a Constitution. This instrument is intended to express the object of the association...
